Several members from 14 Wing TEME Squadron competed

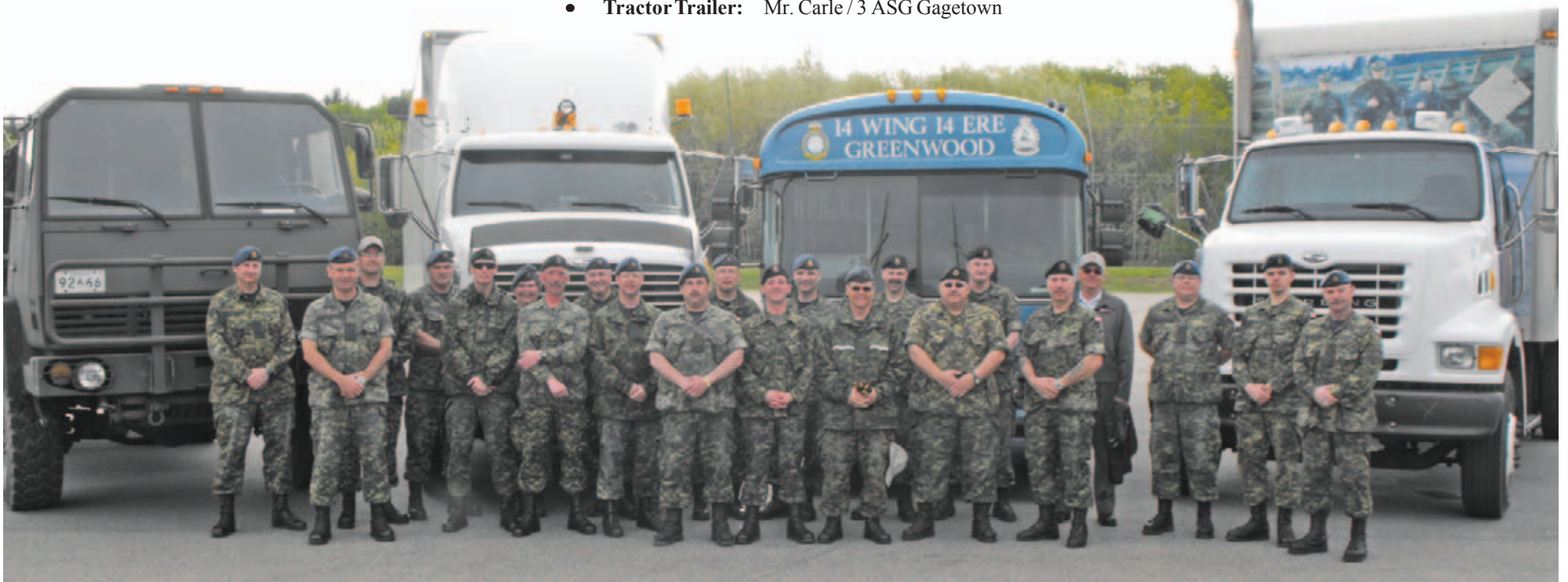

Un soldat canadien a été tué par un engin explosif

OTTAWA - Un soldat canadien a été tué lorsqu'un engin explosif a explosé pendant une patrouille à pied dans le district de Panjwai. L'incident a eu lieu dans une région au sud-ouest de Kandahar City vers 09 h 20, heure de Kandahar, le 8 juin 2009.

A été tué au combat le soldat Alexandre Péloquin du 3e Bataillon, Royal 22e Régiment basé à la Base des Forces canadiennes Valcartier près de Québec. Il servait à titre de membre du groupement tactique du 2e Bataillon, Royal 22e Régiment.

Le soldat a été évacué par hélicoptère vers l'installation médicale multinationale de l'aérodrome de Kandahar et le

processus nous permettant d'informer les plus proches parents est complété.

En ces moments difficiles, nos pensées et nos prières vont vers la famille et les amis de notre camarade décédé.

