Skills, partnerships behind successful projects

143 Construction Engineering Flight is in an unique position over a traditional Construction Engineering flight, as it is not located on a wing or base. Due to this, the flight has an agreement between the County of Lunenburg and the Canadian Armed Forces allowing its members to complete community projects for local government agencies and not-for-profit organizations. This agreement allows flight members to train and remain current in their trades, as well as giving flight members a chance to serve their country by serving their community.

Although the application and approval process is lengthy, taking months for a project request to be vetted and approved by several authorities, the applicants and 143 CEF members are always happy to work together to get projects completed.

One of the more recent projects began when the emergency stairs at the rear of the Mahone Bay Museum were found to be deteriorating, and no longer safe to use. As the museum is a

not-for-profit organization, it could afford the materials but not the cost of the labour to have the stairs replaced. The group reached out to 143CEF for assistance.

Once the project was reviewed and approved, the tradesmen from 143 CEF removed the old stairs and railings. They discovered the structure supporting the roof had rotted and also required replacement. This included removing the four-by-four posts that supported the roof, bracing the second story roof with jack posts, removing a portion of the lower roof and replacing everything with new lumber to bring a 200-year-old building up to modern building code.

The troops dug new holes for footings: after digging about six inches, they hit shale, which drastically slowed the pace of the work as they had to use jack hammers to chip away at the shale and remove it with a skid steer. Once complete, the techs were finally able to install the footings and pour concrete. They then installed the framework and stairs, followed by the railings and a level deck over the rooftop fire escape.

There were significant delays in the project: awaiting the building permit and



historical building approval for new construction, compounded by poor fall construction weather. These slowdowns lead to over a

month of delays, causing the project to take three months to complete.

On any given day, there were three or four techni-

cians from all trades on site. 143 CEF members that participated included Private Parnette, Corporal Parnell, Corporal McKay, Corporal

Buckler, Aviator Lucas, Aviator Blackburn, Aviator Shay, Sergeant Young, Warrant Officer Stevens and Warrant Officer Stacey. ➔

Check in: it's Bell Let's Talk Day January 29

On Bell Let's Talk Day January 29, 14 Wing Greenwood personnel will join the conversation around mental health.

Many people living with a mental illness report negative stereotypes about mental illness, and the resulting potential for discrimination, causes them more suffering than the illness itself. As a result, two-thirds of those suffering from mental illness are too afraid to seek the help that they need.

Mental illness affects people of all ages, from all walks of life. It can take many forms, including depression, anxiety and schizophrenia. Most individuals find ways to live with their illnesses, but how they are treated by others often proves to be more of a challenge than the

illness itself.

Stigma surrounded many diseases in the past, but concerted efforts to confront these attitudes resulted in change for the better - including better treatment, more funding for research and greater understanding from family, friends and colleagues. The goal is to achieve the same level of acceptance and understanding regarding mental illness.

Together, 14 Wing personnel can help end the stigma around mental illness. Remember: medical officers, counsellors, the Military Family Resource Centre, CF MAP, padres and more are here to listen.

Did you know 27 per cent of Canadians said they would be fearful of being around someone who suffers from

serious mental illness? Stigma has been around for a long time, and knowing the facts and myths about mental illness can be a great way to help end stigma.

Simple kindness can make the world of difference. Whether it's a smile or being a good listener, these simple acts of kindness can help open up the conversation and let someone know you are there for them. Expressions like "You'll get over it" and "Just relax" can minimize how a person is feeling. Instead, offer your support and say, "I'm sorry you aren't feeling well." Ask what you can do to help.

Forty-two per cent of Canadians were unsure whether they would socialize with a friend who has a mental illness. Being a good

listener and asking how you can help - sometimes just being there for people you care about - can be the first step in recovery. Here are a few examples of what to ask: "I'm sorry you aren't feeling well," "I've noticed you've seemed down lately" or "Is everything OK?"

Break the silence. Talk about how mental illness touches us all in some way, directly or through a friend, family member or fellow CAF member. Most people with mental health issues can - and do - recover.

Readiness training: the next force generation

Like all operational Royal Canadian Air Forces wings, 14 Wing Greenwood maintains a baseline level of readiness, should members be deployed overseas in an expeditionary capacity.

Until recently, training and readiness standards had a distinct army flavour: small-arms weapons training was always first and foremost,

even though such preparation was not the best use of time and effort for trainees and 14 Wing Operations Support Squadron's Readiness Training Flight (RTF) support staff. Coupled with this, maintainers, the people who keep 14 Wing's aircraft flight worthy, now use pistols instead of the C7 rifle as their primary weapon. Boarding a bus and heading out to the ranges became less of a priority.

