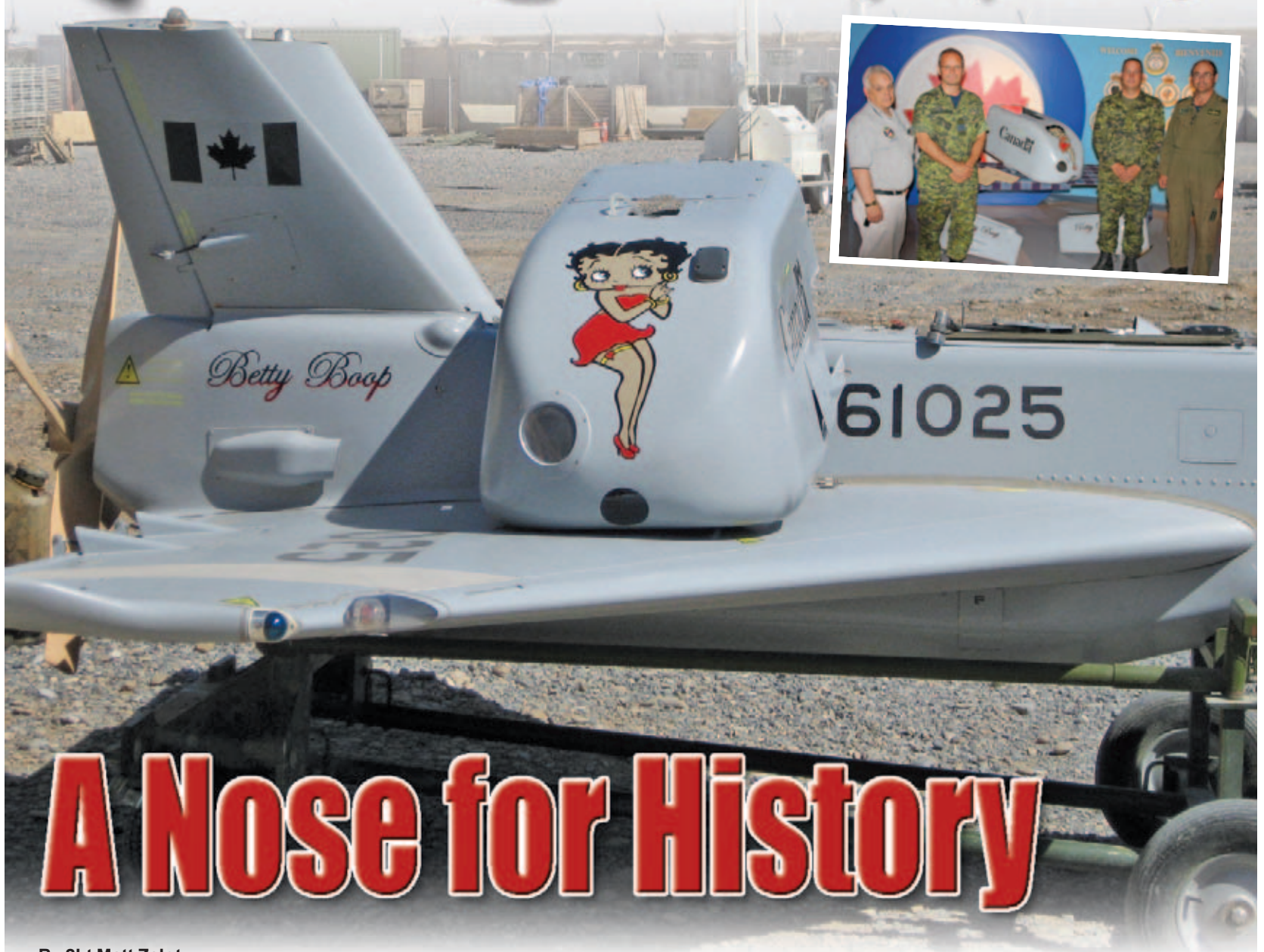

A Nose for History

To be a worthy museum exhibit, an aircraft need not necessarily be ancient nor have a storied past, but it certainly must be a conversation piece in order to successfully attract interest. The decorated nose cone of one of Canada's recently retired Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) certainly meets this requirement, and, thanks to the foresight of 14 Wing Supply's Sergeant Ernest White, this Betty Boop-themed aircraft component will now have a permanent home at the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum.

The aircraft piece in question was part of a CU-161 Sperwer UAV, a three-metre drone aircraft replaced by the IAI Heron UAV. Never meant to be a permanent surveillance solution, the remaining Sperwer aircraft were recently sold to the French armed forces, except for those pieces "marred" by paint and other decaling. (The Canadian fleet, aside from Betty Boop, also featured the Road Runner and the Energizer Bunny.)

Sgt White, who worked with the Sperwer while serving as the second-in-command of the quarter-master stores while in Afghanistan on ROTO 4 (2007-2008), realized the future historical value of the now unwanted components while on a tactical assistance visit to Kandahar Airfield this past March. Figuring that the aircraft piece was too important to be simply thrown away, he decided that Betty Boop was a natural fit into the theme of Greenwood's museum, which has an extensive war-time focus, and brought the matter to their attention.

