Wing energy efficiency upgrades underway

A \$20.5 million energy efficiency project is underway at 14 Wing Greenwood, with work starting April 22 to help reduce annual greenhouse gas emissions by 7,500 tonnes, the equivalent of taking 1,600 cars off the road.

"This project will be a major milestone for the base in support of the Department of National Defence's national Energy and Environment Strategy, our formal commitment to reduce the environmental impact of our bases and operations," says Alex England, DND energy manager.

In-building lighting retrofits and building automation system upgrades are now concentrated in the Annapolis Mess, the 14 Wing Fitness & Sports Centre and the Birchall

Training Centre; the first of over 50 buildings in which work will occur through the end of 2020.

"Greenwood personnel can expect to see teams of mechanical and electrical contractors and their equipment around our buildings throughout this project," says Doug MacLeod, DCC Greenwood's coordinator – facility management. "This work is primarily upgrades to building systems, such as more energy-efficient lighting that reduces electricity consumption and upgrades to HVAC and building management systems that help improve indoor environmental quality, while also reducing energy use.

"However, this project also includes a big change over at the central heating plant, where

we'll be moving to more energy-efficient and lower-carbon natural gas as a fuel source, replacing the bunker C fuel oil we currently use."

Most of the construction work in the Mess, the fitness centre and the Birchall will wrap up by the end of June. Lighting retrofit work will then get underway in hangars 10, 11 and 14, with work expected to take four months. More energy

efficiency work will continue in the fitness centre in August with the installation of a heat recovery and dehumidification system for the pool area.

The energy efficiency project is being delivered by MCW Custom Energy Solutions as an energy performance contract. Many other DND bases across Canada are also undertaking these kinds of energy projects, but 14 Wing is one of the first to see construction starting up. →

SAR crews continue maritime response

May 11, around 4:30 p.m., the Halifax Joint Rescue Co-ordination tasked a 14 Wing Greenwood-based Cormorant helicopter at 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron to save two individuals in the water and another two in a dingy drifting on the Lahave River, near Bridgewater, but it was stood down prior to take-off.

May 12, around 5:30 p.m., a Cormorant was tasked to rescue the three-person crew from the fishing vessel Deer Abby, drifting a half-mile offshore in the Liverpool Bay area. The helicopter was stood down prior to take-off as the boat was able to get a tow.

May 16, just after noon, a Cormorant was tasked to assist on a call for an EPIRB

sounding near Shippagan, New Brunswick.

May 19, a Cormorant was tasked around 7 p.m. in support of a search for overdue hikers near Gagetown, New Brunswick. A family of four, including a pre-teen and a teenager and a middle-aged man, was reported with concern they were not sufficiently dressed for an overnight in the woods. RCMP and provincial ground search and rescue were also activated. The party was located, hunkered down for the night with a fire going, by the helicopter and a hoist extraction effort got underway.

May 19, a Greenwood-based helicopter was tasked just before 11 p.m. to assist in the search for a man reported-overboard from

a Maersk marine vessel in the St. Lawrence River, near the mouth of the Saguenay River. The ship had launched a small craft, but lost sight of the person in the water. A Griffin helicopter from Bagotville was also called in to assist in the search. The Greenwood aircraft was airborne just before midnight, but the SAR call was reduced and the crew dismissed.

May 21, a Cormorant was dispatched around 8 a.m. to a situation with a man reported overboard near Naufrage, PEI. A Provincial Air Line charter spotted the search object, which was investigated by R911 and confirmed as submerged lobster buoy. R911 and a second Cormorant searched the area, with the charter

aircraft providing coverage in between the helicopters and communications' relay. Due to deteriorating weather, one helicopter and the charter were released. The second helicopter continued to saturate the search area, but was also released around 6:30 p.m. and returned to Greenwood, arriving by 7:30 p.m.

