# Deployment, returns continue Op Impact cycle

Approximately 125 Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) personnel returned home April 21 aboard a CC150 Polaris aircraft from Operation Impact, the CAF's contribution to the Middle East Stabilization Force, the military mission of the international coalition against the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria (ISIS). The personnel, deployed since the operation began in October 2014, were returned to bases at 14 Wing Greenwood, 8 Wing Trenton and 4 Wing Cold Lake.

"I am always pleased to see the safe return home of our personnel after a long deployment," said Lieutenant-General Yvan Blondin, Commander Royal Canadian Air Force. "They and their families sacrifice a great deal for our country, and we are forever grateful. "Likewise, we are mindful of those who are just beginning their deployments as well. They can rest knowing that we will take care of their families at home, so they can take care of the mission overseas." The ongoing relief in

place allows the CAF to replenish its forces by deploying a new rotation of service members, allowing those currently deployed to return home. The relief in place began in mid-April and will continue rotating personnel until approximately mid-June. March 30, the CAF mission was formally extended for up to 12 months, and expanded to authorize the conduct of airstrikes against ISIS targets in Syria.

As of April 20, Air Task Force-Iraq had conducted 805 sorties: the CAF's CF188 Hornet fighters conducted 524 sorties, the CC150T Polaris aerial refueller conducted 136 sorties, delivering some 8,006,000 pounds of fuel to coalition aircraft; and the CP140 Aurora aircraft (out of 14 Wing Greenwood) conducted 145 reconnaissance missions.

Approximately 600 CAF personnel are deployed as part of Joint Task Force-Iraq (JTF-I), which includes various staff, support elements, and an air task force.

Brigadier-General Daniel Constable, Commander Joint Task Force-Iraq, spoke April 16, describing recent actions in the region. Canadian Armed Forces aircraft have begun operating in the skies over Syria after the governments of Iraq and Canada expanded the mandate of Operation Impact. "These missions were

conducted in a very deliberate manner, allowing our pilots to become familiar with the new airspace and integrated with our coalition partners already operating in that region. I'm very satisfied with the level of expertise our crews possess to conduct our operations, and I'm entirely comfortable that every effective measures are in place to assist and sup-

port our personnel in their mission." In coming weeks, many CAF members will be returning to Canada at the six-month mark since initial deployment to the region, being relieved by new personnel from bases across Canada. "The men and women deployed on Operation Impact

are second to none. They are professional and dedicated and rotating them periodically ensures they remain focussed on the mission. Rotations also provide more Canadian Armed Forces members the opportunity to gain operational experience, thereby improving our capabilities and effectiveness as a fighting force."

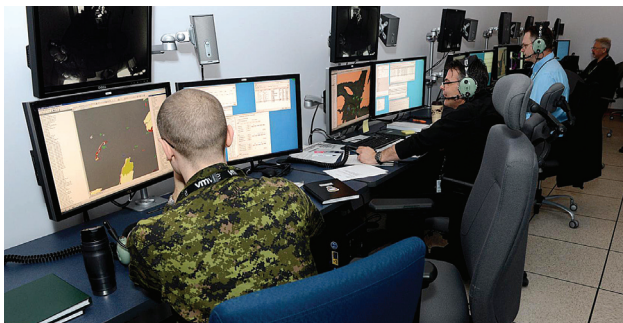

## Aurora training centre stage in new simulators

Recently installed in the 404 (Long Range Patrol & Training) Squadron Thorney Island simulation centre, the CP140M Aurora operational mission simulator (OMS) is now being put through rigorous evaluations.

Built and delivered by General Dynamics Canada (GDC) and its sub-contractors, this

highly immersive crew mission simulator will provide advanced force generation training for the life of the Aurora. These evaluations and immediate follow-on simulator operator and maintenance training are pre-requisite to acceptance of the OMS, expected this summer. A motivated and highly competent team of 404 Squadron Department of National Defence civil-

ian instructor-operators has worked very closely with the project management office and contractors to ensure the OMS has the correct level of functionality and fidelity to provide the best training in support of operational readiness.

All facets of Aurora mission operations will soon be trained in the new OMS. This includes search and rescue, undersea surveillance, moni-

toring Canada's maritime and High Arctic approaches and overland battlefield surveillance and reconnaissance. To provide this experiential training, 404 Squadron simulation flight instructor-operators must remain current on not just Aurora tactics, but also friend and potential foe tactics, techniques and procedures.

As part of the announced Royal Canadian Air Force

simulation strategy, it is planned the OMS will eventually be capable of connecting to other DND procedural and mission simulators. During these distributed mission training events of the future, Aurora crews will work not just with CF18s and Cyclone simulators, but also exercise with Royal Canadian Navy ship and submarine crews in their simulators, and any other

federated participants joining through the DND network.