A short and informal photo-op took place on July 29, 2009 which saw the presentation of the cartooned nose cone to the museum staff. Since 14 Wing personnel were involved in the maintenance and operation of the UAV fleet in theatre, the display will allow the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum to properly educate and inform museum guests about the Sperwer and the role it played in Afghanistan. Who's the Parent?

Raising children comes with many joys and challenges that often leave parents asking themselves the question at times "Who's the parent in this house?" One of the greatest advantages that we have when dealing with those challenging times is that we are the parent. Parenting comes with many responsibilities; however it also comes with certain rights and powers. I'm sure many of you can remember hearing your parents use the popular phrase "Because I am the parent" or the simple "Because I said so!" These statements made it very clear to us at an early age that our home was not always a democracy. Sometimes our parent would have to use the "absolute power" when dealing with matters such as dis-

cipline and setting rules. As children we could never quite understand why our parents were so "unreasonable" or so we thought until we had our own children.

As parents we are bigger, wiser, more experienced and have the ability to see the big picture. We are in charge of our house, set the rules and make the final decision on discipline. Being in this position can sometimes create small battles with our children regardless of their age. However, the sooner we teach them to respect our position as parents, the easier it will be for us to raise our children. As difficult as it may be to teach this concept to our five year old who is determined to "be the boss of herself", it is going to be one hundred times more difficult to start parenting the fifteen year old who has never had to learn about your parenting position of power until that moment. This does not mean

that as parents we are always right, sometimes our kids may have a better answer than we do. It simply means that we have the final say on the matter. Again, you are the parent – not your child. There will be times when our reason for saying "No" or for disciplining inappropriate behaviour is because we are the parent, and our decision is based on that fact. We have no pro or con list – we are just using absolute power and saying "No!" Sometimes as parents it is essential that we use that power. Many of us have seen a parent at the grocery store give in to the child who is throwing a tantrum, only because the parent does not know what else to do. At that moment the parent seems to have forgotten that they are the ones in charge – they are the parent, and it is up to them to make sure they stick to their decision.

This does not give parents

permission to be bullies – using punishment as a way to control our children's every moment. The last thing we want to do is dictate our child's every behaviour. Not only would this be exhausting, but it would only lessen our child's voice on issues that they feel strongly about. We want to teach our children to be independent thinkers who also value the importance of respecting others. As parents, we do not need to be our child's best friend, hoping that his may make the parenting a little easier for us. Parents do not need to feel afraid of setting rules or boundaries for our children. We should not expect our children to always like us. Sometimes they are going to become angry and have no idea why we are acting so "unreasonable" – and that is okay.

Children need parents to provide love, structure and rules to live by more than

they need us to be their friend. This makes us at times very unpopular, however, as our children grow and become parents, they too will understand how difficult and rewarding the job of being a parent really is – just like we did. If we try to remember our role in our children's life as being the parent, who on occasion has enforce the rules and discipline inappropriate behaviours during those early years, it will most likely be a great asset to us as become parents to teens.

Unfortunately there is no parenting handbook, and no Coles Notes versions offered to us on the day we bring our little bundles of joy home from the hospital. Parenting is a series of trial and errors. We learn from our own parents, our friends and family and the many resources that we have available to us today. Military Family Resources Centres are a great place for Canadian Forces

Families who are looking for information on parenting challenges. Because CF Families often do not have the luxury of having the support of extended family or friends living close by to lean on during those most challenging parenting moments, your MFRC's are here to help. Our own 14 Wing Library has resource books and videos available to families. As staff of the GMFRC we are always willing to seek out resources in our community that we do not have available here at the centre that will help our CF Families. The GMFRC's mission is simple, "We are committed to supporting and celebrating our unique military family lifestyle." Please stop by our centre at anytime for information on parenting or to share the joys and challenges of being a CF Family with children. Deux soldats canadiens tués et un blessé par un engin explosif

OTTAWA (le 2 août 2009) – Deux soldats canadiens ont été tués et un blessé lorsqu'un engin explosif improvisé a explosé près d'une patrouille dans le district de Zhari. L'incident s'est produit à environ 15 kilomètres à l'ouest de Kandahar City vers 15 h 20, heure de Kandahar, le 1er août 2009.

A été tué le Caporal Christian Bobbitt du 5e Régiment du génie de combat servant à titre de membre de groupement tactique du 2e Bataillon, Royal 22e Régiment, basé à Valcartier, Québec. Les proches du deuxième soldat tué ont été avisés mais ont demandé plus de temps pour informer d'autres membres de la famille. Jusqu'à ce moment, le nom du

deuxième soldat ne sera pas publié.

Le soldat blessé a été évacué par hélicoptère vers l'installation médicale multinationale de rôle 3 à l'aérodrome de Kandahar et il est en condition stable. L'identité du soldat blessé ne sera pas publiée.

Nos pensées et nos condoléances vont aux familles et amis de nos camarades décédés.

Les soldats canadiens et leurs partenaires des FSNA travaillent ensemble pour le plus grand bien de l'Afghanistan. Two Canadian soldiers killed and one injured in an explosive device strike

OTTAWA (August 2, 2009) – Two Canadian soldiers were killed and one injured when an improvised explosive device detonated near a patrol in the Zhari District. The incident occurred approximately 15 kilometres west of Kandahar City at around 3:20 p.m., Kandahar time, on 1 August, 2009.