Instead, recertification on

the long-barrelled weapon can be accomplished in the basement of the Birchall Training Centre, using a state-of-the-art Small Arms Trainer (SAT). The RTF is responsible for ensuring all 14 Wing members are trained to a specified Force Generation Baseline Level (FGBL) to enable effective employment by operational commanders overseas. The previous Individual Battle Tasks Standard has not been abandoned, only modified to

meet requirements based on the need for high- or low-readiness.


14 Wing has responded to the new Force Generation Baseline, and is in line with direction from 1 Canadian Air Division. With the change in training standards, the wing has increased its throughput in the SAT, training hundreds of maintainers without compromising their training value. This 25m pistol range runs twice a week, as well as larger class sizes in the

trainer - all saving money while lowering the wing's carbon footprint.


Those elements deemed high-readiness or deployment readiness still need their personal readiness verification completed should they be sent out the door on weeks' or only days' notice. High readiness is the highest level, and enables flexibility and minimizes the need for Theatre Mission Specific Training once 14 Wing members arrive at their place of

employment. Deployment readiness allows personnel to conduct operations away from bases in low-threat expeditionary operations.

These modifications to the previous training regimen came about because commanders needed to be able to use their resources effectively. While the focus of the activities may have shifted, it's not about doing less weapons training, but about doing more of everything else. ➔

Royal Canadian Mint celebrates V-E Day 75th anniversary on 2020 proof silver dollar

Seventy-five years after Canadian soldiers and their allies liberated Western Europe in the closing months of the Second World War, the Royal Canadian Mint is dedicating its annual proof silver dollar to their memory.

This exceptional collectible features the artwork of accomplished coin designer

Pandora Young, who has vividly illustrated the outpouring of emotion of civilians cheering the victorious troops. In tribute to each military branch, the distinct silhouettes of a sailor, soldier and airman stand out in a mirror-like finish before a thankful crowd. A large "V" for victory at the centre of the coin and a 1945-2020


double date complete the design.

The reverse design by Guelph artist Laurie McGaw is a V-E Day salute to the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF). Against a "V" for Victory backdrop, a wing commander is flanked by a pilot on his right and a waving member of the RCAF Women's Division on

his left. The pilot flashes a victory sign and the commander raises his hand to salute as a Spitfire fighter plane flies overhead.

Changes to Service Medals

Changements aux médailles de service

As part of Strong, Secure, Engaged, (SSE 7), the Government of Canada is modernizing the Canadian Armed Forces' Honours and Awards system to ensure military members' service to Canada is recognized in a more timely and appropriate manner.

This initiative encompasses the modernization of the overseas service recognition framework. The objective is to make service medals more accessible and flexible to make sure Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) members receive appropriate recognition for their participation in and direct support to operations.

As part of this initiative, changes to the eligibility list for the Special Service Medal with NATO bar and a reduction of the time criteria to 45 days for both the NATO and EXPEDITION bars to that same medal were announced Febru-

ary 18, 2018 in CANFORGEN 001/20.

The time criteria for the General Campaign Star (GCS), General Service Medal (GSM) and Operational Service Medal (OSM) have been reduced to ensure recognition remains attainable to participants in light of new deployment patterns where CAF members more often deploy for short periods of time. Each ribbon for each of those medals has a new time criteria, beginning with an appropriate recent (post-Afghanistan) operational date as per the table. There are transition measures which ensure anyone who serves at least one eligible day after the stated date is allowed to cumulate any previously accrued time towards the new criteria for the medal. The criteria for the rotation bars will not be affected by these changes, meaning the first bar

will continue to be awarded after a total of 210 eligible days while subsequent bars are awarded for every period of 180 eligible days thereafter.

The Special Service Medal, which had up to now been reserved for CAF members, has been amended to expand eligibility to Canadian civilians and members of allied forces

working for the CAF from 29 April 2014 onwards to align this medal with other modern service medals which allow recognition of all members of the Defence Team who play a key role in the success of our operations.

The limitations for visits in theatre have been reduced. As a result, technical assistance

visits, staff inspection visits, staff assistance visits and specialists visits in theatre will now be credited towards the appropriate service medal. Visits for the purpose of command, familiarization, leadership and morale remain excluded from eligibility.

These changes will ensure recognition is keeping pace

with the evolving nature of current and future CAF operations and remains a worthy and attainable reward for personnel while preserving the symbolic value and respect for the service medals in question. Please refer to CANFORGEN 001/20 or to the Canadian Medals Chart for more information. ➔

Dans le cadre de l'initiative n 7 de la politique de défense Protection, Sécurité, Engagement (PSE 7), le gouvernement du Canada procède à la modernisation du système de distinctions honorifiques et de reconnaissance des Forces armées canadiennes (FAC) pour veiller à ce que le service des militaires soit reconnu d'une manière plus appropriée et opportune.