Bien que notre objectif ultime demeure de laisser l'Afghanistan aux Afghans, dans un pays qui soit mieux gouverné, plus paisible et plus sécuritaire, nous ne devons pas considérer le décès tragique de nos soldats comme un échec de notre mission puisque c'est précisément ce que l'ennemi espère. Nos efforts collectifs ici font une différence notable pour aider les Afghans à reprendre leur vie malgré l'oppression et des conditions de vie difficiles.

One Canadian soldier killed in an explosive device strike

OTTAWA (June 8, 2009) — A Canadian soldier was killed when an explosive device detonated during a foot patrol in the Panjwai District. The incident took place in an area south-west of Kandahar City at around 09:20 a.m., Kandahar time, June 8, 2009.

Killed in action was Private Alexandre Péloquin from the 3e Bataillon, Royal 22e Régiment based at Canadian Forces Base Valcartier near Quebec City. He was serving as a member of the 2e Bataillon, Royal 22e Régiment Battle Group.

The soldier was evacuated by helicopter to the Multi-National Medical Facility at

the Kandahar Airfield. The next-of-kin have been notified.

Our thoughts and prayers are with the family and friends of our fallen comrade during this very difficult time.

While our ultimate goal remains to leave Afghanistan to Afghans, in a country that is better governed, more peaceful, and more secure; let's not consider the tragic death of our soldiers as a failure of our mission as this is precisely what our enemy is counting on. Our collective efforts here are making a noticeable difference in helping Afghans reclaim their lives from oppression and despicable living conditions.

For Captain Rob Scholte, the 5,000-hour mark in the CP-140 Aurora was a personal achievement he was glad to reach. Flying hours have been cut back because of the Aurora modernization program, so he didn't think it would happen this soon. "I figured that I would reach 5,000 hours by the third quarter of 2009, but getting the opportunity to deploy in support of Op Athena boosted that time ahead quite a bit," he said.

Capt Scholte joined the Canadian Forces in 1983 as a Weapons Technician (Air) under the Youth Training Employment Program. At the end of that initial one-year contract, he remustered to the Air Defence Technician trade, and completed two tours with NORAD (North American Air Defense Command) long-range radar sites, one on Canada's west coast, and one on the east coast. In 1988, he

remustered again to the Airborne Electronic Systems Operator (AESOP) trade, achieving his wings in late 1989. His first aircrew posting was to 407 Maritime Patrol Squadron at 19 Wing Comox. In 1997, he was posted to 405 Maritime Patrol Squadron at 14 Wing Greenwood.

In 2002, Capt Scholte was selected for training as a navigator through the Commissioning from the Ranks (CFR) Program. He completed his occupational training in December 2004, and was posted back to 405 Squadron for Maritime Operational Aircrew Training as an acoustician. "I have been very fortunate since I decided to pursue the aircrew way of life in the Canadian Forces," says Capt Scholte. "I have been to many places around the world that I never thought I would see. It's been a great experience."

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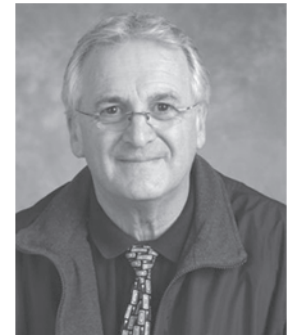

Historic Aircraft that Played a Significant Role in Canadian Aviation Heritage

Canadian Car & Foundry Burnelli CBY-3 Loadmaster

The Loadmaster was the convergence of several processes, and one of the most unusual aircraft ever built in Canada. Perhaps because of its unusual profile and design, the aircraft did not gain as much support as it should have merited.