Killed in action was Corporal Christian Bobbitt from 5e Régiment du génie de combat serving as a member of the 2nd Battalion, Royal 22e Régiment Battle Group based in Valcartier, Quebec. The next of kin for the second soldier killed has been notified; however, they have asked for more time to inform other family members. Until such time,

the name of the second soldier will not be released.

The injured member was evacuated by helicopter to the Role 3 Multi-National Medical Facility at the Kandahar Airfield and is in stable condition. The identity of the injured member will not be released.

Our thoughts and condolences go to the family and friends of our fallen comrades.

Canadian soldiers and their ANSF partners work together for the greater good of Afghanistan. Security operations sometimes require a heavy price to be paid, but the challenge we face cannot deter us from our ultimate goal and commitment we have toward Afghans.

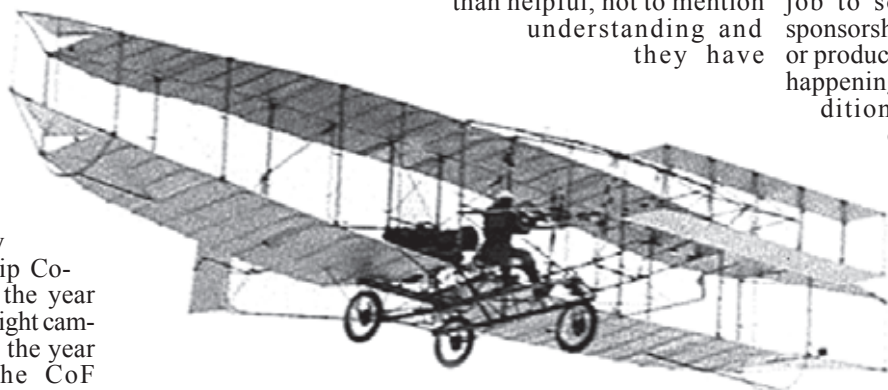
Meet Rod Reeves – 14 Wing Sponsorship Coordinator

Province Reminds Visitors of Road Safety Laws

With the tourism season underway, the province is asking visitors to take note of several laws introduced in the last few years that help to make Nova Scotia's roads safer.

Guides and posters distributed to visitor information centres encourage people to become familiar with laws in each jurisdiction they are visiting.

"We do our best to communicate our laws to the pub-

lic, but we also understand that it's a challenge for tourists to keep up with laws in each province," said Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal Minister Bill Estabrooks. "We encourage visitors to familiarize themselves with our road safety laws, and ask tourism operators to help spread the word."

In April 2007, the province banned the use of hand-held cellphones and text messaging while driving. Hand-held cellphone use is only allowed in emergency situations.

The province also passed new laws that target people who speed in work and school zones. Fines are doubled and demerit points are assigned to a driver's record for

speeding in a work or school zone.

Daytime running lights are now mandatory. If vehicles are not equipped with automatic daytime running lights, drivers are required to use their low-beam headlights during daylight hours. Antique cars are exempt.

The fines, for using a hand-held cellphone while driving or driving without daytime running lights, including court costs, range from \$164.50 for the first offence to \$337.00 for the third and subsequent offences.

