## 'No one left behind' N.S. Wounded Warriors ride brings it in

The ride?  
"The ride was awesome!" says organizer Dean Peach, summing up the Wounded Warriors Highway of Heroes Nova Scotia Ride from Greenwood to Halifax August 24 and 25.

"We had just the right number of people because we had the right people."

Close to two dozen cyclists joined the two-day fundraising ride, most completing

the entire 200-kilometre plus route, with a few guest riders - including an escort from the Commandos Canada Motorcycle Club - dropping in for different portions. They raised about \$20,000 in pledges and sponsorship for Wounded Warriors programs for military and first responders and their families. Businesses, first responders, community organizations, the cycling community and volunteers all took on roles to make this first Nova Scotia ride possible.

"After we reached Kentville

On Day 1, everything was in place, everyone was happy to be there and we just were having a good time," Peach says, describing how long it took him and volunteer committee members to settle into the ride after months of pre-planning.

"We started early and did a little bit as time went on, and everyone had their strengths."

Those strengths came out in full on the ride.

"One guy used his daughter's mountain bike on the first day, and he just suffered. We got him a road bike for the second day, and he has already bought his own, just days after the ride. He says it got him out of his chair. Another guy - I am getting notes and letters from people, one guy has just suffered so much and this was an incredible experience. And there was more than one person."

14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Brendan Cook joined the ride from start to finish, committing to the fundraising several months ago before he even arrived in Greenwood.

"Cycling is the camaraderie and exercise, but we all have friends who are struggling and that only goes so far - then we have to raise some money," Cook said. "No one gets left behind." →

# 14 Wing Combined Bands 'best band' at Charlottetown parade

August 16, a contingent of 31 musicians and a CP140 Aurora were tasked to represent 14 Wing Greenwood at Charlottetown's Gold Cup Parade, the largest parade in Canada east of Montreal. Musicians with 14 Wing Pipes and Drums and 14 Wing Band (Brass and Reed) amalgamated into one strong, combined band of Highland instruments, brass

and woodwinds unique to 14 Wing - something band members were extremely proud to share with the greater community.

The parade opened with a dramatic flypast by the Aurora from 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron. Streets along the three-kilometre parade route were lined with people, with total attendance estimated at close to 60,000. Music performed by the 14 Wing Combined Bands included everything from *Scotland the Brave* and *Stan-*

*dard of St George* to *Colonel Bogey* and *Great Big Sea's Ordinary Day*. The Pipes and Drums also included sets that featured *Barren Rocks*, *Mary's Wedding*, *Athol Highlanders*, *Bonnie Dundee* and other popular pipe tunes. The group performed the *RCAF March Past* as a combined march, with pipes and drums taking the lead on the main theme and brass and reed taking the lead on the trio.

Charlotte Nicholson, Gold Cup Parade coordinator, was appreciative of 14 Wing's

contributions. "After a break of 11 years, it was wonderful to have the 14 Wing Band back in Charlottetown for the Gold Cup parade! Your combined bands, as well as the CP140 Aurora flypast, were terrific additions to the parade. Thank you very much to 14 Wing for your support."

On the bus trip home, members were rewarded with news the 14 Wing Combined Bands was selected as best band in the parade! Along with this recognition, a

donation of \$50 will be given to the Greenwood Military Family Resource Centre from Grant Thornton, on behalf of the bands.

The short tour proved to be an excellent team-building experience, bringing together musicians from diverse backgrounds, all working together to achieve a common goal.

14 Wing Commander, Colonel Brendan Cook, passed along his congratulations to the band.

"I am incredibly proud of

the recent success of the 14 Wing Combined Bands at the Gold Cup Parade in Prince Edward Island," he said. "Our all-volunteer band is quite unique, as its members are drawn from the Regular Force, the Reserve Force and includes civilians from the local community. # Cormorant additions, upgrades announced

August 22, Defence Minister Harjit S. Sajjan announced an investment in the Royal Canadian Air Force's search and rescue fleet of CH149 Cormorant helicopters.