Vincent Justus Burnelli of the United States had conceived of the idea of using the fuselage of aircraft to generate lift and thereby increase the lifting capacity of aircraft. He was involved in several companies; however no aircraft emerged beyond the production stage. In 1936, Canadian Car & Foundry (CC&F) of Fort William (now part of Thunder Bay) was seeking designs that it could manufacture, in the process acquiring the rights to manufacture Burnelli aircraft. In 1943 CC&F began design and construction of an upgraded Burnelli design, to be built for Transportes Aéreos Centroamericanos of Honduras. Although the contract was later cancelled, the prototype, named the Loadmaster, was first flown

on 17 July 1945. The Loadmaster could carry loads of 3,000 kgs, and had seating for 24 passengers. It received only a limited Domestic Certificate of Airworthiness, as it did not meet the stall requirements. Nonetheless, the aircraft began cargo trials for Canadian Pacific Airlines in March 1947. Operating out of Mont Joli and Sept Isles, it transported mining

In June 1948 the United States Air Force evaluated the Loadmaster but found it lacked the space and door size for large cargo. In February 1951, CC&F gave up trying to have the Loadmaster certified in Canada and exported it to the United States where it had a varied career into the early 1960s. It is now on display at the New England Air Museum, north of Hartford, Connecticut.



equipment to the Knob Lake area, later to become the site of Iron Ore Company of Canada's Schefferville operations.

Le Burnelli CBY-3 Loadmaster de la Canadian Car & Foundry

Le Loadmaster était le résultat de la combinaison de plusieurs processus et l'un des avions les plus inusités jamais construits au Canada. Peut-être en raison de son profil et de sa conception inhabituels, il n'a pas été soutenu autant qu'il l'aurait mérité.

L'Américain Vincent Justus Burnelli avait eu l'idée d'utiliser le fuselage de l'appareil pour générer de la portance et ainsi augmenter cette capacité dans l'appareil. Il avait travaillé pour plusieurs entreprises, mais aucun avion n'avait franchi l'étape de la production grâce à lui. En 1936, la Canadian Car & Foundry

(CC&F), de Fort William (qui fait maintenant partie de Thunder Bay), cherchait des modèles à partir desquels elle pourrait construire des appareils, acquérant dans le cadre de ce processus les droits de construction de l'avion de Burnelli. En 1943, la CC&F a commencé la conception et la construction d'un modèle amélioré de Burnelli qui devait être construit pour Transportes Aéreos Centroamericanos du Honduras. Même si le contrat a par la suite été annulé, le prototype, nommé le Loadmaster, a volé pour la première fois le 17 juillet 1945.

Le Loadmaster pouvait


transporter des charges de 3 000 kg et il comportait 24 sièges passagers. Il n'a reçu qu'un certificat national restreint de navigabilité aérienne, car il ne satisfaisait pas aux exigences en matière de décrochage. En mars 1947, il a néanmoins commencé à subir des essais avec fret pour les Lignes aériennes Canadien Pacifique. Partant de Mont-Joli et Sept-Îles, il a transporté du matériel d'exploitation minière jusque dans la région du lac Knob, qui est plus tard devenue le site d'exploitation de Schefferville de l'Iron Ore Company of Canada.

En juin 1948, la United States Air Force a évalué le Loadmaster, mais elle a trouvé que l'espace et les dimensions des portes ne suffisaient pas pour le chargement de fret de dimensions importantes. En février 1951, la CC&F a cessé de tenter d'obtenir la certification du Loadmaster au Canada et elle l'a exporté aux États-Unis, où il a connu une carrière diversifiée au début des années 60. Le Loadmaster est



maintenant en exposition au New England Air Museum, au nord de Hartford (Connecticut).

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The Aerial Experiment Association and Canadian Aviation History Before the Silver Dart

During this centennial of powered flight, it's difficult not to talk about the famed Silver Dart and its infamous designer and pilot, Douglas McCurdy. Rightly so, as both the aircraft and its pilot are inextricably linked to a milestone in Canadian aviation history: our first powered flight on the 23rd of February 1909. But the truth is the story of our first flight starts well before that cold day on the ice of lac Bras d'Or. It starts surprising enough, with an idea and an investment from an impressively persuasive woman and the subsequent union of five extraordinary men in an organization called the Aerial Experiment Association.

