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Base meets challenges Huddleston takes on 'go-to' wing

Fourteen years at 14 Wing – out-going Wing Commander Colonel Jim Irvine wrapped up his base life July 18, passing command of CFB and 14 Wing Greenwood both to incoming Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston.

"Greenwood has been a great home for my family – I love the region, the base and admire and have the deepest

respect for all the people in and around the base."

Irvine said Greenwood's "Operate as One" motto can be seen in many of the things "this wing made happen" through his two years of command.

"This wing has worked as a team far more than I could have expected, given our resources. We supported operations, our people and we started infrastructure projects that will sustain the wing for

years to come. We've also had an awful lot of fun."

Irvine specifically mentioned an increased awareness on the wing of the impact annual Combined Charities work has on the community: \$90,000-plus in 2011, and \$127,000-plus in 2012. He thanked community partner leaders present for their support of base personnel: "it does not go unnoticed."

Operationally, he called Greenwood the proven "go-

to" wing following long range patrol work through Operation MOBILE, continuing and demanding "yeoman's work" at 413 Transport and Rescue Squadron, CP140 maintenance achievements and the completion of the "lion's share" of Block III enhancements.

"Everything within the power of this wing to complete has been completed," Irvine said.

Success sounds like second Sunset Ceremony

14 Wing Greenwood hosted its 2nd Sunset Ceremony August 7, a resounding success with perfect summer weather.

The Sunset Ceremony is one of the many Canadian military traditions that play an integral role in the Canadian Armed Forces, making us proud and strong. Historically, the ceremony marked the end of the service day and closing of the gates of a walled city. Three distinct ceremonies define the sunset: the ancient ceremony of beating Retreat, the Tattoo and the lowering of the National Flag of Canada at sunset.

At 7 p.m., the 78th Highlanders' drummers beat the Retreat, followed by a short demonstration by 3rd Brigade of the Royal Artillery, firing their six-pound canon. A myriad of music filled the air, performed by the Pipes & Drums of the RCMP, Nova Scotia Highlanders, both 12 and 14 Wing and the Brass and Reed Bands from the Bridgewater Fire Department and 14 Wing.

Spectators were visually entertained by the RCMP Highland Dancers and the 78th Highlanders' 1860s drill and tactics demonstration, enthralled when the 78th repeatedly fired its Snider

rifles and the 3rd Brigade supported with repeated canon fire in a mock skirmish.

Upon completion of the 14 Wing bands' serenade, a 413 Transport and Rescue Squadron CH149 Cormorant helicopter made an appearance, demonstrating its agility and grace as it saluted the crowd with two flypasts while the Royal Canadian Navy's Stadacona Band marched on for its performance. The Stadacona Band was later joined by the Bridgewater and 14 Wing brass and reed bands; all the pipers then returned and joined 14 Wing Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston for the sunset salute.

During the lowering of the national flag, a CC130 Hercules from 413 Squadron honoured the country with two flypasts, one during the massed bands' Amazing Grace. The event came to a close with the haunting resonance of a lone piper forewarning lights out for this year's Sunset Ceremony.

As part of the event, the base's Wing Charities committee hosted a BBQ and 50/50 draw, both a success: \$989.45 was collected at the BBQ freewill offering, and the 50/50 brought in \$190 total. Scotiabank in Greenwood will match the \$1,084.45 total, to bring the sum to \$2168.90.

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La base relève les défis

Le col Irvine remet la 14^e Escadre entre les mains du col Huddleston

Après quatorze ans passés à la 14^e Escadre, le colonel Jim Irvine, commandant sortant, a tourné la page sur sa vie à la base, le 18 juillet, en passant le commandement de la BFC et de la 14^e Escadre Greenwood au colonel Iain Huddleston.

« Greenwood a été un lieu de vie exceptionnel pour ma famille. J'aime la région, j'aime la base, et j'ai le plus grand respect et la plus grande admiration pour les gens de la base et des alentours » a déclaré le col Irvine.

Et d'ajouter que la devise de Greenwood « Unis dans

l'action » transparaît dans les résultats du travail qui a été accompli à l'escadre pendant ses deux années de commandement.

