14 CES Folks in Afghanistan

May 09.
The 17 members of 14 Construction Engineering Squadron (CES) who deployed to Afghanistan in early April were quickly dispatched into forward operating bases and camps within Kandahar province. They were also quickly indoctrinated into various aspects of "soldiering" and conducting engineering projects "outside the wire". All those months of training and preparing for this mission are now paying dividends both in productivity and in personnel safety and security. Two unit members are lo-

cated at the Kandahar Airfield as part of the Construction Management Organization (CMO) HQ, while the other members of the squadron are living and working at other locations.

The majority of squadron members have taken on a road construction project and are preparing to move to a new location to begin work on an irrigation improvement project. The teams have their own armoured vehicles and weapon systems as well as support in the form of Explosive Detection and Mine Detection dogs. Three of the

squadron members have been attached to an infantry unit and have conducted a number of mounted and foot patrols in a district that will soon be secured to allow for more development works.

Morale is high amongst the teams and their comradeship is becoming stronger as they share numerous hazardous experiences on their job sites. Sharing a common adversity does bring people together. Twelve more members of 14 CES shall arrive in KAF in late May to construct hangers to support the Canadian air force operation here in Afghanistan.

French Officials Recognize SAR Crew Effort

May 12, 2009 - Members of the 103 Search and Rescue Squadron and other agencies—who were involved in a 2008 search and rescue operation of a French vessel received medals from French officials in recognition of their efforts during a ceremony at the Canadian Coast Guard Station in St. John's, N.L., on April 24, 2009.

In his remarks, Jean-Pierre Berçot, prefect of the French island of Saint-Pierre et Miquelon, emphasized the importance of the relationship that exists between France and Canada, and the special working relationship with the Canadian Coast Guard and the Canadian military that was highlighted during the *Cap Blanc* mission.

In the early hours of December 2, 2008, 103 Squadron was informed of an overdue vessel, the *Cap Blanc*, from Saint-Pierre et Miquelon. The *Cap Blanc* had departed Argentinia, N.L., located on the southwest coast of the Avalon Peninsula, late in the evening of Dec. 1, and was now reported overdue by French authorities.

Within minutes, a Cormorant helicopter and its crew were on their way to the last known position of the *Cap Blanc*. Upon arriving at the scene, the crew saw a red haul of what appeared to be the front of the *Cap Blanc* protruding out of

the water. The *Cap Blanc* had capsized. The *Canadian Coast Guard Cutter W. Jackman* and the RCMP police vessel *Murray* were at the scene as well. A second *Cormorant* was launched; the plan was for the SAR techs to dive to the overturned vessel and search for the four crewmembers who may have still been inside. As the SAR techs were preparing for the dive, the *Cap Blanc* suddenly slipped into the ocean and sank.

The search for the missing crewmembers went on for three days. Crews from 103 Squadron and 413 Transport and Rescue Squadron in Greenwood, N.S., along with members of the Canadian Coast Guard and

the RCMP, searched the Placentia Bay area with hope of finding the *Cap Blanc* crewmembers. Unfortunately, the search was officially called off after three days.

14 Wing Greenwood Hosts Commander's Maritime Air Advisory Group

On April 27, 2009, 14 Wing Greenwood was the location for the Commander's Maritime Air Advisory Group (CMAAG). The CMAAG is a semi-annual working group where commanders and key senior members of the Maritime Helicopter and Long Range Patrol

Community meet to discuss high-level matters pertaining to their organizations and units. This spring, the working group was co-chaired by Colonel Derek Joyce (14 Wing Commander) and Colonel Alan Blair (1 Canadian Air Division Headquarters Regional Air Control Element Atlantic). In addition, nearly twenty other commanders

and senior members from both the East and West Coast, as well as 1 Canadian Air Division and National Defence Headquarters, were in attendance. The purpose of the CMAAG was to provide that critical, face-to-face interaction needed to discuss the key issues facing the Maritime Helicopter and Long Range Patrol Commu-

nities today and in the future. A major topic of discussion was the personnel resources and staffing levels of squadrons and units on both coasts. Specific to 14 Wing Greenwood were the discussions on current CP-140 Aurora missions and support, as well as the challenges and way ahead as the Wing transitions to the new and advanced

Block III aircraft.