Anyone who has been to Baddeck, Nova Scotia will know that, at one time, the town was home to Alexander Graham Bell. In the sum-

mer of 1885, Bell and his family stumbled upon Cape Breton during a yachting vacation. He fell in love with the area and decided to build a modest 1600 acre summer estate overlooking lac Bras d'Or. Although best known for the telephone and phonograph, Bell quickly developed a reputation as a determined inventor with his eye on loftier goals. In the early 1900s, he designed and unveiled numerous experiments to the residents of Baddeck including hydrofoils, gliders and massive tetrahedral kites. The Bells became immediate celebrities but to one particular family – the McCurdys – they became close personal friends and to one particular boy – Douglas McCurdy – Alexander Graham Bell became a mentor and near father-like figure.

Bell's experiments drew the attention of more than just the Cape Breton locals. By early 1907, he was joined in Baddeck by Thomas Selfridge, a Lieutenant in the US Army, assigned to observe Bell's flight

experiments and Glenn Curtiss, an American engineer already famous in his own right for his design and manufacturing of combustion engines. When young Douglas McCurdy returned to Baddeck from the University of Toronto with fellow engineering graduate Casey Baldwin, a critical mass of innovative and technical brilliance had amassed in the sleepy town of Baddeck.

It was Mabel Bell – Alexander's wife – who initially pitched the idea of an association. So convinced was she that this group of men

could accomplish great things that in July 1907, she sold a large family property and do-

minated twenty thousand dollars of the proceeds to fund aircraft design and materials. So it was that in October 1907 Alexander Graham Bell formed the Aerial Experiment Association to include himself, McCurdy, Baldwin, Selfridge and Curtiss with the purpose of constructing a practical aerodrome and a flying machine driven through the air by its own power, carrying a man. Although simple by today's standards, the association's mission was – at the time – visionary when you consider that previous Wright Brother designs were launched from catapults to achieve flight, had limited endurance and control once in the air and returned to the earth on skids.

The Aerial Experiment Association began work in earnest – at first continuing Bell's work on gliders and kites – and later on aircraft. The first of these aircraft was called *Red Wing* – so named because Bell used the red cloth he had purchased for his kites to stretch over the sur-

face of the aircraft wings. *Red Wing* was designed by Glenn Curtiss and was constructed and flown for the first time in March 1908 in Upper State New York. *Red Wing* was initially piloted by Casey Baldwin thus distinguishing the young engineer as the first Canadian in history to fly a heavier than air vehicle although not in his native country.

When *Red Wing* crashed several weeks later, planning was already underway for the next production of the Aerial Experiment Association called *White Wing*. This second aircraft was so named because of the white fabric that replaced the earlier red kite cloth for the wings. The brainchild of Casey Baldwin, *White Wing* was produced in May 1908 and has the distinction of being the first aircraft designed and flown by a Canadian albeit outside of Canada. Shortly after *White Wing* crashed, the association finalized work on *June Bug*. This aircraft was so named because – according to Bell – it looked like a June Bug in flight and



because it was constructed in June 1908. *June Bug* was the second design by Glenn Curtiss and was flown by all members of the association excluding Bell.

The *Silver Dart* is arguably the most famous of the Aerial Experiment Association designs because of its significance to Canadian aviation history. Ironically, the aircraft was initially assembled and flown in Hammondsport New York in July 1908, seven

months before the famous Canadian milestone. It wasn't until January 1909 that the *Silver Dart* was disassembled and shipped to Baddeck for its eventual Canadian debut on 23 February 1909.

The *Silver Dart* was Douglas McCurdy's first design-to-operation effort and introduced a number of significant innovations including tricycle style landing gear, a water-cooled engine and aileron flight controls. These innova-

tions permitted the Silver Dart to take off on its own power, sustain reasonably controlled flight and then land and taxi to a place of its choosing. Today we take these simple designs concepts for granted but, at that time, the ability of the Aerial Experiment Association to achieve its stated mission on that fateful day in Baddeck was ground breaking for more than just Canadians. Their work served as the foundation for aircraft design world-wide from that point forward.