« Cette escadre a affiché une solidarité au-delà de mes espérances, compte tenu des ressources dont elle dispose. Nous avons appuyé les opérations et nos gens, et nous avons entamé des projets d'infrastructure dont l'escadre bénéficiera pendant de longues années. Nous avons aussi eu beaucoup de plaisir. »

Le col Irvine a mentionné particulièrement la prise de conscience accrue des répercussions sur la communauté de la Campagne pour les

œuvres de bienfaisance groupées de la 14^e Escadre, qui a rapporté plus de 90 000 \$ en 2011 et plus de 127 000 \$ en 2012. Il a remercié les leaders des organismes communautaires partenaires qui étaient présents pour leur soutien au personnel de la base, précisant que leur travail « n'est pas passé inaperçu ».

Sur le plan opérationnel, il a qualifié Greenwood d'escadre « sur laquelle on peut compter » grâce au travail de patrouille à long rayon d'action de l'Opération MOBILE, au travail exigeant et exceptionnel que font en permanence les membres du 413^e Escadron de transport et de sauvetage, au travail des équipes de maintenance du CP 140 et à l'achèvement de la « part du lion » des améliorations de la phase III.

« Tout ce que l'escadre pouvait accomplir a été accompli » a-t-il dit.

La major-général Pierre St-Amand, officier réviseur et commandant de la 1^{re} Division aérienne du Canada, a félicité le col Irvine pour la réussite de l'équipe de Greenwood, en soulignant que les membres d'une équipe doivent être bien dirigés et motivés, et qu'on doit leur

donner les moyens de faire du bon travail. « Cela n'a pas été facile et je sais que la tâche a demandé un grand investissement de votre part et de la part de votre famille. Félicitations, colonel Irvine, pour votre grande réussite. » a-t-il ajouté.

Le colonel Huddleston est heureux de revenir à Greenwood, où il a fait « ses premières armes en tant que pilote » alors qu'il n'était « encore qu'un novice ».

« Jim Irvine me laisse des aviateurs, mais aussi quelques soldats et membres de la Marine optimistes, tournés vers l'avenir et pleins d'ardeur au travail. Vous avez placé la barre très haut, et je ferai de mon mieux pour les commander avec le même enthousiasme et la même passion que vous. 405 Pathfinders reunite with aviation, Aurora legend

405 (Long Range Patrol & Training) Squadron was recently invited to participate in Nunavut Days celebrations held in Iqaluit, Baffin Island, Nunavut July 9.

Along with a CC130 Hercules from 413 Squadron and a CF18 from 425 Squadron Bagotville, local residents were treated to a flying display in the morning and static displays of all three aircraft in the afternoon. The crew welcomed approximately 300 visitors for a tour of the aircraft, answering questions, handing out RCAF "swag" and posing for numerous pictures.

The deployment to Canada's North was not just a show and tell, but a working trip as well. In support of Operation QIMMIQ, the CP140 conducts routine patrols of the Arctic at various times throughout the year. After leaving Iqaluit, the crew paid a visit to various communities stretching from Rankin Inlet, Nunavut to Yellowknife, North