One of the last major milestones of the Aurora Incremental Modernization Plan – Block III, the arrival of the OMS, and plans to soon be available for full Aurora fleet training; ensures the 404 Squadron vision of “Best People – Best Training – Best Operational Training Unit” is as true as ever.

## Search ends for man off Peggy's Cove

Halifax District RCMP continue to investigate a man reported missing April 22 at Peggy's Cove.

At approximately 12:15 p.m. April 22, Halifax District RCMP responded to a 911 call that a man had been swept off the rocks and into the water at Peggy's Cove.

Preliminary investigation indicates a 25-year-old man from Ontario was standing on the rocks with a female traveling companion when a large wave swept him into the ocean.

First responders and the Joint Rescue Coordination Centre immediately began extensive search and res-

cue efforts using a 14 Wing Greenwood 413 (Transport and Rescue) Cormorant helicopter and three Coast Guard vessels. The Cormorant made two passes, with one break for refuelling, but was on scene most of the afternoon.

At 6 p.m., operations concluded. The RCMP underwa-

ter recovery team was set to be deployed once water conditions improved.

# Former branch officer, honorary colonel remembered for 'service second to none'

It was with a heavy heart the 14 Wing Greenwood Logistics and Engineering Branch bid a final farewell to a former commanding officer and former honorary colonel of the Mission Support Squadron (MSS), Edgar Arsenault, who passed away April 14.

Arsenault enrolled in the Canadian Forces in 1975 as a logistics officer specializing in transportation and movements. He had an extraordinary career, and enjoyed postings in CFB Portage La Prairie, 2 Air Movements Trenton, 1 Air Movements Edmonton, 5 Air Movements Lahr, Canadian Forces Command and Staff College Toronto and the NATO Reaction Force in Kalkar, Germany, before his final posting to 14 Wing Greenwood as the wing logistics officer in 1994. Following his

retirement in 1996, he strengthened community ties by joining the Annapolis Valley Regional School Board as its coordinator of procurement, coordinator of employee and labour relations and coordinator of transportation.

Arsenault accepted the position of honorary colonel of 14 MSS in April 2006, the first honorary colonel of that squad-

ron. During his tenure, he participated heavily in squadron events, even going so far as to visit Camp Mirage during the MSS deployment in May 2007, where he shared well-wishes from the Annapolis County Regional School Board and conveyed his heartfelt appreciation for the deployed troops and their mission.

During his time in the Canadian Forces, Arsenault exemplified the Logistics' motto of Servitium Nulli Secundus, consistently providing a "service second to none" at home and abroad, and in his personal and professional life. He was well loved and respected in the branch,

# 405 Squadron marks airworthiness milestone

March 19, it became official: 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron became an accredited maintenance organization in support of the CP140 Aurora aircraft.

This accreditation authorizes 405 Squadron to perform airworthiness-related activities in a first and second line environment. This milestone is significant, as the squadron has not had this capability for 60 years.

Maintenance was the norm when the squadron formed in 1941, during the Second World War year, and in the years afterward until the Neptune replaced the Lancaster in 1955. For the next 13 years, the squadron included a mish mash of maintenance person-

nel. In 1968, the Base Aircraft Maintenance Organization was the governing authority for aircraft maintenance, and it stayed that way until 1993, when the air force adopted the Aircraft Maintenance Squadron (AMS) format.

With the many lessons learned from more recent operations, it was determined both CP140 long range patrol operational squadrons needed to be similar in both form and function. Colonel Lise Bourgon relinquished command of 12 Wing Shearwater to Colonel P.C. Allan Thursday, April 23 during a ceremony held in Archdale Hangar. Presiding over the change of command parade was Major-General D.L.R. Wheeler, Commander 1 Canadian Air Division. The Honourable J.J. Grant CMM, ONS, CD (Ret'd), Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia was also in attendance.

"Brigadier-General Bourgon has done a great job leading the charge in pro-

viding maritime helicopter support to the east and west coast as well as preparing the wing for transition to the Cyclone. Introducing a new fleet is a monumental job and she has succeeded," said Wheeler. "Colonel Allan is no stranger to the maritime helicopter community and is an ideal successor. Colonel Allan will continue to evolve 12 Wing and introduce the Cyclone. He has my full confidence."

Allan comes to 12 Wing from Ottawa, where he was

executive assistant to the vice chief of the defence staff and then, on promotion to his present rank in 2014, air staff chief of staff.

# Valley colour, heritage woven into new tartan

Colours of the Annapolis Valley's history and natural surroundings are now woven into a distinctive tartan of our very own.

April 6, on Tartan Day, friends of all things Scottish gathered in Greenwich to celebrate heritage and history, but also to honour the designer of and formally launch the Annapolis Valley Tartan.