It's easy to accept Canada's first powered flight as a major milestone in our aviation history. It is perhaps more of a challenge to trace the important first steps that preceded that landmark event on lac Bras d'Or some 100 years ago. If one looks closely, Canadians should recognize that they owe a great deal to the persuasive powers of Mabel Bell, the vision of Alexander Graham Bell and the collective genius of the Aerial Experiment Association.

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For the Birds

Congratulations to those who are regularly cleaning their bird feeders and the surrounding grounds to prevent the spread of disease and optimizing feed storage.

4Jun09, Gary Myers wrote: "Our tree Swallows came for a short visit, they were last here 30Apr. They looked the house over and left again. We have had a nesting pair every year for a number of years but last year they abandoned the nest with six eggs in it. There were Cedar Waxwings feeding on apple blossoms for a short time this morning and all day I watched Eastern Tiger Swallowtail butterflies flitting around the lilacs." Cedar Waxwing's diet includes seeds, fruit, insects, sap and other glucose sources. Gary's "feeding on apple blossoms" must be investigated. In 1983 Barbara and I purchased a home in Kingston that included 2, properly designed Swallow nest-boxes positioned under the eaves near convenient, perching facilities e.g. telephone lines and mature tree branches. For several

years we enjoyed the sight and sound of swallow families caring for and monitoring their offspring through the fledging process. It took a few years to realize that their final day in flight school was a ritual which included the adults and 'new fliers' perching, side by side, on the telephone line and all departing, simultaneously, for the last time until the next year. They only used the nest boxes during that, "required", period of their life family's life cycle. Each spring I removed the roofs, gave the boxes a good cleaning and then waited for the fascinating, delightful, annual cycle to repeat itself. (Swallows will not use an unclean nest box, if the box contains a small amount of waste and old nest material they will clean it out and provide new nest material, if they will find another site.) Then, one year, we noticed Black-capped Chickadees coming and going from the swallow boxes, we could see they were bringing nesting material and we assumed this would be of no consequence when the swallows arrived. Wrong! The Swallow male

and female returned within a day of each other, perched on the telephone line watching the Chickadees throughout the day, about 24 hours of this, the Swallows left and never returned. Years later we removed the unused boxes.

Mick and Barbara McKnight saw a flotilla of 8 male, Wood Ducks in the Black River near their home. The previous evening 2 females were sighted so it is possible that there are nest cavities in the area! Barbara saw 7 Black or Mallard chicks earlier in the week.

Betty Donovan wanted us to know that Lee Valley's, "Warning Web" has been doing an excellent job of preventing the birds from striking their windows. If you go to Lee Valley's website, choose, "Gardening", then "Birding" you will find it.

In Victoriavale, Susan Curtis wrote: "I think I had a

Northern Flicker in my yard yesterday morning. Brown body, greyish, head with a bright red patch, white and black belly and yellow under the wings and tail feathers. I wondered why he was digging around the ground near my flower gardens; he can have all the ants he wants." The Northern Flicker, yellow-shafted form, is the species we see; it has yellow underwing plumage; the male has a black, malar (moustache) stripe, both genders have a red, nape, crescent. There are concerns about their population diminishing as they compete for habitat, particularly nest cavities, with the European Starling.

Sheila Hulford reports: "Just the regular feeder birds at my property so far this month, but I saw a lovely sight on June 4 at the bridge near the Falcourt Inn in Nictaux. There were two Canada Geese crossing the road and

between them there were four goslings. They all made it safely to the other side of the road and down the grass towards the river."

At the mouth of the Nictaux River, Ted Kajdas saw a C. Goose with a broken wing; however, it was able to feed itself. Near Black's Brook, Ted watched a Painted Turtle laying her eggs.