West Territories. Enjoying some downtime and a bit of the plus-25 degree sunny weather in Yellowknife led the crew to a fortunate meeting with a Canadian aviation legend and true pioneer of the Aurora fleet; Colonel (or as he prefers, Captain (Navy)) David Tate, now retired. Tate joined the Royal Canadian Navy in 1950, starting a long and illustrious career in aviation flying the Hawker Sea Fury. Graduation from the Empire Test Pilot School in Wiltshire, England came with a posting to Cold Lake, Alberta. Not very many pilots nowadays can say they wore metal boot spurs to their aircraft, but Tate was one of these frontline, elite airmen. The boot spurs were connected to the ejection seat and, required when flying the CF104 Starfighter. If you had to "punch out," they ensured your legs joined you for the ride. Tate commanded Canadian Forces Base Moose Jaw from 1976 to 1979, followed by a posting to Lockheed Aircraft Manufacturing Corporation in Burbank, California as detachment commander and CP140 Aurora program manager. He was responsible to the associate deputy minister for the Aurora program implementation, and led Canada's interests in the manufacture, assembly, customer test flight, aircraft and simulator final acceptance. He was on board the first CP140 delivered to Greenwood and, when the final Aurora left the Lockheed assembly plant for Canada, Tate followed with it, retiring in 1981 after having served 31 years and having flown 55 different aircraft types. The Canada Aviation and Space Museum produced a documentary spotlighting aviators who made a mark on Canada's aviation history. 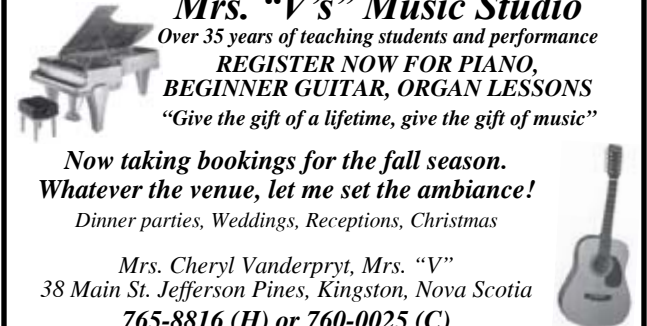
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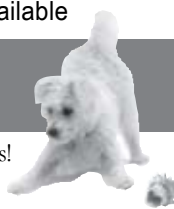


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All about Aldershot

Kennedy leaves command of 'complicated' Army resource

You could forgive Major Troy Kennedy for being super comfortable and proud of his Camp Aldershot team, but he admits he loves clichés.

"It's great to be king!"

Kennedy leaves the camp in August after arriving in April 2010 – but you have to look back even farther to see how far he's really come.

"I was born in Annapolis Royal, I went to Acadia University and I was stationed here in 1986 with the West Nova Scotia Regiment. I started here, and I needed to know what Aldershot was doing now."

What he found was a great opportunity to get the message out about what Camp Aldershot is: home for several traditional, Nova Scotian Reserve regiments, a summer training centre for the Canadian Army and

Cadets, an international school for military officers, a training ground for the Royal Canadian Navy, RCMP and police forces;

and a small, but valuable lynchpin for Land Force Atlantic and the Canadian Army.

"There are hundreds of

people that live within a half-mile of the camp, and have no idea what we do other than make loud noises and shine

lights in the sky at night! I urge people to go downtown in their uniform, we've held open houses, we earned the keys to the Town of Kentville last year, and supported community events like Relay for Life, Special Olympics and others; we've had radio spots featuring our people. I've worked hard - and I said I was going to do it - to get the message out here about Camp Aldershot."

Kennedy knows Aldershot is a great resource – "and we're recognized.

"There will always be people who look at the bottom line but, the reality is, we have 11,000 people go through here every year – there are 600 people in camp today alone."

With about 80 regular staff, Kennedy manages the needs of all these "customers." While the camp is maintained by CFB Greenwood, all its operations run through Kennedy's office.

In the last few years, non-glamorous but essential infrastructure improvements have been made in the camp's waste water treatment system, the range control building and a few other site buildings, classroom refurbishing, quarters for summer staff and a new obstacle course.

"Sometimes we didn't get what we wanted, but we got what we needed. We have the plans in place, we're flexible – and it can't all work."

This was Kennedy's first command job, "and it was absolutely the best job ever.

"We're complicated, yes, and I didn't get to do everything. Did I leave enough to last as a legacy? I don't know, but morale is good, life is interesting and I've had a blast.

"I was the right guy at the right time in the right place – and I wanted this job. It's bittersweet to leave."



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Tout sur Aldershot

Le major Kennedy quitte le commandement d'une structure « compliquée » de l'Armée

On pourrait reprocher au major Troy Kennedy d'être excessivement satisfait et fier de son équipe du Camp Aldershot, mais il assume et avoue adorer les clichés.

« C'est génial d'être roi! »

Le major Kennedy quittera, en août, le camp où il est arrivé en avril 2010, toutefois, sa relation avec le camp remonte à bien plus longtemps.