At least two additional helicopters will be added to the fleet, and existing CH149s will be upgraded to the AW101-612 design, the helicopter model recently procured by Norway for its search and rescue missions. Using an already established configuration accelerates the project considerably. Training solutions and related infrastructure will also be acquired. The project will extend the Cormorants' life to at least 2042.

Leonardo S.p.A., the Cormorant's original manufacturer, in partnership with


IMP Aerospace, the in-service support contractor, and CAE will complete the work. The Cormorant Mid-Life Upgrade project is valued at up to \$1.39 billion.

"Every year, the Royal Canadian Air Force flies about 1,000 missions in support of search and rescue, a core mission of the Canadian Armed Forces," said Lieutenant-General A.D. Meinzinger, Commander of the Royal Canadian Air Force. "These upgrades to the CH149 Cormorant, and an increase in fleet size, ensures the RCAF will continue to deliver search and rescue services in the challenging Canadian environment."

CH149s are currently based at 19 Wing Comox, 9 Wing Gander and 14 Wing Greenwood. →

# Overwater calls for SAR crews

August 15, a Canadian Armed Forces' member had a different view on a rescue 183 nautical miles south-east of St. John's: Major D'Arcy Giguère was aboard the Queen Mary II as a passenger, as a 9 Wing Gander 103 Squadron Cormorant helicopter and a 14 Wing Greenwood Hercules flew over his head. The helicopter provided a medevac of a male passenger with a serious medical injury from the cruise ship, while the Hercules was on-scene as top cover throughout. The patient was transferred to hospital in St. John's; Giguère reports the Queen Mary's captain later announced to the ship the rescued man was recovering well.

August 24, a Hercules aircraft left Greenwood just before 4 a.m. to assist in the search for a 37-year-old man in an overdue 16-foot open boat, in the vicinity of Nain, Newfoundland and Labrador. The individual was found safe in a cabin on shore, and the aircrew returned to Greenwood just before 2 p.m. August 28, just after 11 a.m., a Hercules and a Cormorant were both tasked to assist on a call for a boat taking on water in the Canso straight. They remained on scene for about an hour as the boat was assisted to harbor by a nearby vessel, and were then stood down.

# Greenwood men, Halifax women take soccer titles

Teams from military bases in Greenwood, Halifax and Gagetown hit the pitch August 20 for the start of the Canadian Armed Forces' Atlantic regionals, being hosted at 14 Wing Greenwood's Apple Bowl field.

14 Wing Commander Colonel Brendan Cook led the requisite opening, but then revealed Greenwood team colours in a jersey worn under his CADPAT shirt, taking the opening kick on goal.

"Have a really great week - the refs, the athletes, everyone else, and play fair," Cook said in his welcome.

"Put your best on the field and, when you go back to your bases, be ambassadors for fitness and sport so that people see what you do, and they get back to the gym."

Teams from Gagetown and Halifax, in both the men's and women's divisions, were accommodated at 5th Canadian Division Support Base Detachment Aldershot.

The women opened the tournament August 20, with CFB Halifax, the defending CAF national champions, beating CFB Gagetown 3-0 after a scoreless first half. Halifax's Kelly Kisa was player of the game. In the afternoon, Halifax defeated 14 Wing 5-0 to earn a spot in the finals. Halifax's Sage Dixon was player of the game.

There was one men's game on opening day, as 14 Wing won 1-0 over Halifax with a goal early in the second half.

On day two, August 21, the 14 Wing women beat Gagetown 2-1 to earn a spot in the semi-final August 22; the men took a bye into the Friday

final after beating Gagetown 1-0. The men's semi-final re-matched Halifax and Gagetown: Gagetown won their round robin game 1-0.

The semis August 22 saw the Halifax men come out 9-8 over Gagetown after regulation, extra time and 11 penalty shots - each! In the women's semi, Gagetown defeated Greenwood 3-2 in a close game.