Gordon Hansford, 91, is a Valley boy born and bred, born in Wolfville in 1924 and having lived, taught and served his country here since. In the 1980s, he turned his attention to the matter of a Valley tartan and the fruits of his labour, imagination and persistence were unveiled before an appreciative crowd of tartan-clad guests.

"Tartan is all about family, and this new Annapolis Valley tartan is bringing all of us together as a family, and we can celebrate that and wear our tartan and be a family together in the Valley, said

Kings South MLA Keith Irvine, who declared his intention to sport a new tartan tie when next in the Legislature.

Hansford was presented the scroll registering the tartan with the Scottish Registry of Tartans and a swatch of the woven cloth to mark the launch. He thanked all those who supported his campaign

over the years, and had one of his many poems ready to recite in appreciation:

"The Old Annapolis Valley has a tartan of its own, and the story of that tartan, I'll tell you, is the green of trees and crops the farmers love to grow; the blue of the mountains, north and south; the silver of two rivers that flow down to the

sea and the bright red of blood of all the soldiers who made us free."

Special guests included Hansford's wife, Helen; the founder of Nova Scotia Tartan Day, Jean Watson; Kings County Museum curator Bria Stokesbury, pipers Ed Coleman and his grandson, Liam Coleman-Aulenback; and

Reverend Doctor Bob Wallace. Garrison Coordinator Major Brent Kerr represented Camp Aldershot in recognition of Hansford's long affiliation with the Canadian Armed Forces.

Hansford joined the militia in Wolfville in 1940, the 2nd Battalion of the West Nova Scotia Regiment. In 1941, he joined the Infantry Training Centre Pipe Band at Camp Aldershot as a drummer and, in 1942, was transferred to the Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps. He went overseas in early 1943 and later joined the Royal Canadian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers. He travelled with the military through Europe and North Africa as an electrician after superiors determined being a drummer, soldier and stretcher bearer with a "bad eye – I couldn't see the front sight of the rifle," Hansford says; was not enough to get him overseas.

He returned home to Nova Scotia at the end of the war and enrolled at Acadia University, eventually earning three degrees, and embarked on a

career in education, teaching in the Nova Scotia college system for 30 years. From 1947 to 1963, he continued in the militia as a member of the 146th Battery (47th Anti-tank Regiment, Royal Canadian Artillery) and then the 1st Field Regiment Royal Canadian Artillery, Halifax, attaining the rank of major.

Hansford is a well-known musician, author, artist, Legion member, community volunteer and local heritage aficionado.

"There can be no question that Gordon Hansford exemplifies the best of the Annapolis Valley, nor any greater evidence of his sufficient and substantial association with this place than the life he has lived and the contributions he has made," Stokesbury said, highlighting just some of the letter she wrote endorsing the tartan to the Scottish registry.

"In the creation of a tartan inspired by his beloved Annapolis Valley, Mr. Hansford has bequeathed one more gift to the people of Nova Scotia."

## RCAF tartan: world's first air force tartan

October 21, 2010, the Minister of Canadian Heritage officially declared April 6 as Tartan Day, the anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Arbroath, the Scottish declaration of independence, in 1320. In Canada, Tartan Day originated in the late 1980s in Nova Scotia, where it was declared an official day by the provincial government. It then spread across the country, with many provinces joining in.

Tartan Day recognizes and celebrates the contributions of Scots and their descendants to

the fabric of our society and is an opportunity for Canadians to celebrate their national, provincial, territorial or personal tartans.

The story of the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) tartan goes back to January 1942. Group Captain Elmer G. Fullerton, station commander of No. 9 Service Flying Training School, RCAF Station Summerside, Prince Edward Island; wanted to celebrate his Scottish heritage by organizing a "Robbie Burns Night" mess dinner. He borrowed bagpipes for his station band and searched for a

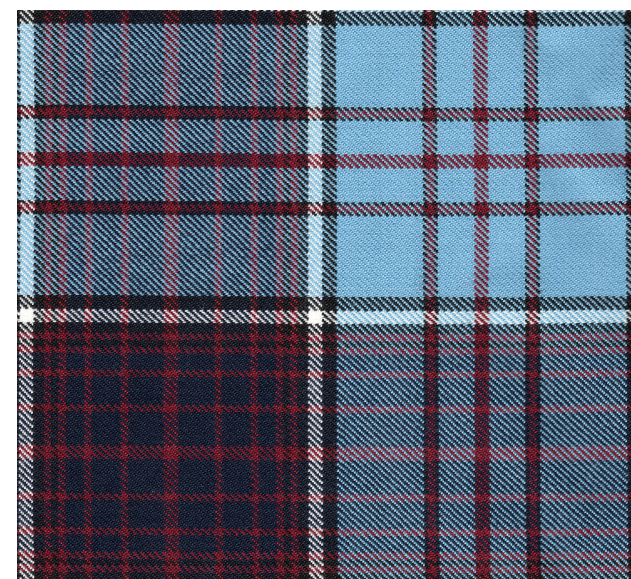
suitable tartan to outfit the band in full Scottish regalia.

