Wing settles into 'new normal'

If this is the new normal, the 14 Wing Greenwood operational and family community appears to be finding a groove. Wing Commander Colonel Brendan Cook and Wing Chief Warrant Officer Dan Campbell held a Facebook Live town hall June 29 to head into a summer hiatus after hosting the check-ins almost bi-weekly since April and the advent of COVID-19. After updates on business resumption activities throughout the wing's sections and squadrons, some guidance on provincial Public Health changes to create an Atlantic travel "bubble," postings and house hunting, and announcements of recent

honours and awards, the men moved on to reassurances to wing personnel and their families the right steps have been taken to ensure everyone's safety. "Many of you are tentative, but the guidelines are there to keep you safe and establish the new normal," said Cook. "You need to make choices that make good sense for you and your family's health, and be socially responsible for our community." He encouraged families to enjoy Canada Day and take in sites of interest in the Atlantic bubble of provinces over the summer, but to also think about those moving to Greenwood from other military communities during the annual posting season. "Families will be self-iso-

lating and, while their military member will be out to some extent for work, they are also isolating. If you have a friend coming in, reach out. Make them feel a little extra welcome. If you want to extend a further helping hand, the Military Family Resource Centre's family sponsor program matches families, so newcomers can be brought into our community that much better." Campbell said word of Greenwood's work since March, and the impact of stay-at-home measures and work-arounds on base, has been spreading. "We're getting messages from other bases and other people, asking us how are we doing this or that?" Campbell said. "We are really creating

something new, and new ways of connecting. The wing commander and I are so impressed with that; it's been extraordinary, the ideas. Push them up – we're here to listen to you, and there is great work happening here. 14 Wing is knocking it out of the park with this crisis." Tough decisions have been made: cancelled military exercises and projects, reduced or closed facility access and programs, such as traditional summer day camps for youth or the outdoor pool; but, Cook said, "there are programs we have to have, and we're running at a loss because we need to serve families with military spouses who have to get to work." Cook and Campbell also

exchanged some insights on how the pandemic has affected them personally over the past few months. "We put on a strong face and try and lead," Campbell said, "but it does impact on you and it can be stressful. I'm not enjoying this new way of life – the challenges I'm facing are no different than anyone else, but I had a choice: go through it miserable, or come out better on the other side. Lots of exercise and eating healthy." Cook said all the plans he had coming into the role of wing commander were all "shoveled to the side." "The hours are always long, but some of those early days in March and April... I was working late, weekends; always knowing you had to

have something ready. Some days, I thought I couldn't keep this up. But, you get a shot in the arm or people lift you. You can choose to fail or push on, and there are a lot of people depending on you when you're in command. I chose to push on. "Sometimes you don't ask for these things, but they're thrown in. You dive in, you ask for help. That's the way it is." The summer break in Facebook Live town halls will be interrupted by Cook and Campbell, should news or events mean there is a message to share with the wider wing community. They expect to host their next event later in August, particularly hoping to welcome new military families. →

Contributions recognized, as wing marks National Public Service Week

14 Wing Greenwood leadership values its Public Service employees every day; during National Public Service Week June 14 to 20, a special effort was made, despite COVID-19 work-from-home scenarios and restrictions on public gatherings, to make sure they knew it. "Certainly, we appreciate all that our public service employees do for us, but I think the important work done throughout the COVID-19 response makes our civilians' contributions even more noteworthy," said Colonel Brendan Cook in a video posted on The Aurora News Facebook page June 16 directed to the wing. A third of the wing's Public Service employees have been working on the wing since March without any interruption due to COVID-19; many others of about 300 total worked from home, continuing the work that needs to happen to keep operations on track. "This level of collaboration goes hand-in-hand with

the spirit of National Public Service Week. I, along with Wing Chief Warrant Officer Dan Campbell, would like to commemorate the important work of the civilian members of our Defence Team, and especially those who are part of the 14 Wing Greenwood family." Campbell acknowledged Public Service employees' extraordinary efforts, on the wing and beyond. "When the whole world seemed to go into lockdown mode, Canadians needed help. It was our national Public Service which worked extra hours, in highly unusual conditions, to establish federal programs; these contributions to our nation should not go unrecognized. "Without our Public Service employees, lots of the work in the Royal Canadian Air Force and the Canadian government simply wouldn't happen, so we, along with all of our colleagues in uniform, would like to salute your accomplishments, now more than ever." Along with the online video message, the wing hosted a drive-thru, physically distanced BBQ lunch for union members June 19, with the Mess preparing BBQ box lunches and command team and union leaders standing by to hand them out. Cook and Campbell said they look forward to seeing more of the civilian personnel returning to work on base in coming weeks, as business resumption plans come into action. The wing Public Service contingent includes members of the Union of National

Outdoor adventure turns into SAR work

June 25, just before 3 p.m., the Halifax Joint Rescue Co-ordination Centre tasked a 14 Wing Greenwood Cormorant helicopter, Rescue 912, with 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron to rescue persons on the Fundy Shore trapped by rising tides. June 28, a Hercules from 413 Squadron was tasked around 8 p.m. for an ELT search in the vicinity of St-Pierre et Miquelon. The aircraft left Greenwood just after 10 p.m., but found nothing on the search and returned to base just after 2 a.m. June 29. July 1, Cormorant Rescue 905 was tasked to provide assistance to a fishing vessel in the Miramichi Bay whose captain had lost consciousness. Just after 2 p.m., the helicopter was stood down, as the vessel made it to shore and the patient was transferred to local care. July 2, just after 2 a.m., Hercules Rescue 343 launched from Greenwood to assist on a search and rescue call for a missing hiker near Port Cartier, Quebec. A 64-year-old man became separated from a hiking party July 1 and may have wandered into difficult terrain, inaccessible to GSAR. The aircraft was on scene for a number of hours before being stood down around 1:30 p.m. July 3, just before 3 p.m., Cormorant R905 and Hercules R332 were tasked on a call to aid a 70-year-old man experiencing tightness in his chest while aboard a vessel 130 nautical miles south of Sable Island. The Hercules arrived on scene around 5 p.m. and was able to drop medicine to the individual, with the helicopter expected to arrive within 45 minutes. Once on location, R905 search and rescue technicians hoisted the man from the vessel and transferred him, in stable con-

dition, to a waiting ambulance at Windsor Park, in Halifax. Both aircraft then returned to Greenwood. →