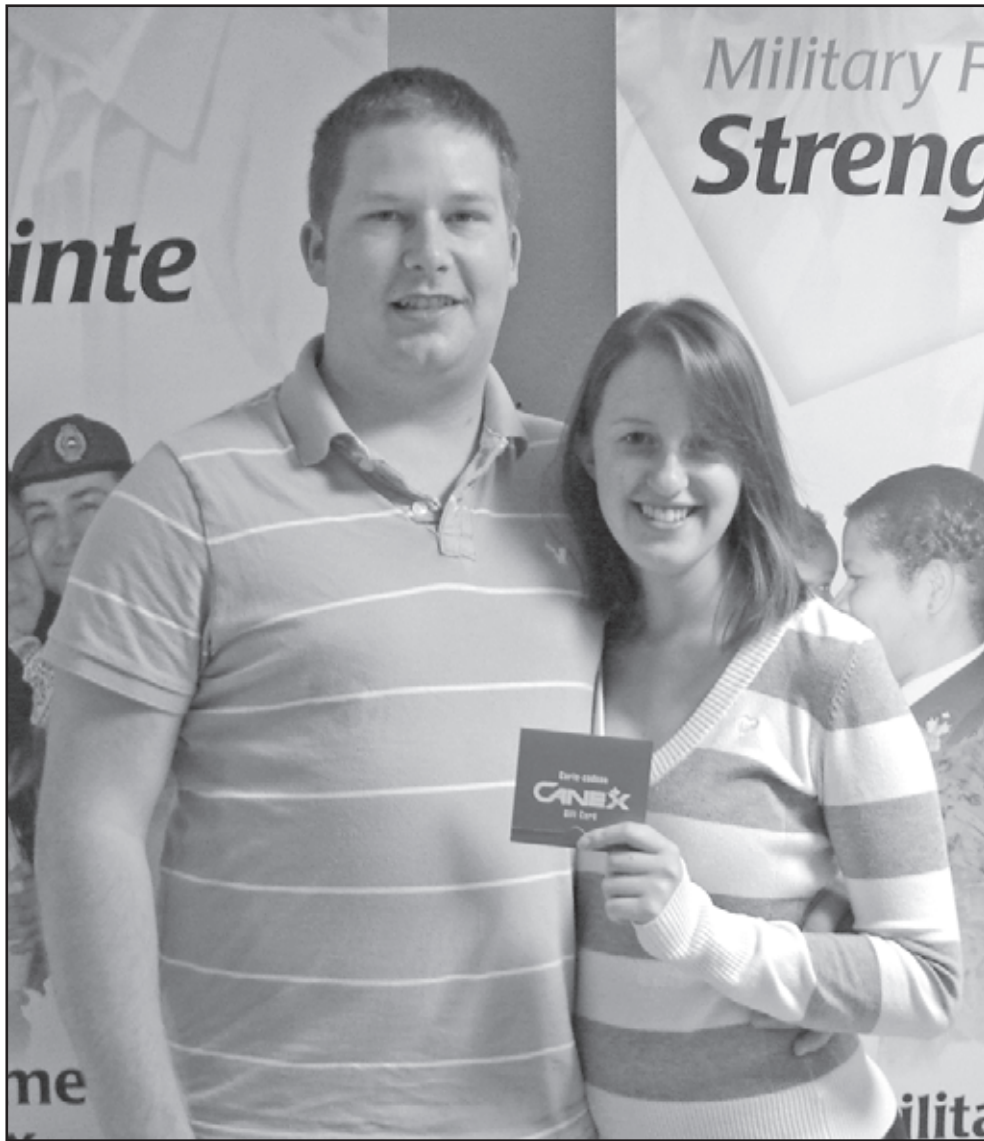

Thousands of fans were at the Garrison Grounds at the foot of Citadel Hill in Halifax on Sunday, August 2 to attend the first ever Canadian Forces Halifax Rock Fest. The mosh pit was crowded with rock fans singing, dancing and waving their hands in the air, while others preferred to chill on the hill, enjoying the sunny day and the scenery along with the music.

"Give a hand to our military," Raine Maida, lead singer of Our Lady Peace, told the crowd, just before his band played one of their newest songs, titled All You Did was Save My Life. Our Lady Peace was one of four bands including Sloan, Finger Eleven, and Chickenfoot, to headline the concert.

"This is so cool," RADM Paul Maddison told the audience. "This city is the best place in Canada to serve in the Canadian Forces."

The Honourable Peter MacKay, Minister of National Defence, joined RADM Maddison onstage and thanked the concertgoers for their support of the rockfest, saying "Halifax knows how to rock, knows how to celebrate and knows how to support the Canadian Forces."

The concert, which started at 2 p.m. and ended shortly before 11 p.m., opened with Pink Thunder, an all-girl rock group from St. Peter's Cape Breton.

Next up was Sloan, the four-man pop band that put Halifax on the music map in the early 1990s. Beefed up with guest musicians Kevin Hiller and Greg McDonald, the band breezed through a set that had the audience singing along with tunes such as The Rest of My Life, and Ready For You.

Finger Eleven blasted through their set, saving their hit Paralyzer for their final song. Veteran rockers

Our Lady Peace delivered a solid set of new and old hits, ranging from Innocent, to several songs from their new CD titled Burn Burn.

Final act of the evening was Chickenfoot, featuring singer Sammy Hagar and

bassist Michael Anthony, both formerly of Van Halen, drummer Chad Smith, formerly of Red Hot Chili Peppers, and guitarist Joe Satriani, known for his work with G3. "We plan on having fun tonight until they make us stop," Hagar told the crowd before launching into a hard-driving block of tunes such as Oh Yeah, Down the Drain, and Sexy Little Thing.

The concert also featured a car giveaway, as New Brunswick resident Christine Reilly became the owner of a Saturn Ion, which she won in the promotional draw in early July.

Between sets, there were video messages delivered from CF members currently serving in deployments

“Fugitive Pieces”

The LCC book club is currently reading *Fugitive Pieces* by Anne Michaels. This is our 35th selection since 2002. All military and civilian members of the Defence Team are invited to read the book with us, and attend our discussion meeting.

From the inside cover:
Fugitive Pieces is the story of Jakob Beer, a Polish Jew, translator, and poet who, as a child, witnessed his family’s slaughter at the

hands of the Nazis. Beer himself was found and smuggled out of Poland by Athos Roussos, a Greek archaeologist who carried him back to Greece and kept him there in precarious safety. After the war they emigrated together to Canada. Jakob’s story is told through diaries discovered by Ben, a young man whose parents are Holocaust survivors and who is a vessel for their memories just as Jakob is the bearer of

his own.
Fugitive Pieces is a book about memory and forgetting. How is it possible to love the living when our hearts are still with the dead? What is the difference between what historical fact tells us and what we remember? More than that, the novel is a meditation on the power of language to free our souls and allow us to find our own destinies.
Discussion points to consider while reading:

1. Jakob says that Athos’s fascination with Antarctica “was to become our azimuth. It was to direct the course of our lives” [33]. Why do you think Antarctica obsessed Athos? How does the story of the Scott expedition relate to that of Athos and Jakob? Do you agree with Jakob that Athos’s fascination directed their lives?
2. “When the prisoners were forced to dig up the mass graves, the dead entered them through their pores and were carried through their bloodstreams to their brains and hearts. And through their blood into another generation” [52]. Jakob writes, and later, “It’s no metaphor to feel the influence of the dead in the world” [53]. How does the theme of the dead’s influence on the living work itself out in the course of the novel?
3. The communist partisans in Greece, who had valiantly resisted the occupying Nazis, themselves committed terrible atrocities after the war, as Kostas and Daphne relate. Do you agree with their theory that violence is like an illness that can be caught, and that the Greeks caught it from the Germans [72]? What other explanations can be offered?
4. What is it about Alex’s character that attracts Jakob and makes him fall in love with her? Why does he eventually find life with her impossible? Do you find Alex a sympathetic character, or an unpleasant one?
5. What does *Fugitive Pieces* say about the condition of being an immigrant? Jakob never feels truly at home anywhere, even in Greece. Ben’s parents feel that their foothold in their new home is infinitely precarious, an emotion that communicates itself to Ben. Does Michaels imply that real integration is impossible?
6. Can you explain the very different reactions Ben’s parents have had to their experience in the Holocaust? What in their characters has determined the differing ways they respond to grief and loss?
7. The relationship between Ben and Naomi is a troubled one. Why is he angry at her for her closeness to his parents and her attention to their graves? Why does he reject her by leaving for Greece without her? How can you explain his intense desire for Petra—is his need purely physical? How do Petra and Naomi differ? What is the significance of their names?
8. Why might Jakob have named his collection of poems *Groundwork*, and in what way does that title relate to his life? Jakob calls his young self a “bog-boy” [5]. Why does Ben take such an interest in the preserved bog people he reads about [221]?
9. The last line of the novel is Ben’s: “I see that I must give what I most need.” What does he mean by this? What does he most need, what will he give, and to whom? We’ve taken the whole summer to complete this selection. Our discussion meeting is scheduled for Thursday, 3 Sep 2009 from 1200-1300 hrs at the LCC. We’re located on the upper level of the Birchall Training Centre, Room 204. Have a great summer!

Historic Aircraft that Played a Significant Role in Canadian Aviation Heritage

De Havilland Canada DHC-3 Otter

In 1950, with their DHC-2 Beaver starting to sell very well and with customers and the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) looking for a larger version of the Beaver, de Havilland began design work on the DHC-3, eventually to be named the Otter. This aircraft was to set new standards for bushplanes in size and range, while keeping the de Havilland reputation for ease of maintenance and utility.

The prototype Otter flew in December 1951, with certification coming in November 1952. It could carry a 4' x 8' sheet of plywood in its cabin. The RCAF bought 69, and the United States Army (390) and Navy (4). Over 20 air forces bought the Otter.

Among commercial users the short take-off and landing capabilities of the Otter, along with its high cargo-carrying capacity, soon won it customers and admiration. By 1960, 12 small airlines and charter services and 6 oil and mining companies were using the Otter in Canada. The aircraft also won favour among civil

operators in other countries, especially Norway where Wideroe Flyveselskap was the first foreign civil customer.

The versatility of the Otter was demonstrated by the diverse climates and uses to which it was put. The RCAF used Otters on United Nations peacekeeping missions in the Congo, Indonesia, the Sinai and Yemen. The RCAF used the Otter for search and rescue work, and general transportation and training. Several nations used

the type during the Antarctic exploration of 1957-58, with the Otter becoming the first single-engine aircraft to cross Antarctica.

Between 1951 and 1967 de Havilland built 466 Otters. Equally adaptable on wheels, skis or floats, the Otter remains as popular as ever, over 40 years after the last one made. Many sold abroad are making their way back to Canada to enter civilian operations here.

De Havilland Canada DHC3 Otter

En 1950, alors que son DHC2 Beaver se met à se vendre très bien et que ses clients et l'Aviation royale du Canada (ARC) désirent une version plus grosse du Beaver, de Havilland commence à concevoir le DHC3, lequel sera nommé Otter par la suite. Cet avion va établir de nouvelles normes sur les plans de la taille et de la distance franchissable pour les avions de brousse et maintenir la ré-