As a result, Fullerton decided to design an original pattern that represented the Air Force. With coloured pencils in hand, he produced the prototype using light blue, dark blue and maroon colours. The original sample of the proposed RCAF tartan was created by Patricia Jenkins and loom crofters of Gagetown, New Brunswick, with the Gagetown weavers also adding a white line in the design.

Fullerton then ordered a sample be sent to RCAF headquarters in Ottawa for approval. The

design was endorsed by the Air Council, and Air Vice-Marshal J. A. Sully sent it off to Scotland's Lord Lyon, King of Arms, for approval in July 1942.

The approval was granted August 15 and the design was officially registered as the RCAF tartan. The RCAF became the first air force in the world to have its own distinctive tartan. Since then, the distinctive RCAF tartan has been worn by members of RCAF pipe and drum bands. It is also used in other ways, including ties, mess kit cummerbunds or ladies' sashes.

Community volunteers were hosted for supper and an entertaining show at the Annapolis Mess by the 14 Wing Greenwood Community Centre and Military Family Resource Centre April 16, marking National Volunteer Week.

"So many times a volunteer will say, 'I was just stuffing envelopes,' or 'just barbecuing,'" said Leona Conrick, the MFRC's volunteer coordinator. "Those envelopes provide information for families moving to Greenwood and, by helping at the BBQ, you provide support for funds to run deployment programs - you are providing peace of mind and contributing to the operations here at 14 Wing.

"Sometimes you may think you are a small pebble in a

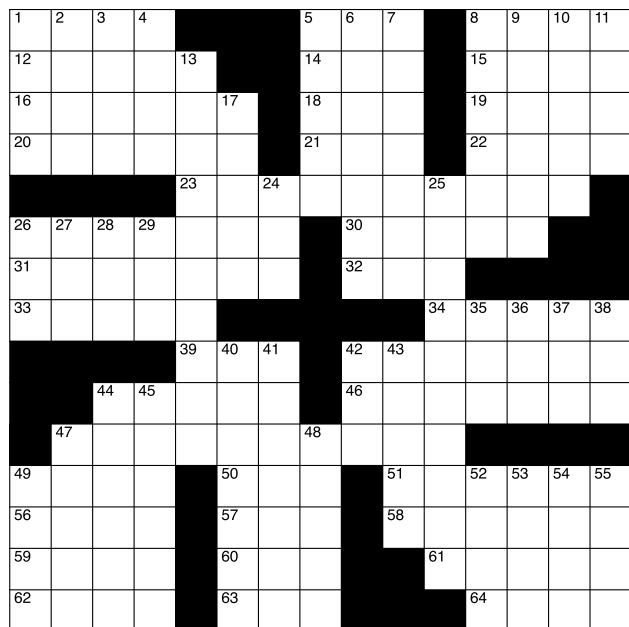

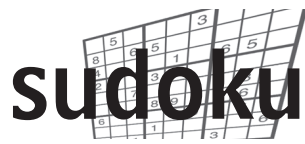

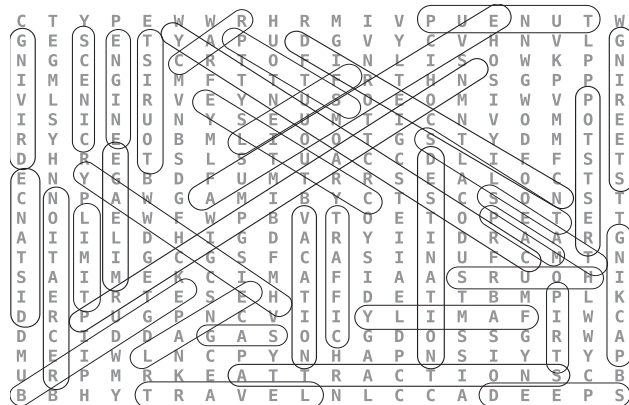

May 2 at 7 p.m., the Annapolis Valley Community Church of the Nazarene will be holding its first purse and pie auction.

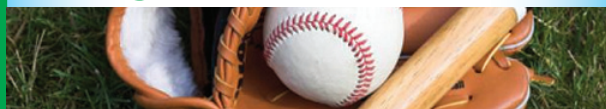
This is a relatively new concept around here; Pastor Dianne Elliott had the privilege of being part of such an evening (or two) at her last posting in Ontario.