When asked about his thoughts on the CMAAG Colonel Joyce said, "both the Sea King and Aurora communities are undergoing incredible changes over the next 3 years, and the CMAAG meeting provided us with an opportunity to learn lessons from each other, and realize the extent to which our challenges are similar." The

CMAAG is an invaluable opportunity for the Community to hear the voices of all unit commanders and to discuss the key matters affecting the commanders and their organizations within the Community. From the working group grew plans and strategies to forge the next steps to face the demands of current and future operations for the Patrol Community.

New Feathers for an Old Bird

We have all heard it said, and it's true I'm sure, "there is nothing broken, that can't be fixed".

The DC 3 aircraft (Dak) restoration crew, lead by Eric Welin, are replacing the panels in the flap well areas with new aluminium skin, held in place by a large number of new rivets, using the old holes in the surrounding support structure. Bob McElman, Doc McKeil, Chuck Calder and Eric are repairing damage in the centre section, incurred in transit to Greenwood. It can be exacting, tedious work marrying large new panels to a structure first assembled in 1944, but they are getting it done. The next major step will be to attach the fuselage to the much modified and travelled centre section, and eventually when completed, the aircraft will be completely

restored.

Other projects being worked on by Russell Keddy and Bill Flinn such as the landing light assembly and ice shield hardware are progressing and looking much improved.

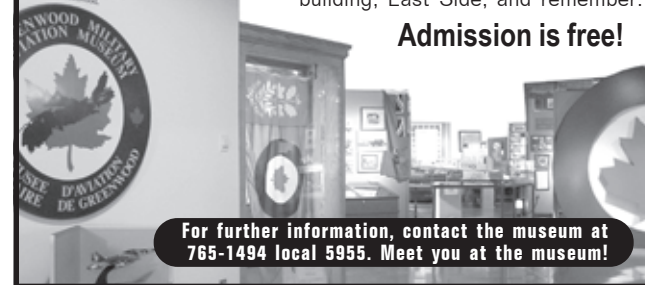

The unpredictable, sometimes this is scarier than the monster in the closet. At least when you turn the lights on, you can see that the monster is only a pile of dirty laundry. However, the unpredictable is only known in hindsight. This is often the nature of moving, no matter how often, and no matter what bases; there are still components, which are simply unpredictable. The ability to imagine a realistic outcome of a change comes with experience; when you've had enough background to be able to envision what the

pending change will look and feel like.

Who will my friends be, where will I play, what if no one likes me, where will I sleep, what if I don't like my new house, what if we get lost? Children often experience change differently than the adults in their life, mainly because they don't have the same ability to predict that the monster in the closet is in fact their dirty socks. Children require support to imagine how

the change will impact their individual lives; it is through this that children experience stability, enhanced resilience

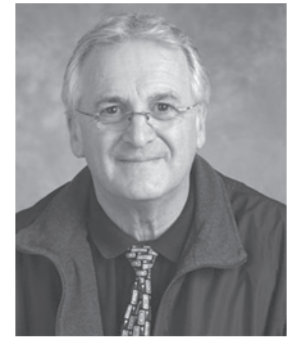

Historic Aircraft that Played a Significant Role in Canadian Aviation Heritage

Avro 652A Anson II

During the discussions leading to the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan (BCATP) the Anson I was selected as the twin-engine trainer. Canada was to build the wings and Britain to supply the fuselages and whole aircraft; however in May 1940 Britain indicated that she could not supply any parts or sections. The Canadian manufacturing plan was now upset and a shortage of twin-engine trainers loomed.