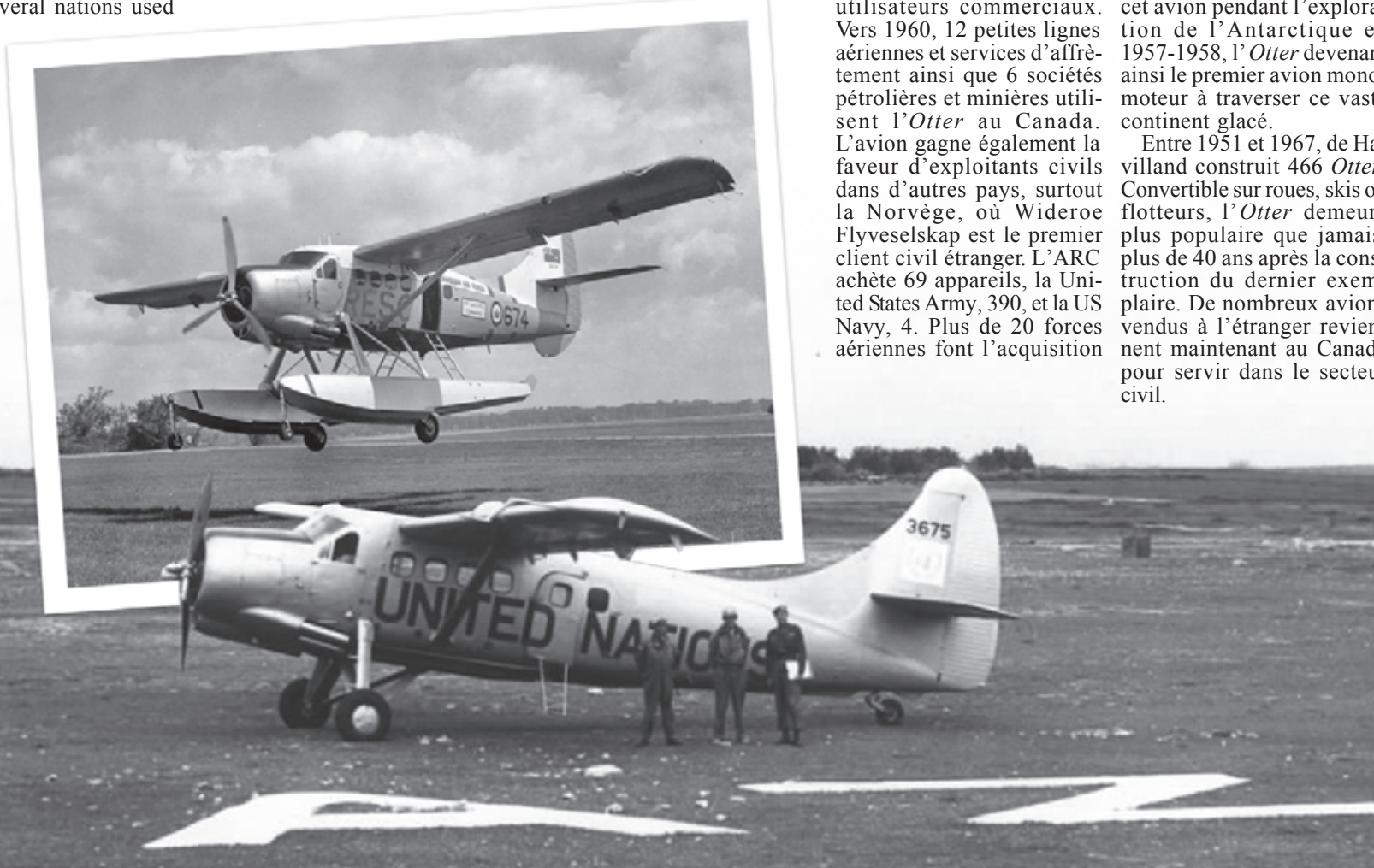
putation de de Havilland en termes de facilité de maintenance et de polyvalence.

Le prototype de l'Otter vole en décembre 1951, et l'avion est certifié en novembre 1952. Les capacités de décollage et d'atterrissage courts de l'Otter, alliées à une grande capacité d'emport (sa cabine peut recevoir une feuille de contreplaqué de 4 pi sur 8 pi), ont tôt fait de lui gagner des clients et de susciter l'admiration parmi les utilisateurs commerciaux. Vers 1960, 12 petites lignes aériennes et services d'affrètement ainsi que 6 sociétés pétrolières et minières utilisent l'Otter au Canada. L'avion gagne également la faveur d'exploitants civils dans d'autres pays, surtout la Norvège, où Wideroe Flyveselskap est le premier client civil étranger. L'ARC achète 69 appareils, la United States Army, 390, et la US Navy, 4. Plus de 20 forces aériennes font l'acquisition

de l'Otter.


L'Otter montre sa polyvalence sous divers climats et en fonction des diverses tâches qui lui sont confiées. L'ARC utilise des Otter dans des missions de maintien de la paix des Nations Unies au Congo, en Indonésie, dans le Sinaï et au Yémen. L'ARC se sert aussi de l'Otter en recherche et sauvetage, pour des vols de transport en général et pour l'entraînement. Plusieurs pays ont recours à cet avion pendant l'exploration de l'Antarctique en 1957-1958, l'Otter devenant ainsi le premier avion monomoteur à traverser ce vaste continent glacé.

Entre 1951 et 1967, de Havilland construit 466 Otter. Convertible sur roues, skis ou flotteurs, l'Otter demeure plus populaire que jamais, plus de 40 ans après la construction du dernier exemplaire. De nombreux avions vendus à l'étranger reviennent maintenant au Canada pour servir dans le secteur civil.