« Je suis né à Annapolis Royal, j'ai étudié à l'Université Acadia et j'étais basé ici en 1986 avec le West Nova Scotia Regiment. C'est ici que j'ai fait mes premiers pas. Il fallait que je sache ce qu'était devenu Aldershot. »

Le major Kennedy a trouvé une occasion idéale de faire savoir ce qu'était vraiment le Camp Aldershot, à savoir la base d'attache de plusieurs régiments traditionnels de la Réserve en Nouvelle-Écosse, un centre d'instruction d'été

pour l'Armée canadienne et les cadets, une école internationale pour les officiers, un terrain d'entraînement pour la Marine royale canadienne, la GRC et divers corps de police, et un point d'ancrage – modeste mais indispensable – pour le Secteur de l'Atlantique et pour l'Armée canadienne.

« Il y a des centaines de personnes qui vivent à moins d'un kilomètre du camp et qui n'ont aucune idée de ce que nous faisons, à part émettre des bruits assourdissants et éclairer le ciel la nuit! Je pousse nos gens à aller en ville en uniforme, nous avons organisé des opérations portes ouvertes, nous avons obtenu les clés de la ville de Kentville l'année dernière et nous appuyons les événements communautaires comme le Relay for Life et les Jeux olympiques spéciaux, entre autres. Nos gens ont aussi participé à des émissions de radio. J'ai travaillé très fort – j'avais dit que je le

faisais – pour faire connaître le Camp Aldershot dans la région. »

Le major Kennedy sait que le Camp Aldershot est une structure précieuse. « Et nous sommes reconnus à notre juste valeur » affirme-t-il.

« Il y a toujours quelqu'un qui ne voit que l'aspect financier mais, dans les faits, pas moins de 11 000 personnes passent ici chaque année. Rien qu'aujourd'hui, il y a 600 personnes. »

Avec un effectif permanent de 80 personnes, le major Kennedy répond aux besoins de tous ces « clients ». Le camp est dirigé par la BFC Greenwood mais toutes ses opérations sont gérées par le bureau du major Kennedy.

Ces dernières années, des améliorations – peu flamboyantes mais essentielles – ont été apportées au système de traitement des eaux usées, au bâtiment de contrôle du champ de tir et à plusieurs

autres bâtiment du camp; les salles de cours et les locaux destinés au personnel l'été ont été rénovées, et un nouveau parcours à obstacles a été aménagé.

« Nous n'avons pas toujours ce que nous voulons, mais nous avons obtenu ce dont nous avons besoin. Nous avons nos plans mais nous savons nous adapter. On ne peut pas tout avoir. »

Ce commandement était le premier du major Kennedy et le « meilleur emploi de toute [sa] carrière ».

« C'est compliqué, c'est sûr; je n'ai pas pu tout faire. Laisserai-je une marque assez durable au Camp Aldershot? Je ne sais pas, mais le moral est bon, la vie y est agréable et je me suis vraiment "éclaté" ».

« J'étais la personne qu'il fallait, et je me suis trouvé au bon endroit, au bon moment. Et je voulais ce poste. C'est avec un pincement au cœur que je pars. »

Lieutenant-Colonel Heber Gillam may be a hard act to follow as 14 Wing Greenwood's wing administration officer, but whether it's in his professional role, part of the commanding officer's informal band, the Wing Nuts; or as part of an extended "family" of branch agencies is difficult to say.

Gillam turned his duties over to incoming Wing Administration Officer Lieutenant-Colonel Ted Cosstick July 17 in a change of appointment ceremony in the Annapolis Mess. He acknowledged pushing

14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Jim Irvine described Wing Administration's work as "crucial."

"The quality of life in Greenwood is second to none in the Canadian Armed Forces, and I have a deep respect and profound admiration for all your work. Lieutenant-Colonel Gillam demanded top results, he was a caring boss and knew

to look for the best value for money – but the best support for families in the end."

Cosstick said, in all of his pre-command orientation briefings, tours, reports and meetings, it was clear what ties Wing Administration together: "words like 'support,' 'provide,' 'help,' 'sustain,' 'offer,' 'deliver' – it is very evident the principal element in each section is 'enabling.' Sections and staff, through their good work, enable operations and the wing commander to meet his mandate."

