Reinstating a proud trucker tradition

September 25, 14 Wing Greenwood's Transportation & Electrical Mechanical Engineer Flight hosted the first "rodeo" to have graced 14 Wing in about 10 years.

The Trucker's Rodeo is historically a mobile support equipment operator trade function that reached national levels of competition and challenged various aspects of proficiency, such as driving with restricted range, sight and space. The rodeo is no longer hosted at regional or national levels; however, recent years have seen a resurgence of this tradition in various forms at different bases across Canada.

This year, 14 Wing attempted to produce its own version, spearheaded by Warrant Officer T.D. Rose, fleet manager; who not only planned the event - originally to have occurred prior to the onset of the pandemic, but the successfully planned and executed the rodeo within the current COVID-19 restrictions and guidelines. Rose ensured vehicles and all equipment were properly sanitized between uses and distancing and masks were adhered to when applicable.

The event was a significant success, drawing the flight out on a beautiful, sunshine-blessed Friday. Wing Commander Colonel Brendan Cook, Wing Chief Warrant Officer Dan Campbell, 14 Mission Support Squadron Lieutenant-Colonel Sherri Buckler and officer commanding TEME, Major M. Henneberry, who successfully participated in some of the events; all visited the event.

Challenges included having to drive the 44-pax bus through a simulated off-set alley and turning a sharp right U-turn, weaving a 5-tonne truck through and backing up between a series of large pylons, and backing up the tractor trailer cab into a simulated dockyard and trying to drive straight through a series of pylons with goggles designed to simulate driving while drinking. Where past rodeos were typically restricted to MSE-Ops only, this event permitted all members of TEME flight to participate and experience driving different vehicles they might not otherwise have a chance to.

"In this age of technology and separation taking people physically apart, it was refreshing to be in a setting where we had the opportunity to safely encourage cohesiveness in person," said

Master Corporal Chaffey, a dispatcher for TEME. "It strengthens morale, and I find that it was good to have something competitive and trade-related to bring everyone together."

The events were followed by a drive-thru BBQ and outdoor awards ceremony to recognize the three members who scored the highest on their driving tasks, impressing all with their demonstration of professionalism and ability. Gary Spinney scored highest on driving the 44-pax bus, Corporal T. Berlinger on the 5-tonne, and Corporal A. Wagg won the tractor-trailer challenge.

"As a former 4AD, I was never exposed to any of the rodeos at the bases I was previously posted to when they were still a yearly event, so now, as an MSE-Op, it was great getting to see what it was all about and participate in person!" said Master Corporal Cranney, the advance booker at TEME.

TEME's attempt to foster pride in the trucker trade appears to have effectively accomplished not only this goal, but also set the bar for expectations next year for an event that will continue to expand and astound. ➔

Spotting problem, IDing solution recognized

The RCAF Vector Check is a process for anyone, regardless of rank or chain of command, to bring forward new ideas, provide innovative solutions or ask specific questions to the commander of the Royal Canadian Air Force.

Master Corporal Tim Canrinus, an aviation systems technician at 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron here at 14 Wing Greenwood, recently used this process to bring forth problems - and a solution - with the Deployable ADAM system. ADAM (Automated Data for Aerospace Maintenance) is the CP140 fleet's ERKS (Electronic Record Keeping System) for all technical and maintenance data. The program tracks information,

such as hours remaining to inspections, maintenance action performed, unavailability, etc.

Canrinus' solution will bring the program to deployments on a computer able to connect to the DWAN network to send real-time data to the home unit. As of now, the data is saved to external sources and units don't have access to the deployed aircraft's information through the program. When there is an issue with the aircraft, it requires multiple phone calls, emails and indirect communication through various parties, which becomes time consuming; and, information can get missed. A byproduct of this will be access to all maintenance manuals on the network.

Some software snags came up while trying to move forward, which halted progress. Using the RCAF

Vector Check, Canrinus was able to explain the problem and solution to the RCAF commander directly in a VTC

presentation September 17. The project is now able to move forward, with external sources helping to solve the

issues encountered.

The week following the presentation, 14 Wing Commander Colonel Brenden

Cook awarded Canrinus a 14 Wing Command Team coin for his leadership on the project. →

Greenwood clinic plans flu vaccine drive-through November 3, 4

The Greenwood Family Medical Clinic will hold a flu vaccine drive-through November 3 and 4 in the parking lot of the Morfee Annex, School Road, Greenwood

This event is open to patients of the Greenwood Family Medical Clinic, de-

pendents without a family doctor. Reservists without a family doctor and members of the Defence Team without a family doctor; if you have not had an opportunity at another clinic or pharmacy offering the flu vaccine this year.

Medical staff will be set up in tents in the parking lot, across from the 14 Wing Greenwood Library, November 3, 10 a.m. to noon and 1:30 p.m. to 5 p.m.; and again November 4, 10 a.m. to noon. Patients will require their provincial health card.