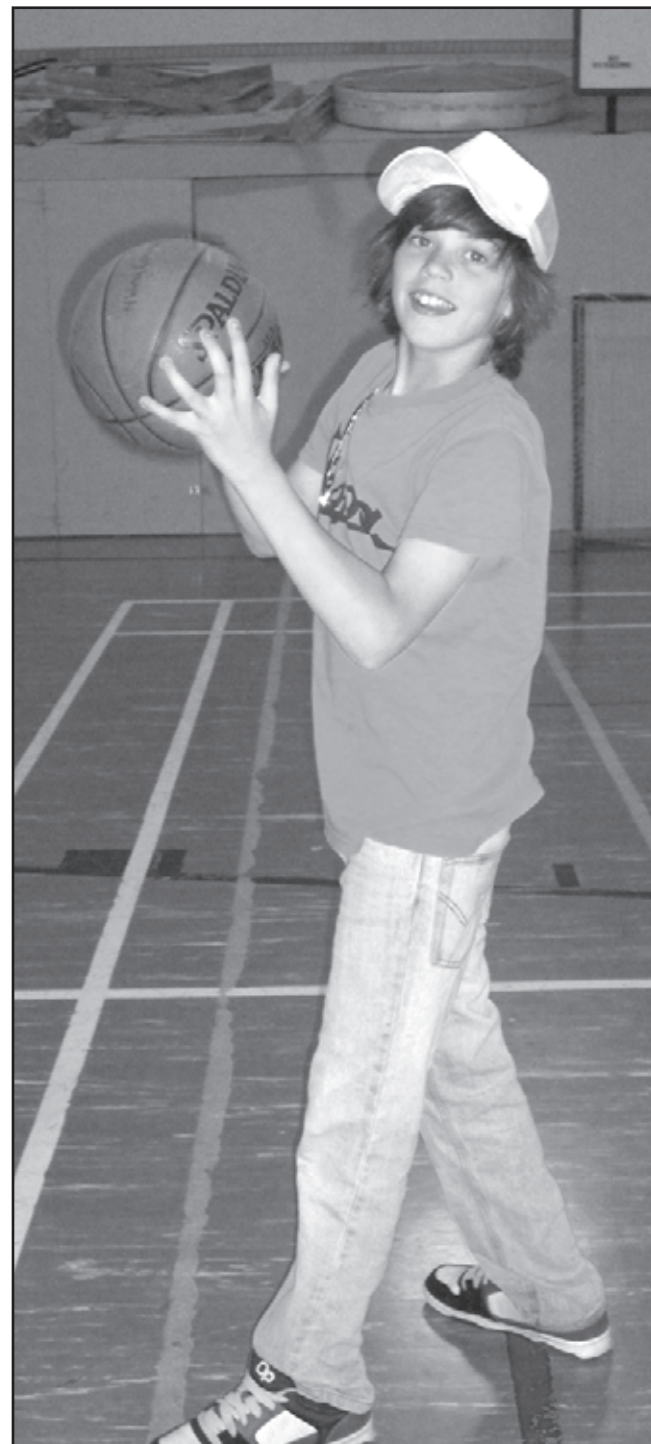

Countertop Stains...

Who has time these days to maintain their home like Mother used to do? If you're time crunched, then consider choosing laminate for your new countertop. This amazing product, which has been greatly improved in recent years, offers a rich and textured look that is the perfect combination of affordability, easy maintenance and long wear. But even the hardest-wearing countertop needs a little care.

In a room where things can go wrong, here are a couple of tips from Countertop.com that will keep you from having to consider replacing your countertop before its time.

Do use a potholder or trivet rather than placing a hot pot directly on the counter. This will prevent it from discolouring or darkening your countertop.

Do use a cutting board instead of cutting directly on the counter. This will prevent scratching your countertop and damaging your knives.

Don't use acidic cleaners or abrasive pads on your countertops. They will damage any countertop surface, including laminate.

Because we know that stains do happen, here are some helpful tips found on Countertop.com/care to keep your laminate surfaces looking their best.

Cleaning your kitchen countertop is a snap. All it takes is a little mild soap or detergent and a damp sponge or cloth after meals.

If you find a stubborn stain from coffee, tea or red wine, take slighter stronger approach. A mild all-purpose household cleaner applied with a little elbow grease and a soft bristled brush will quickly remedy the problem.

If a stain really persists, use a thick paste of baking soda and water and apply with a soft bristled brush. Light scrubbing for 10 to 20 strokes should remove most stains. (Yes, you do have to count). Although baking soda is a low abrasive, excess scrubbing or exerting too much force could mar the countertop's surface, so be gentle. This procedure should not be used on laminate with a gloss finish.

The most stubborn stains may resist these methods. In that case, try a little undiluted household bleach or nail polish remover on a soft cloth. Better to try this out in an inconspicuous area first. Don't let stand for more than two minutes. Rinse thoroughly with warm water and dry. This process can be repeated if the stain is fading and the color of the laminate is not being affected. Next time, wipe up that stain right away.