'Why do you go to those places?' Remembering Tony Wojcik

I was posted into CFB Halifax in July 1996. Upon clearing in, I met Lieutenant-Colonel Tony Wojcik, the formation construction engineer officer - my new commanding officer. I was immediately impressed by his laid-back, yet very professional, manner.

In early March 1997, all six of the FCE captains were summoned to the commanding officer's office on a short-fuse issue. Tony shared with us a request from National Defence Headquarters for Maritime Forces Atlantic to provide two Construction Engineer captains for a time sensitive mission to Bosnia. The captains would join the United Nations Mine Action Center for Bosnia-Herzegovina. Tony made it clear to us he wanted two volunteers to report to his office the next morning.

The next day, Robin Keith and I reported to the CO's office and volunteered. Tony had a laugh, as he told us it was a good thing we volunteered because he had already selected

young child with his family. He attended Royal Roads Military College and earned a civil engineering degree and commission scroll, then pursued a 36-year career as a military engineer. He had many postings throughout Canada and abroad, including a return to RMC to complete a masters degree. Career highlights included United Nations peace-keeping missions in Cyprus and the Golan Heights, the

Fast forward to the annual regimental dinner in Bridgewater in 2014. My wife and I were seated with Tony and his lovely wife, Jane. During the dinner chit-chat, Jane asked me about my current job with UNICEF South Sudan, and about my five years in Afghanistan. Finally, she asked, "Why do you keep putting up your hand to go into all these hostile places?" My answer was quick: "Because Tony got me hooked when he sent me to Bosnia." The blank look on Tony's face was priceless. Laughter ensued. A good memory of a good man. →

May 31, Colonel (retired) Antoni 'Tony' Wojcik died at the age of 69 at home in Glen Haven surrounded by family after a long battle with cancer. Wojcik was a former honorary colonel with 14 Construction Engineering Squadron. Born in Kolbaskowo, Poland, he immigrated to Canada as a

Bluenose prepares for sail past summer tour

Nova Scotia's Bluenose II will sail into ports and harbours around the province this summer in a unique tour fit for the times, dubbed "Sail Past Summer."

"Ninety-nine years ago, Captain Angus Walters took up the mantle of the Bluenose, representing the hopes and pride of Nova Scotians," said Communities, Culture and Heritage Minister Leo Glavine. "The young crew aboard Bluenose II aims to again help Nova Scotians and Canadians remember their strength and resilience. We hope that seeing the ship sail along our sea-bound coast will help communities remember that as with all storms, the sun will shine again."

Due to COVID-19, the crew has created a Bluenose bubble for training, maintenance and sailing. Visitors will not be permitted onboard and there will be no passenger cruises.

Dates include Lunenburg July 25 to 27, August 11 to 14 and August 24 to 27. July 28 to August 11, the ship will sail past Digby, Saint John, Grande Manan Island, Petit Passage, Meteghan, Yarmouth, Pubnico, Barrington, Cape Sable, Liverpool and Lahave. August 15 to 24, Bluenose II will sail past Mahone Bay, Tancook Island, St. Margaret's Bay, Halifax, Bedford and Sambro; and August 28 to September 11 past Whitehead, Canso, Louisbourg, Sydney, North

Sydney, Baddeck, Meat Cove, Pictou, Charlottetown, Port Hood and Arichat. It returns to Lunenburg September 14. Bluenose II will not dock in any ports.

"Through our teamwork onboard we hope to embody the unity that is being shown ashore," Phil Watson, captain, Bluenose II. "It is the crew's belief that seeing Bluenose II sailing in our waters will inspire communities to remember their strengths as they work together for a better future." →

Did you know the average sprinkler puts out about 4 m³ of water/hour? That is equal to 16,000 glasses of water!

JUST A DROP WILL DO!

Overwatering isn't just wasteful it can actually do more harm than good and has the potential to cause things like root rot and increase the likelihood of other bacterial disease that can kill the very plants you're trying to nourish.



DO YOU REALLY NEED TO?

New lawn? We get it, you want your grass to grow. If you're going to use a sprinkler hook it up to a timer and make sure it is spraying over the grass not the sidewalk, driveway or roadways.

Thinking about washing your car? Again, we really wish you wouldn't! Conserving water is good for everyone. Besides, who really wants to spend a Saturday washing their car?



WHEN TO WATER?

Did you know your lawn and garden will get the most benefit from watering during the coolest part of the day?

We'd rather you didn't water at all (besides your veggies of course!) but if you're going to, please refrain from watering during the hottest parts of the day!



FOREST FIRES

Conserving water is always important but especially during the warm summer months because of an increased risk of forest fires.

Help support our fire fighters by reducing your water usage and making sure there is enough water for them should the need arise!



REDUCE YOUR NEED FOR FRESH WATER