The majority of people will be able to receive their vaccine right in their vehicles. Some people may need to get out of their vehicles and sit in a chair; for example, to assist a small child who needs to be held. Defence Team members

are strongly encouraged to obtain an influenza vaccination unless medically unable. The circulation of influenza in Canadian society generally occurs in the fall/ winter timeframe. It will be especially important to avoid contracting the flu

this year to reduce pressure on the Canadian health care system, to maintain the overall health of the Defence Team, and ensure the Canadian Armed Forces has the personnel resources necessary to respond to any emergency tasks. →

First poppy presented to governor general

The first poppy of The Royal Canadian Legion's 2020 National Poppy Campaign was presented to Her Excellency the Right Honourable Julie Payette, Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of Canada, October 16. For the first time, due to the pandemic, a virtual presentation took place in lieu of the traditional ceremony held at Rideau Hall in Ottawa.

The Legion's Dominion president, Thomas D. Irvine, offered the flower with words of thanks. "Veterans both past and present appreciate your personal engagement," said Irvine. "Your example will be followed by millions in Canada and abroad. All will take comfort in this symbolic act, and through the continuing support for our veterans shown by you and by Canadians."

As viceregal patron of the Royal Canadian Legion, Payette accepted the symbolic poppy and expressed her support for the 2020 campaign. "Of course, this year, the campaign looks different," she said, "but the intent is still the same, and is still as noble. We

must support our veterans, as they supported us during challenging points in our history.

"Thank you for all you have done - and you still do - for Canada. And thank you to all Canadians for supporting the National Poppy Campaign."

The Legion's 2020 National Poppy Campaign launches each year on the last Friday in October; it will begin October 30 this year. As the national symbol of Remembrance, the red poppy represents the ongoing thankfulness Canadians have for all fallen military and

RCMP veterans.

"This year, the poppy also

reminds us of the special significance of 75th anniversary of the end of the Second World War," said Vice Admiral (retired) Larry Murray, Legion grand president. "In this year of the pandemic, remembrance also reminds us that our nation has been through even more challenging times than we're experiencing now. Canadians persevered then, and we will now."

Funds donated locally during the National Poppy Campaign are distributed locally to help support veterans, their families and communities, and to promote remembrance. →

COVID Alert app available in Nova Scotia

Nova Scotians will be able to receive COVID-19 exposure alerts directly to their smartphones when using Health Canada's free COVID Alert app.

"As a province, we have all shown a steadfast commitment to flattening the curve and keeping COVID activity low," says Premier Stephen McNeil. "As we learn to live with the virus, COVID Alert is another tool that will help keep ourselves and our communi-

ties safe and healthy."

COVID Alert may be downloaded through the Apple or Google Play app stores. When installed, the app communicates using Bluetooth with nearby phones which also have the app installed. An app user who tests positive for COVID-19 is given a unique code by the Nova Scotia Health Authority to input into COVID Alert. If any other user with the app, whose phone was within

two metres/ six feet for at least 15 minutes of the infected person's phone, will be notified they may have been exposed to COVID-19. The app will give the user guidance like monitor for symptoms, take the online self-assessment if they begin to feel unwell, and information about what to do next.

COVID Alert does not collect personal or health information and does not know or track the location, name or contacts of

any user.

"I would encourage Nova Scotians who are able to download and use COVID Alert as one measure to prevent and reduce the spread of COVID-19 in our province," says Dr. Robert Strang, Nova Scotia's chief medical officer of health. "Nova Scotians are reminded they should continue to follow all public health measures in place, regardless if they use the COVID



Alert app."

As of October 15, more than four million Canadians have

downloaded COVID Alert at novascotia.ca/coronavirus/covid-alert-app/. →

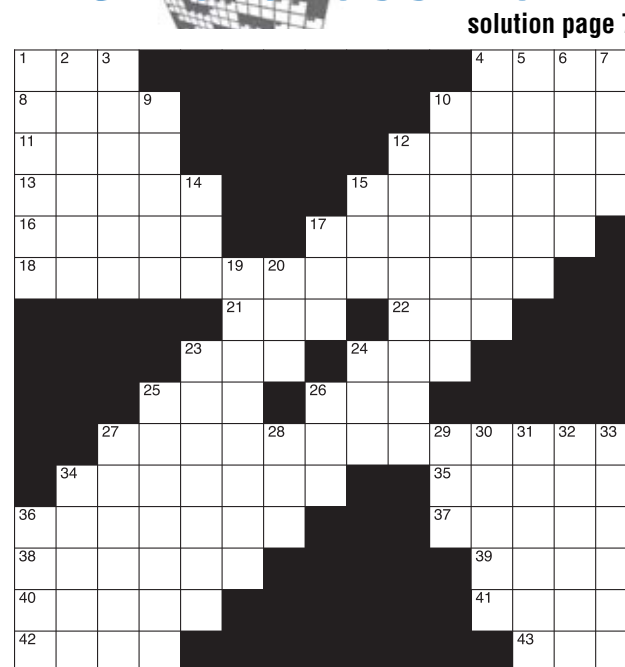

Kingston library progress a 2020 highlight

Is there anyone out there not adversely affected by the intrusion of COVID-19? Everything planned for 2020 has had to be tweaked and reworked, to adjust to constantly changing limitations, restrictions and risks. So, too, has the Kingston Library expansion project been hampered by current circumstances.