La Branche des services « Famille » a un nouveau commandant

Le lieutenant-colonel Heber Gillam peut être difficile à égaliser en tant qu'officier d'administration de la 14^e escadre Greenwood, que ce soit dans ses fonctions professionnelles, comme membre de l'orchestre informel des commandants, les « Wing Nuts », ou comme membre de la « famille » élargie des agences de la Branche.

Gillam a été remplacé par le nouvel officier d'administration de l'escadre, le lieutenant-colonel Ted Cosstick, le 17 juillet, lors d'une cérémonie de passation de pouvoirs, tenue dans le mess Annapolis. Au cours de la cérémonie, Gillam tenait à la main une boîte de papiers-mouchoirs : « il existe un mythe selon lequel il y aurait une boîte de Kleenex

sur mon bureau et que si vous entrez dans mon bureau, quelqu'un va pleurer. Voyons si c'est cas aujourd'hui ».

L'administration de l'escadre s'occupe de tous les services d'aide et de soutien aux militaires et à leurs familles, notamment la solde et les réclamations pour les militaires en service, la santé, la condition physique, la garde d'enfants, la bibliothèque, les services financiers, le camp de jour, le logement et bien d'autres services.

« Notre diversité est notre force. Lorsque cela était nécessaire, nous l'avions fait, en mettant les opérations au premier plan », a affirmé Gillam.

Il a ensuite remercié la collectivité dans son ensemble, car ses fonctions comprennent également le rôle de représentant de la base au sein des comités locaux de santé, des

affaires et du développement.

« Vous m'avez ouvert les yeux sur les liens et les communications entre la base et la collectivité ».

Grâce à l'interaction avec divers syndicats représentant le personnel civil de la 14^e escadre, il en sait plus sur « les avantages des communications ouvertes et honnêtes ».

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Privacy Code for Military Family Services Program

The use of personal information is often necessary for the provision of mandated services to Canadian Armed Forces members and their families. The Director Military Family Services developed the *Privacy Code for Military Family Services Program*. This code contains 10 principles which establish the standard under which MFRCs collect and use personal information about CAF members and their

families, volunteers, staff, etc. It assists MFRCs in protecting the personal information that is provided and/ or collected.

Limiting collection

The collection of personal information shall be limited to that which is necessary for the purposes identified by the MFRC. Information shall be collected by fair and lawful means.

Accountability

MFRCs are responsible for personal information under their control. The director of an MFRC shall be accountable for the MFRC's compliance.

Identifying purposes

The MFRC shall identify the purposes for which personal information is collected at or before the time the information is collected.

Consent

The knowledge and consent of the individual are required for the collection, use or disclosure of personal information, except where inappropriate.

Limiting use, disclosure and retention

Personal information shall not be used or disclosed for purposes other than those for

which it was collected, except with the consent of the individual or as required by law. Personal information shall be retained only as long as necessary for the fulfillment of those purposes.

Accuracy

Personal information shall be as accurate, complete and up-to-date as is necessary for the purposes for which it is to be used.

Safeguards

Personal information shall be protected by security safeguards appropriate to the sen-

sitivity of the information.

Openness

MFRCs shall make readily available to individuals specific information about policies and procedures relating to the management of personal information.

Individual access

Upon request, a member/ family, MFRC staff, or third party shall be informed of the existence, use and disclosure of his or her personal information and shall be given access to that information. An individual shall be able to challenge

the accuracy and completeness of the information and have it amended as appropriate.

Challenging compliance

A member/ family, MFRC staff, or third party shall be able to address a challenge concerning compliance with the above principles to the Director of an MFRC who is accountable for the MFRC's compliance.

L'utilisation de renseignements personnels est souvent nécessaire afin d'offrir les services prévus au mandat aux membres des Forces armées canadiennes et à leurs familles. Le directeur des services aux familles des militaires a élaboré le *Code de protection des renseignements*

personnels à l'usage du Programme des services aux familles des militaires. Ce code contient dix principes qui définissent les standards selon lesquels les CRFM recueillent et utilisent les renseignements personnels des membres des FAC et de leurs familles, des bénévoles, du personnel, etc. Il aide les CRFM à protéger les renseignements personnels qui sont fournis et/ ou recueillis.