Enroute to taking her two children to the school bus stop, our daughter, Pamela left a bowl of homemade, Italian

chicken, vegetable soup, covered in Saran Wrap, on top of the green bin. Considered to be too old for human consumption the soup was destined for the green bin once the children were safely on the bus. Returning after about 5 minutes Pamela observed two departing crows, the bowl was intact, Saran punctured, the soup completely consumed! Gourmet, Denby respectful, Crows? 405 (LRP) Squadron Deploys to South West Asia

The CP-140 Aurora patrol aircraft has evolved from not only being a premier Anti Submarine Warfare (ASW) platform but also to one of the most versatile aircraft in the Canadian Forces. Within the last few years the aircraft and crews have conducted sovereignty missions to the north, fishery patrols on the three coasts of Canada, search and rescue missions, drug interdiction operations with federal and international authorities, civil aid missions, participated in major Canadian Forces operations and of course ASW.

405 (LRP) Squadron (Sqn) has throughout its history had many first's. In WWII the squadron was the first and only Canadian squadron to become a member of the elite PATH-FINDER Squadron's. These squadrons, including 405 Sqn, often lead the way for others to carry out their missions against the enemy forces. More recently, we were the first to

ement of Op Athena.

As with any deployment, the required aircraft maintenance support elements are in place. Technician crews from 14 AMS in Greenwood and 407 Sqn Comox have the demanding role of keeping the aircraft serviceable so the aircrew can carry out the 30 planned missions to meet the mapping re-

quirements as directed by 1 Canadian Air Division before their departure date. With the new Applanix camera on board, crews then had to familiarize themselves with the camera operation and how to best

navigate the aircraft to ensure accurate, precise imagery. This training was conducted in Ottawa using an Aurora from 19 Wing Comox. Aircrews and technicians met, worked and flew with for the first time with

the MCE personnel, developing procedures and fine tuning all aspects of operations for the planned imagery missions. Upon return to their respective Wings and squadrons both crews had a myriad of planning and confirming to finalize prior to their departure. Flight profiles, airspace requirements, airdromes within the area of operations, radio frequencies and callsigns, aircraft parts, survival gear, medicals, dentals, clothing requirements and a long list of other items which certainly included time with family and friends. During this same time period endless emails, phone calls and conferences were held by senior personnel to ensure all the logistical and administrative support required for the detachment was secured, not an easy task. The detachment advance party de-

parted one week before the next group arrived and worked endless hours to ensure a smooth transition from operations in Canada to operations from our host nation.

68 personnel, under the command of 405 Sqn CO, LCol Jim Irvine, were in place by early May. The 2 CP-140 Aurora's with the Applanix camera's installed were flown to our location by support crews from 405 and 407 LRP Sqn's. The first mission of a projected 30 in the Aurora's role of Op Athena was successfully flown May 13th by 405 Sqn Crew 1. Excellent imagery was captured and the tireless effort put forward by all members of the detachment had been finally substantiated – another operational success for the CP-140 Aurora, 405 Sqn and the entire detachment. operationally fly the newly fitted Block 2 CP-140 Aurora while conducting drug interdiction flights in South America. Now as the lead Vanguard crew we will fly the first Aurora missions in support of Op Athena in Afghanistan. Events such as this solidify the squadron's motto: DUCIMUS - WE LEAD.

The operational tasking is to provide high quality image mapping of Afghanistan, which will provide significantly updated geographical and structural information to strategic and tactical commanders located in the Afghan theatre of operations. This will ultimately aid the troops on the ground in the success of their missions. Two Block One Aurora's from Comox and two crews, one from 405 Long Range Patrol (LRP) Sqn located here at 14 Wing Greenwood and the other from 407 (LRP) Sqn 19 Wing Comox, BC have deployed to South West Asia to join the Theatre Support El-

ements of Op Athena commanders. Any unservicabilities means conducting repairs in 30 C to 50 C temperatures. With this mission we are working very closely, for the first time, with military and civilian personnel from the Canadian Forces Mapping and Charting Establishment (MCE) located in Ottawa. This group of professional, dedicated personnel are responsible for the overall operation of the high tech camera on board the aircraft as well as the precise development and reconstruction of all the images produced from the missions.