In response to the crisis, a truly cross-Canada effort developed that resulted in the manufacturing of the Anson and its supply to the BCATP. The Government created Federal Aircraft Ltd in Montreal to coordinate manufacturing. National Steel Car and de Havilland of Toronto, Canadian Car & Foundry in Amherst, NS, and MacDonald

Brothers of Winnipeg all built fuselages, while companies as diverse as tractor manufacturer Cockshutt Plough of Brantford, ON and Bristol Aircraft Products of Belleville, ON made major sub-components.

While the Anson I was the first mark to be built, the Anson II was built in the greatest number and was built only in Canada. It incorporated many improvements and innovations to save weight and scarce resources such as aluminum. For instance, the metal nose was replaced with one of moulded plywood. The Anson V incorporated even more changes, and more wood, being considered a major improvement. In service the Anson II was used primarily for pilot training while

the V was used mainly for navigator training.

In total 1832 Anson IIs were built in Canada between 1941 and 1943 and a further 1048 Anson Vs were built between 1943 and 1945. Declared surplus after the war, they did not last long in the hands of private owners, primarily due to the amount of wood used. The Government took over National Steel Car, transforming it into Victory Aircraft, which built the Lancaster; Victory Aircraft later became A.V. Roe Canada, makers of the CF-100 Canuck.

Durant les discussions qui mènent à la création du Programme d'entraînement aérien du Commonwealth britannique (PEACB), l'Anson I est choisi comme bimoteur d'entraînement. Le Canada construira les ailes et la Grande-Bretagne se chargera du fuselage et de l'ensemble de l'avion. Cependant, en mai 1940, la Grande-Bretagne indique qu'elle ne peut fournir ni les pièces ni les parties de l'avion. Le plan de fabrication canadien est bouleversé, et la menace d'une pénurie de bimoteurs d'entraînement se dessine.

En réaction à cette crise

s'amorce une véritable initiative pancanadienne qui mène à la fabrication de l'Anson et à sa distribution au PEACB. Le gouvernement fonde à Montréal la Federal Aircraft Limited pour coordonner la fabrication des appareils. Les entreprises National Steel Car et de Havilland, de Toronto, la Canadian Car & Foundry, à Amherst (Nouvelle-Écosse), ainsi que la MacDonald Brothers, de Winnipeg, construisent des fuselages, tandis qu'un large éventail d'entreprises telles que le fabricant de tracteurs Cockshutt Plough, de Brantford (Ontario), et la Bristol Aircraft Products, de Belleville (Ontario), produisent des pièces auxiliaires importantes.

Si l'Anson I est le premier modèle fabriqué, l'Anson II est celui qui est produit en

plus grand nombre, et ce, seulement au Canada. Il comporte de nombreuses améliorations et innovations pour alléger son poids et épargner des ressources limitées comme l'aluminium. Par exemple, le nez en contreplaqué moulé remplace celui en métal. L'Anson V comprend encore plus de changements et plus de bois, ce qui est considéré comme une grande amélioration. L'Anson II sert principalement à l'entraînement des pilotes, et l'Anson V, à celui des navigateurs aériens.

En tout, 1832 Anson II sont fabriqués au Canada entre 1941 et 1943, auxquels s'ajoutent 1048 Anson V produits de 1943 à 1945. Déclarés excédentaires à la fin de la guerre, quelques Anson II et V sont utilisés dans le secteur civil, surtout par l'Austin Airways. Puisqu'ils ne sont pas conçus pour transporter une cargaison, la plupart des Anson ne servent pas très longtemps.

Certificate in Business Management

The Certificate in Business Management consists of 30 credit-hours of university courses provided by Acadia's F.C. Manning School of Business which supports management planning and decision making in different environments. It will focus on three management disciplines: Human Resource Management, Organizational Behaviour & Organizational Theory; Financial Planning and Control; and Operations & Project Management. A list of possible courses that may be included within the Business Management Certificate Program may be found at the Wing Personnel Selection

Officer (WPSO) website at: http://greenwood.mil.ca/14wing/admin/W%20Pers%20Admin%20O/WPSO/index_e.htm or the Acadia website at <http://business.openacadia.ca>.