Finals day August 23 started with the women's match, Gagetown versus Halifax. Halifax took the win, earning a spot at the Canadian Armed Forces' nationals in September in Trenton.

The men's match pitted Halifax against the home team from 14 Wing. The game went back and forth, with each team putting two goals on the board. Two 10-minute extra time sessions did not resolve the tie, forcing a shoot-out. After Halifax's fifth shooter did not score, Greenwood took the Atlantic title 3-2.

It has been many more years than recent memory since Greenwood's men's team advanced to nationals; this was also the first year a Greenwood women's team hit the field.

"I wanted to take a moment to commend our women's soccer team for an excellent showing in this year's regionals," Cook said. "Our team fought very hard on the field, finishing 1-1 in the round robin and were narrowly defeated in the semi-finals. I was able to see parts of each of their games and I'm extremely proud of their play. My thanks to each player on our women's team for an excellent showing this year." →

# Para-athlete Brown competing in Lima

He is in Lima, Peru, now for the Parapan American Games, entered into the 100, 400, 800 and 1,500-metre races.

Getting there has been years in the process, with Brown most recently putting in a five-kilometre race as part of the July 20 Heart of the Valley Days road race. He used the race as a time trial, with race organizers doing all they could to ensure him a good route.

That included recruiting Ernie Kay, a captain at 14 Wing Greenwood's 415 (Long Range Patrol Force Development) Squadron.

"During the event, the roads were still open to traffic and part of my job was to protect Ben by riding behind and out-board of him," Kay said. "All the traffic that passed us did so very courteously and safely. Another part of my job was

to ride ahead at junctions to be safety lookout and to stop traffic where possible. This wasn't briefed, but seemed a logical thing to do and, after the event, he told me that that was part of the role."

Kay was drafted into the role at the last minute and hadn't done it before, but was pleased with how he was able to contribute to Brown knocking 40 seconds off his 5K personal best time.

"It went pretty well. I rode the course as my warm up, mainly to recce the turn-round point and to check the road surface. I probably didn't take as much notice of the wider road surface as an experienced support rider would, as I was looking at it with a cyclist's eye (one wheel track) rather than a wheelchair eye (three-wheel tracks), but he coped well enough."

Brown is familiar to 14 Wing Greenwood folks: he was the guest speaker a year

ago on the International Day of Disabled Persons, presenting on his para-sport journey and also leading a wheelchair basketball trial session. His coach, Ueli Albert, joined the 14 Wing Fitness and Sports

Centre Personnel Support Program staff this summer.

Coming up on Brown's calendar are a full marathon in New York, and staged events to, hopefully, earn a place at the 2020 Summer Paralympics in Tokyo. →

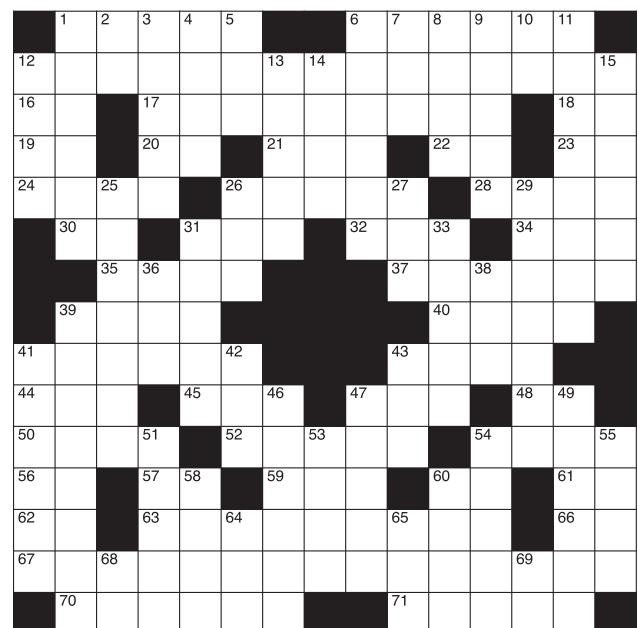