Limites de la collecte

Le CRFM ne peut recueillir que les renseignements personnels nécessaires aux fins déterminées par lui et il doit procéder de façon honnête et licite.

Responsabilité

Les CRFM sont responsables des renseignements personnels qu'ils détiennent. Le directeur d'un CRFM aura la responsabilité de s'assurer que le CRFM respecte les principes.

Détermination des fins de la collecte des renseignements

Le CRFM doit déterminer les fins pour lesquelles des renseignements personnels sont recueillis, préalablement ou au moment de la collecte.

Consentement

Toute personne doit être informée et consentir à toute collecte, utilisation ou communication de renseignements personnels qui la concernent, à moins qu'il ne soit pas approprié de le faire.

Limites de l'utilisation, de la communication et de la conservation

Les renseignements personnels ne doivent pas être utilisés ou communiqués à des fins autres que celles auxquelles ils ont été recueillis, à moins que la personne concernée n'y consente ou que la loi ne l'exige. On ne conservera les renseignements personnels qu'aussi longtemps que nécessaire pour l'atteinte des fins déterminées.

Exactitude

Les renseignements personnels doivent être aussi exacts, complets et à jour que l'exigent les fins pour lesquelles ils sont utilisés.

Mesures de sécurité

Les renseignements personnels doivent être protégés au moyen de mesures de sécurité correspondant à leur degré de confidentialité.

Transparence

Le CRFM doit mettre à la disposition de toute personne des renseignements précis sur ses politiques et ses pratiques concernant la gestion des renseignements personnels.

Accès aux renseignements

personnels

Un membre des FAC, une famille ou un tiers qui en fait la demande sera informé de l'existence, de l'utilisation et de la divulgation de renseignements personnels qui le ou la concernent, et il lui sera permis de les consulter. Une personne pourra contester l'exactitude et l'état complet des renseignements, et y faire apporter les corrections appropriées.

Possibilité de porter plainte contre le non-respect des principes

Un membre des FAC, une famille ou un tiers doit être en mesure de se plaindre du non-respect des principes énoncés ci-dessus auprès du directeur d'un CRFM qui est responsable de leur respect par le CRFM.

14 Wing firefighters aid in Kingston call

July 29 and into the early hours July 30, firefighters from across the Annapolis Valley battled a fire at an abandoned paper warehouse in downtown Kingston.

At the request of Kingston Fire Chief Watson Armstrong, 14 Wing Greenwood Fire and Emergency Services also responded with a five-man crew manning one of its 12,000 litre aircraft rescue and fire fighting vehicles, as well as its incident command vehicle; to support the many volunteer firefighters in keeping the flames consuming the old wooden building from spreading to surround-

ing buildings, including the village's Lions' hall and Legion and the Frasers commercial complex.

Additional firefighters were called in to ensure the wing, its workforce and residents were properly protected during this emergency.

"The Kingston Fire Department led a very successful defensive attack, which limited the damage to only the warehouse, and none of the adjacent structures that were in very close proximity suffered any appreciable damage," said 14 Wing Fire Chief Captain Bruce Paradis. "We used the large water volume of our truck, coupled with the deployable boom and the capacity to move while pumping large volumes

of water, to suppress the fire in the western area of the structure."

Although a tremendous effort was put forth by the many departments that responded, the entire structure was razed. Heavy equipment was brought in to tear down the remaining structure.

"Under a pre-arranged agreement with the wing and local Valley fire departments, our firefighters were extremely proud to work along side the many volunteer firefighters to battle this fire as a team and keep it from spreading," said Paradis. "Other than our five that responded, all the rest were volunteer - and some were still on scene 12 hours later. That's community dedication."

Nijmegen march an 'experience'

Great, an experience – but tough.

A few words can't begin to describe the experience of 14 Wing Greenwood's Nijmegen marching team July

16 through 19 in Holland, but Lieutenant Gillian Kelland adds "well-prepared.

"It was a lot of work, a huge commitment two or three days a week for five months. We sacrificed our time and supervisors re-organized work schedules all along

the chain of command – a huge effort from Greenwood helped us."