Flexibility will be allowed in the specific mix of courses students may take to complete the 30 credit-hour certificate. This will include up to 6 credit-hours of advanced standing credit, and 6 credit-hours of non-business elective courses from related academic disciplines. All courses within this program may be applied towards Acadia's Bachelor of Business Administration degree program.

In order to be eligible for this program, applicants must have Nova Scotia Grade 12 or equivalent. Proof of education may be in the form of high school transcripts, records of other academic work or Member's Personnel Record Resume (MPRR). Mature students may be considered for admission by providing transcripts of all academic work completed, 2 letters of reference from employers, a cover letter outlining future plans, and a resume. Applications from military personnel will be pre-screened through the WPSO for advanced standing. All other applications are to be sent directly to Acadia University. The admission deadline for the fall semester is August 1, 2009.

Military members may be eligible for advanced standing in this program. Military applicants may apply for exemption from a *maximum* of six credit hours of the 30 credit-hour program with proof of ILQ and/or PLQ or two OPME courses from the following: HIE 208, HIE 275, POE 206, PSE 402. Uni-



On Monday, May 11, 2009, 14 Wing Greenwood and Acadia University signed a Memorandum of Understanding for Acadia University to provide instruction toward a Certificate in Business Management to be delivered at 14 Wing Greenwood for military personnel, DND civilian (Public and Non-Public) employees and members of the surrounding community beginning in September 2009.

versity credit courses already applied towards other university certificate, diploma, or degree programs cannot be used toward advanced standing for this certificate.

All fees are the responsibility of the individuals who register for the program and courses. A \$25.00 program fee will be applicable. The cost of a 3 credit-hour course is \$779.00 with the cost of textbooks and other supplies averaging approximately \$100.00 per course. For more information on the Educational Reimbursement Program, military members may contact the WPSO office at local 5390 and civilian DND employees may contact the Learning and Career Centre (LCC) at local 5024.

With sufficient enrolment, two courses will be offered per semester. Semester 1 runs from September to December. Semester 2 runs from January until April. Semester 3 runs from

May until July. These courses will be taught at 14 Wing Greenwood at the Birchall Training Centre during each semester, room number to be announced at a later date. On a rotating basis, two courses will be scheduled for each semester, with each course typically meeting for one 3-hour class session per week on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. This schedule allows for the completion of 6 courses per year (18 credit hours) on-site at 14 Wing Greenwood. Individuals may enrol in the program in any semester. If a course requires a prerequisite, the required course may be completed online through Acadia. For students with advanced standing of 6 credit hours, it will be possible to complete the 30 credit hour certificate in as few as four 12 week semesters when completing 6 credit-hours each semester.

Although the focus of this program is to offer courses on-site at 14 Wing Greenwood, other courses may be completed through distance studies, spring and summer semesters at Acadia University, and regularly scheduled classes at Acadia during the fall and winter semesters. For military members, withdrawal from a course for operational reasons is permitted with written proof and completion at a later date will be permitted with no extra fees.

The completion of this program will provide management skills that will help you succeed in the military or as a business professional. It will expand your business background by providing extensive information on human resources, communications, budget management, and organizational theory. The advantage of taking this program is having the access to one of Canada's top undergraduate universities taught by highly skilled faculty at 14 Wing Greenwood.