Cette initiative comprend la modernisation du cadre de reconnaissance du service outre-mer. L'objectif est d'assouplir les critères d'admissibilité des médailles de service afin de les rendre plus accessibles, pour s'assurer que les membres des FAC reçoivent une reconnaissance appropriée pour leur participation et leur soutien direct aux opérations.

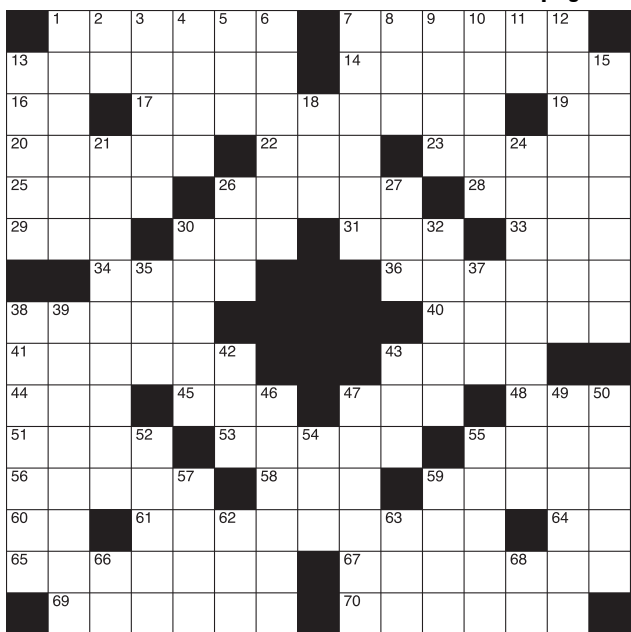

Free rein on social media?

Dear CCMS: I feel harassed by a co-worker who posted inappropriate comments about me on her Facebook page. When I approached her and asked the posts be deleted, she told me she could write what she wanted and there was nothing I or the chain of command could do about it. Is this true?

Though the situation described may not meet all harassment criteria as outlined in the Harassment Prevention and Resolution Policy (DAOD 5012-0), it is important DND employees and CAF members be aware online com-

ments about a colleague may be subject to scrutiny under the DND and CAF Code of Values and Ethics and Code of Service Discipline.

The codes direct DND employees and CAF members to respect the dignity and values of every person. The obligations and expected behaviors apply to use of internet/ intranet tools in the workplace, be it for professional or personal ends. Moreover, in keeping with the intent of DAOD 5012-0, management should be aware of any consequences spilling over into the workplace from such activity and have

a responsibility to address and resolve any potential situations of conflict and/or harassment in a timely and efficient manner.

Though it appears you were proactive attempting a form of early/ local/ informal resolution, you indicated it was unsuccessful. Along with seeking assistance from your CoC, you may wish to consider contacting your local CCMS to obtain additional information and/or clarification related to other options available to best address your concerns and most effectively meet your needs. →

Libertés sans limites avec les médias sociaux?

Cher SGCP : Je me sens harcelé par un collègue qui a affiché des commentaires inappropriés à mon sujet sur sa page Facebook. Quand je l'ai approchée et que je lui ai demandé que les messages soient supprimés, elle m'a dit qu'elle pouvait écrire ce qu'elle voulait et que ni la chaîne de commandement, ni moi qui pourrais empêcher de faire quoique ce soit à ce sujet. Est-ce bien le cas ?

Bien que la situation décrite puisse ne pas toucher tous les critères énoncés en matière d'harcèlement selon la Politique de prévention et de résolution du harcèlement (DOAD 5012-0), il est important que les employés du MDN et les membres des FAC sachent que les commentaires en ligne concernant un collègue peuvent

être soumis à un contrôle en vertu du Code de valeurs et d'éthique et du Code de discipline militaire du MDN et des FAC.

Les codes incitent les employés du MDN et les membres des FAC à respecter la dignité et les valeurs de chaque personne. Les obligations et les comportements attendus s'appliquent à l'utilisation des outils Internet / Intranet dans le milieu de travail, que ce soit à des fins professionnelles ou personnelles. En outre, conformément à l'esprit de la DOAD 5012-0, la direction devrait être consciente des conséquences de telles activités dans le milieu de travail et être tenue de traiter et de résoudre toute situation potentielle de conflit et / ou d'harcèlement de manière rapide et efficace.

Bien qu'il semble que

vous ayez tenté de manière proactive une forme de résolution rapide, locale et informelle, vous avez indiqué que vos efforts n'ont pas porté fruit. En plus de demander l'appui de votre chaîne de commandement, vous pourriez contacter les SGCP locaux pour obtenir des renseignements supplémentaires et / ou des clarifications en ce qui a trait aux autres options disponibles afin de mieux répondre à vos besoins.