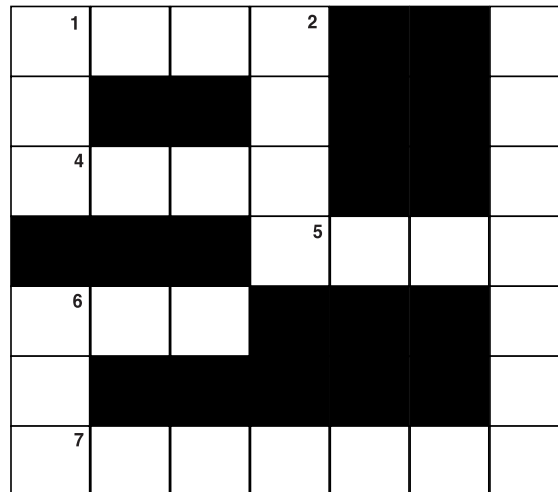

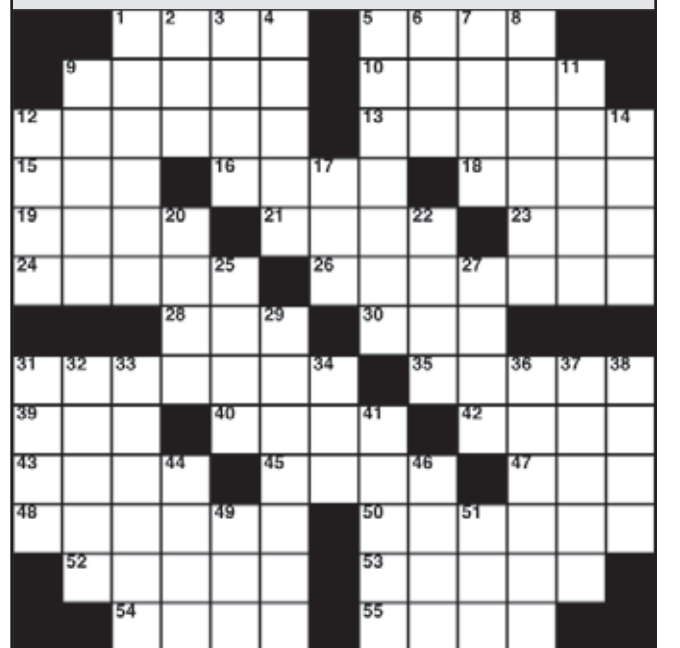

The GMFRC offers Emergency Childcare Services that will assist families during an emergency childcare situation. Our goal is to provide CF families with the tools & resources you need to prepare for the challenges & emergencies this unique lifestyle may bring. In order to support the CF member's ability to be available for operational duty, the family's needs must be acknowledged & identified so we can prepare ourselves for emergency situations. For

those CF families with children, Emergency Childcare Services will offer you the resources you need for emergency preparedness.

This childcare plan is not the same as the "family care plan" form you are required to have on file with your unit. Our Childcare Plan requires more information- is used as a tool in preparing for the family's emergency childcare arrangements- and is kept on file with the GMFRC. We maintain a list of screened, qualified emergency childcare providers who will provide childcare to our military families in the event that

your childcare arrangements are not working. Specifically, we will provide care for the following situations:

- When the CF member is employed/deployed away from home and the spouse/caregiver is unavailable due to illness or any other family emergency
- When the CF member is required to report for duty on short notice and the spouse/usual caregiver is unavailable
- When a single parent or both parents are CF members and they are unable to access the regular childcare provider in a deployment or emergency situation
- When there is illness of a child that would prevent a parent from accessing regular childcare arrangements

for care at a time when the CF member's presence at work is critical to the military operation

- When there is a need for respite childcare due to the total family situation- including the CF member's work commitments
- When there are other circumstances not covered above and childcare is believed to be the solution to the problem (in these cases, approval must be given by the GMFRC Child Youth & Parenting Services Coordinator in consultation with DMFS)

Change We Can Believe In!

Of all the commemorative events planned in 2009 for the hundredth year of powered flight in Canada, the coins that are being designed, minted and distributed to celebrate this anniversary will perhaps be the most treasured keepsakes of the entire Centennial of Flight (CoF) initiative. As you may already know, the CoF Committee has previously produced three eminently-collectable coins and will be producing two more to com-

memorate the ongoing celebrations.

The first coin, produced for the Winter Carnival, depicts the Silver Dart air-

nual 14 Wing Air Force Mess Dinner, depicts the Anson aircraft, of which a recently restored version was presented to the wing. The third, which was released during the Future Flyers weekend in May, depicts the iconic Argus. The remaining two coins will

be made available during upcoming CoF events; the Silver Dart Centennial Weekend on August 14th-16th features the Aurora and will soon be widely available, and the annual Wing Welcome in September will feature the Heron Unmanned Aerial Vehicle and complete the quintet.

These coins are valuable for several reasons. First of all, all the coins are numbered and show the Air Force roundel in use during the aircraft's operational era, which has certainly changed since the days of the nascent Canadian Air Force. They also have all been designed by MP&EU's own Bruce Gormley, a talented graphic artist, who worked with the

goal of creating a souvenir that would encourage people to "collect the whole set." But the coins also serve as partial payment for entry into the Big Band Throw-Back Dance at 14 Wing Combined Mess on the night of August 15th, meaning that if you purchase a coin for \$5, admission to the dance is \$5, instead of \$10.

It's not every day that we at 14 Wing Greenwood have

such an opportunity to connect with the past, so everyone is encouraged to take a look at these coins themselves and reflect on the importance of 100 years of flight during all of the continuing festivities.