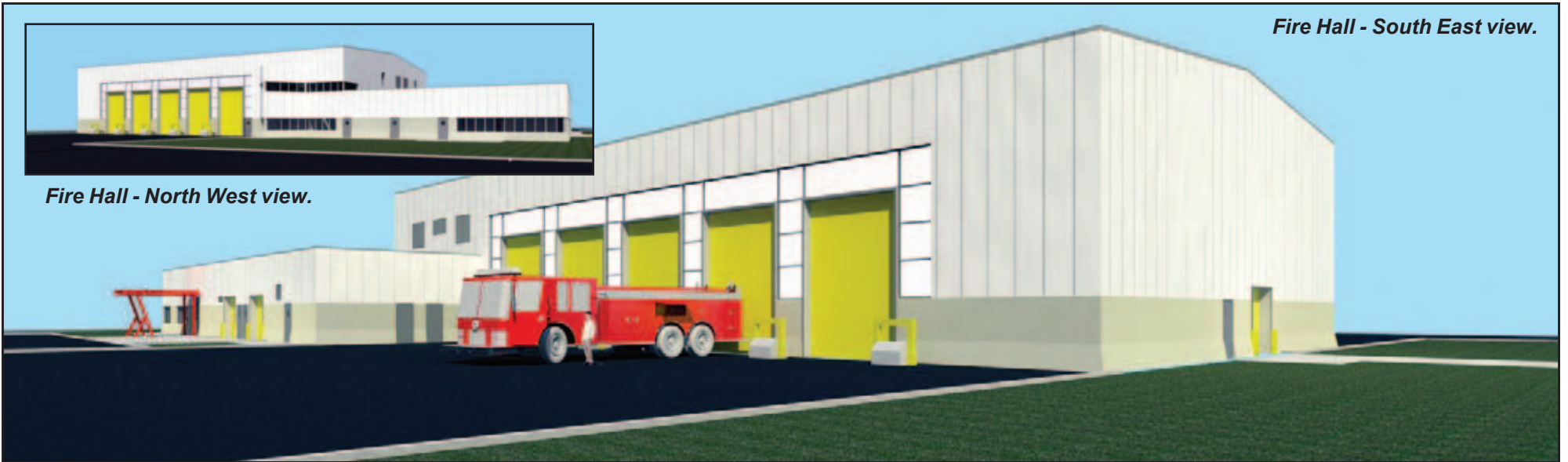

Approval Received for Construction of New Wing Fire Hall

The existing Wing fire hall was constructed in 1965 and is scheduled to be replaced this year. The existing facility suffers from operational deficiencies such as lack of direct access to the aircraft movement area, insufficient indoor parking for all response vehicles and the inefficient and cramped interior layout. The new facility will address these deficiencies as well as provide modern classrooms and an updated containment system for Aqueous Fire Fighting Foam (AFFF) leaks. Approval of construction funding was received last week from the Minister of National Defence, and the Wing Construction Engineering Section plans to tender the project this month via Defence Construction Canada. The construction contract award is scheduled for July 2009 and the building should be substantially

completed by May 2010, leading to operations commencing by summer 2010. The new fire hall will be built on the site that formerly housed 6 hangar and will resemble the artist rendering shown. The mission of the Wing fire hall is to provide 24/7 fire protection services including: Crash Fire Rescue in support of flying operations, structural fire protection, emergency medical response, training on fire fighting and life saving equipment, fire inspection services, HAZMAT response, difficult rescue, respiratory protection program management and Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) maintenance. The approval of construction funding for the new fire hallmarks the first of several new major construction projects to be implemented at 14 Wing over the next several years.

The front of the Lahave River Bakery contains windows covering an area of about 10X2.5 metres. Barbara and I were seated by the window, at a table in their luncheon room, when a large bird flew from a garden/woodland area on the opposite side of the road, striking the window just above our heads with a noisy thud. Barbara quickly went out for a look then returned to report, "it must have survived as there was nothing in sight". From our table, I could not see the area below the window sill, however, going outside I found a fe-

male, Spruce Grouse huddled up against the building on a cement step which was below the Bakery's front deck. From within the bakery, Gail, Lahave Bakery's proprietor, arrived to check on what all the excitement was about. After a short briefing she went out, picked up the grouse, which, from our viewpoint, didn't seem to object. She carried it across the street and up the hill to a wooded area. Once released; the grouse energetically scurried up the hill, through the brush, seeming to be in good condition, although it did not attempt flight. We hope for the best and may, or may not, be

forgiven for considering the excitement, top-notch, live, lunchtime entertainment!