Training for this operation began well before the scheduled deployment dates. Initially the Vanguard aircrews and technicians from both Wings had to complete the readiness training requirements needed by all personnel prior to deploying overseas. As well each of the aircrews had to complete a series of crew

First Air Force Run Starts Off On the Right Foot

More than 1,000 military and civilian runners, walkers and spectators braved the chilly morning weather and gathered at 17 Wing Winnipeg, Man., on May 31 to participate in the first annual Air Force Run.

"It's a wonderful start to a brand new Air Force tradition," said Lieutenant-General Angus Watt, Chief of the Air Staff, who ran the 10-kilometre race and presented gold medals to the race winners. "I hope in years to come that it will continue to grow as we celebrate our culture of fitness and provide support to the Military Families Fund and Soldier On."

Air Force Run participants had a choice between a five-kilometre family fun run, a five-kilometre race, a ten-kilometre race, and a half marathon. The event was held to encourage fitness among the Canadian Forces (CF) members, connect with the community, and support the Military Families Fund and Soldier On. The Military Families Fund provides financial support to military families during times of need and can be "distributed within hours" of a crisis, according to Bert LeBlanc, who gave a presentation about the organization at the Air Force Run pasta dinner on Saturday night.

Similarly, Warrant Officer Andrew McLean gave a presen-

tation at the dinner about Soldier On, an organization that helps ill and injured CF personnel and veterans "maintain an active lifestyle through recreation and sport."

Race day on Sunday morning featured three flypasts, two jumps above the crowd from search and rescue technicians, and the live music of the Air Command Band. Due to the uniqueness of the route, all race participants also had the opportunity to run across the 17 Wing tarmac alongside a, a Bell 412 helicopter a CC-130 Hercules, a CT-114 Tutor, a CP-140 Aurora, and a CT-142 Dash-8. Before the races began, Colonel Scott Howden, Commander of 17 Wing, also received a special Air Command Commendation and Insignia from LGen Watt for supporting the event and encouraging physical fitness at his Wing.

Geography and a desert deployment did not deter a group of more than 240 CF members and their multi-national allies in Afghanistan who also laced up their running shoes and

held their own race in support of the Winnipeg event.

Capt Justin Boileau, who organized the Air Force Run with the assistance of Officer Cadet Jennifer Doornink, said he was particularly pleased by the strong participation of non-military members. "It emphasizes the fact that we are one team as Canadians and that we work together," he added. "In this case, our shared goal is maintaining a healthy lifestyle."

In addition to the hundreds of civilians who participated in the Run, the Air Force Run organizing committee received some help from the Personnel Support Programs (PSP) and the Manitoba Runners' Association, who promoted the Run to their members and made it one of their ASICS Grand Prix Series races.

Noel Paine of Ottawa won the five-kilometre race with a time of 18:27; **Brendan Cook of Greenwood took the top honours in the 10-kilometre race with a time of 38:52**, and Jorge Parra of Vancouver claimed first place in the half marathon with a time of 1:19:01.

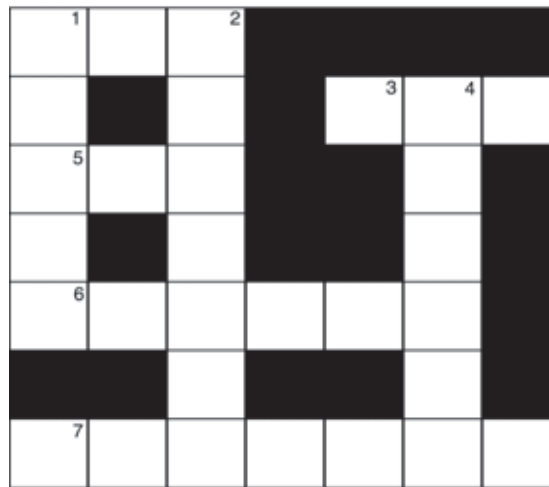