The team in training did

numerous distance marches, but only two 40-kilometre, back-to-back routes. The Nijmegen challenge is four 40-kilometre, back-to-back marches.

"It was great – the weather, it was so hot and sunny. Tough, but everyone from our team made it through. That last day was tough. No matter about the blisters and the pain – everything still hurts."

Kelland credits amazing hospitality in the support camps every night, including inflatable kiddie pools of cold

water waiting to soak feet fresh out of marching boots.

Eleven Greenwood personnel represented 14 Wing, and another marched with a London, Ontario military team. While the Canadian military has marched in Nijmegen since 1952, using the challenge as a memorial for First and Second world war soldiers, the Dutch army has been training with the Nijmegen route since 1909. Over 40,000 marchers from 50 nations enter the annual challenge.

"It was really great to be recognized as Canadian everywhere we went," says Kelland. "People just yelled out at us, and we had flags and pins to pass out. The last five kilometres, all the Canadian teams met and were presented with our Nijmegen medals, and then we all finished together, all in ranks down the Via Gladiola. Everyone was there, all the spectators bring glads and you carry them with you and in your rucksack. It was a huge party."

Remembrance Day services home are always pretty powerful, but you don't ever see the graves.... They were so well taken care of, just picture perfect."

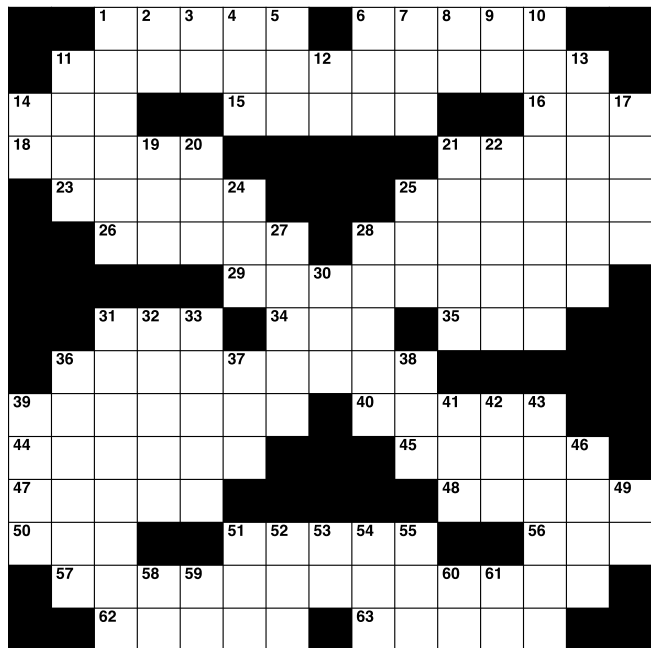

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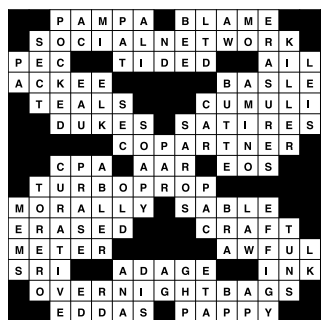
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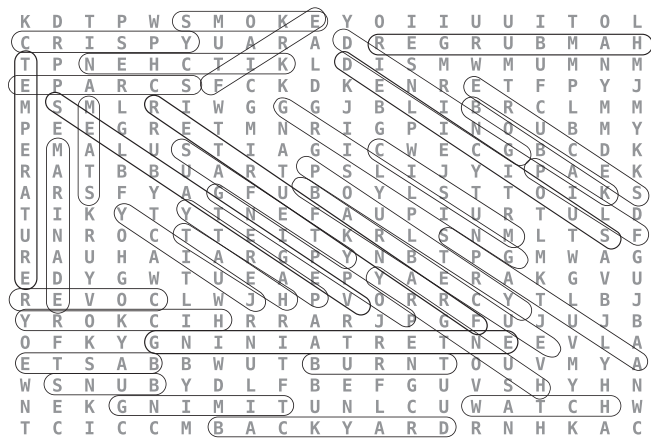