From East Margaretsville, Helen Sharp, reports, "I had a Bobolink on a branch for a while on Saturday 5:30 PM. I did not see him feed. Just on a branch by the feeders in the wooded area back here. sides of the property with a pond, including bulrushes and wild cherry trees, on an adjoining property. Another corner includes popular snags and a mix of mature, conifers and hardwood trees that have numerous, Pileated and other woodpecker nest holes and excavations that have been made in search of food. Very mature, Orange Pippin, Pear, Russet and other fruit trees have become 'au naturel' providing first class habitat for several species of birds and small mammals. Near 0830 we saw a pair of Pileated Woodpeckers that were busy checking out the nearby snags, no doubt locating a nesting site while investigating the oval-shaped ex-

cavations for tasty morsels. There was a pair of Eastern Wood Peewees nesting under the eaves of one of his out-buildings and warbler "zeets" were heard coming from the bushes near the natural stream that flows by 2 sides of his property. Chickadees, Juncos, Nuthatches, Song Sparrow, Northern Flickers, Robins and occasional Tree Swallows, were coming and going.

In Tremont, during April, Sheila Hulford saw 30 different species at their feeders, Sheila wrote; "May 3, 2009 12:27:45 p.m. there has been a male RTH at the feeder about 15 minutes ago! This must be the earliest I've ever had them in Tremont."

In Morden, Roger Short saw a Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow on 9 May.

Gary Myers wrote: "The huge flock of Scoters was present again just west of Morden. Roger Short and I were able to scope them and determine there were approximately 300 Black Scoters with about 4 Surf Scoters among them. When we first arrived about 8:15 this morning they were in one tight group. As we watched they broke into three separate flocks. It was quite a sight." Black Scoters hunt for their favourite mollusks, crustaceans, and plants by diving in shallow

water in groups. This is their way of helping their species to find food and simultaneously limiting the effectiveness of predators. In fresh water their diet switches to aquatic insects and invertebrates. See Gary's photos at: http://jdd.pbase.com/fundybayman/gallery/birds_and_other_wildlife

On Meadowvale Rd., Pat Wilband spotted a male Indigo Bunting at her sunflower seed, feeder. Pat wrote: "He only hung around for 2-3 days: a beautiful shade of blue when in the sunlight: a bit shy of people so I couldn't take a picture." During the past month, Pat also saw Red-winged Blackbirds, Crossbills and a Northern Flicker. Pat's neighbour saw a large hawk or eagle take a pheasant that they had been feeding on their property throughout the winter. At Trout Lake, Ted wrote, "091100May09, on schedule, two male Ruby Throat Hummers arrived. One fed sporadically at one feeder while the other fed at number 2 feeder and took post approx. 6' away totally dominating "his property". A few aerial combats and he was immediately back on guard. The usual birds were present at the feeders. 3 male, Common Mergansers arrived: no wonder I cannot catch a trout. Hopefully the CM will clean out all the pesky, Yellow Perch. There were numerous Red-winged Blackbirds in the muskeg and finally the Swallows arrived, gliding over the bog, feasting on the swarming May Flies. It was wind, cold, drizzling, rain, my pants & feet were wet and I finally had enough sense to head back to camp and thaw out near the wood stove." We are at 765-8688, p.giffin@hotmail.com

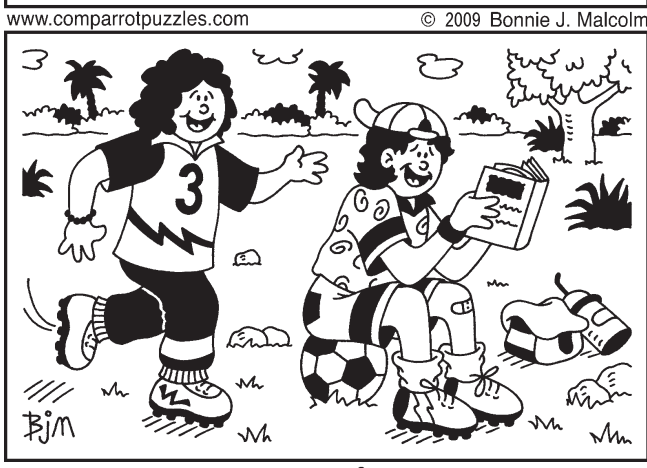