May 22, a Greenwood Cormorant was tasked just before 3:30 a.m. to provide assistance to a sailboat demasted and running aground in the Sambro area. Rescue 911 was airborne within the hour, but stood down at 4:44, as all persons on the sailboat had been brought to safety by another vessel in the area. RSCU landed back in Greenwood at 5:03 a.m. →

Becky Weller opened up the day's FORCE testing as Personnel Support Program fitness staff always do, running through the four components that make up the Canadian Armed Forces' personnel operational fitness test. An when Wing Commanded Colonel Mike Adamson missed a line in the loaded shuttle, her peer, Shane Bares, called him right back.

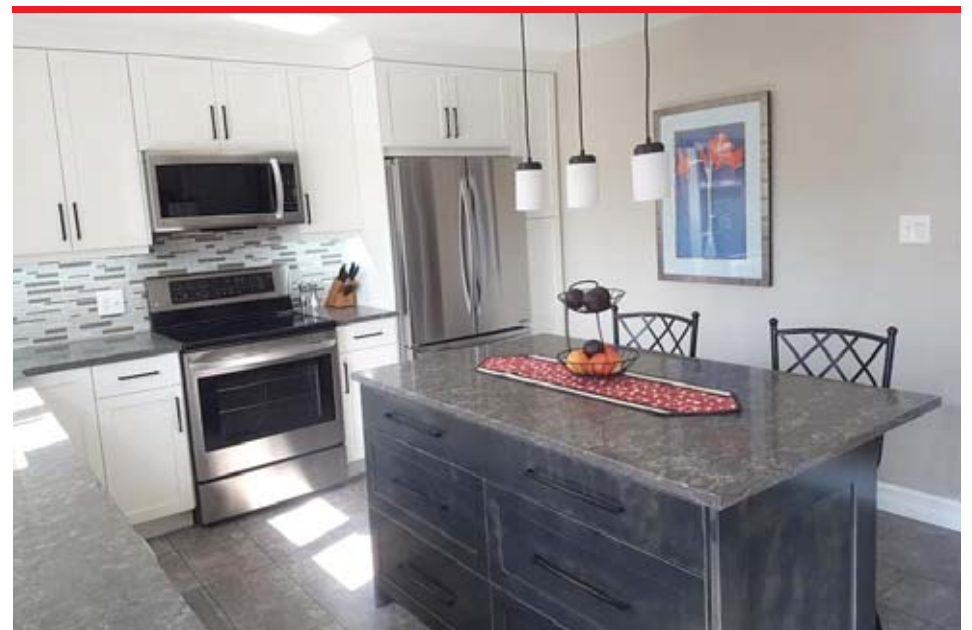

How much exercise is enough?

Q: I don't enjoy team sports and have managed to stay in pretty good shape doing 30 to 40 minutes of fast walking five days a week, regardless of the weather. At the end of my walks, I do about 10 minutes of light weights. I have done this for over 20 years and, while I know regular exercise is important for my mental and physical health, I wonder if I am doing enough to enjoy those benefits?

A: Dear Nicole:

Congratulations on your long-term commitment to an active lifestyle. Research clearly shows regular physical activity is an effective way of

reducing your risk of developing a wide variety of serious medical conditions regardless of your age, gender or ethnic background.

The Canadian Society of Exercise Physiology, ParticipACTION and several other organizations got together to address how much exercise people actually need to do. After extensively reviewing the research they produced "The Canadian Physical Activity Guidelines" to give people some straight forward guidance on their physical activity needs. They have developed separate guidelines for various age groups, and all of them may be found at csep.ca.

Adults (age 18 to 64) should do at least 150 minutes of moderate to vigorously intense aerobic exercise per week. Moderately intense activity will cause you to sweat a little and breathe harder. Vigorously intense activity will cause you to sweat a lot and be out of breath. Exercise sessions should be 10 minutes or longer. Adults should also do muscle and bone strengthening exercises at least twice a week.

The bottom line: the guidelines provide recommendations on the minimum amount

of exercise people need to do to enjoy the many benefits exercise has to offer. The great news is that your workout routine meets all those criteria. Keep up the great work.