Workmen, though, are busy again at the library, and also in the old Kingston village office on Main Street, as the combined space has now been gutted. The ceiling has been raised, practical

flooring choices and lighting options are being considered, and paint patches have been carefully selected for a cohesive and stimulating atmosphere for this new and exciting library.

Donations have been tallied for shelving and furniture options for this expanded space. Happily, the choices are not limited by a shortfall of funds, as many have come forward to assist with these costs.

As one can learn from the signage in front of the building, generous contributions from both the provincial and federal governments have been secured to make this project possible.

When the work is finished, the exterior of the building will look much the same as it does now. The "wow" factors of the expanded library will be the extra bright space, expansive ceiling, and increased hours of operation. There will be comfortable seating throughout for a quiet place to meet, read or use Wi-Fi. And, there will be ample wall space to showcase works by local artists.

The new multi-purpose room is another valuable addition to this library, offering a multitude of possible uses, and will be a tremendous asset to the Village. There will even be a kitchenette tucked

in one end!
Kingston is hopeful for a late fall completion date for the new library. Until then, residents are not without library service, as books and other loanable items are available in the village tourist bureau building, also on Main Street. Access these services by making prior arrangements through the Annapolis Valley Regional Library website.

This Kingston library project has been quite some time in the planning, and it's not yet complete, but there is so much anticipation - even among those who may not have frequented the library in the past. It's a thing of pride to have a first-class library in one's own community: convenient, accessible and friendly. For many, the excitement of this Kingston Library expansion is helping make 2020 just a little more bearable. →

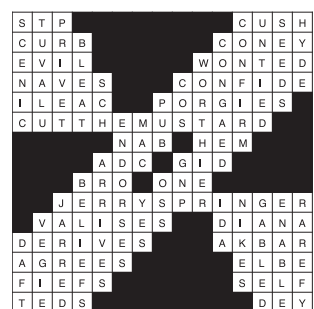

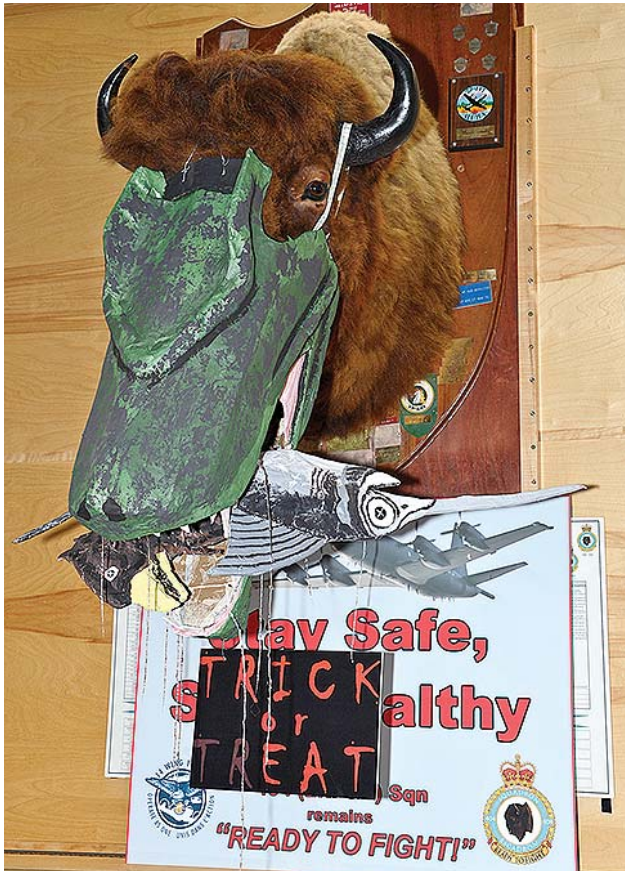

Food for Thought from the Upper Room

Our new COVID-related procedures at the Upper Room Food Bank in Kingston seem to be working well.

We have started opening an extra hour Mondays and Thursdays to accommodate our new procedures, with clients now requiring an appointment. Each client receives a 10-minute block during open hours, with interviews being done on the phone prior to the ap-

pointment. This process means more work for our volunteers, but it reduces the time clients will have to wait outside in the weather, particularly as winter arrives, since we still cannot allow clients into the building.

During September, the Upper Room Food Bank served 113 families, consisting of 198 adults and 100 children, with 12,815 pounds of product going out and 11,520 pounds

coming in. The incoming total includes 1,810 pounds provided by the Feed Nova Scotia network and 1,537 pounds purchased with local cash donations. The remainder is from local donations, including regular arrangements with several local businesses.

Donations are being accepted as usual, with drop off at the food bank or at the Kingston village offices (655 Main Street). Processing of donated food items will

continue in accordance with directives from Feed Nova Scotia and the Nova Scotia Health Authority. Cash donations may be dropped off as normal, or call the office and someone will arrange to pick it up.
