C&E Member of the Year from 14 Wing

A 14 Wing Greenwood member has received a Canadian Military Communications and Electronics Branch award.

Aerospace telecommunication and information systems technician Sergeant Kirk Kreitzer, with 14 Operations Support Squadron's Telecommunications Flight, was named Member of the Year during C&E Week in October and presented his award November 25 by 14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Tom Goldie.

14 OSS Commanding Officer Lieutenant-Colonel Serge Parisien endorsed Kreitzer's nomination earlier this year as a "highly dedicated junior leader in the Royal Canadian Air Force and the C&E Branch, whose inspirational leadership encourages their team to overcome any challenges. Over the past year, this ongoing work ethic, commitment to subordinates and professionalism has been the driving force for a number of significant 14 Wing initiatives."

Over the last year, Kreitzer served as the Mission Systems Maintenance team supervisor, a role normally held by a sergeant. Milestones included requesting a PMED assessment of the wing disintegrator building and its aging equipment within to ensure troops were adequately protected, establishing a training regime for deployable equipment, having MSM troops set up at various locations to hone skills and determine areas with limited connectivity; and coordinating the completion of the Next Gen Data Centre project. As the 14 Wing subject matter expert for classified installations, Kreitzer is often asked for advice, assistance with project planning and to conduct inspections. In the past year, work included establishing two new classified networks and reducing unnecessary cryptographic equipment holdings. As a direct result of Kreitzer's leadership, junior MSM technicians increased their own level of expertise and confidence to face new challenges.

With a short timeline to provide CSNI presence for the Fleet Synthetic Training - Joint Exercise, a major RCAF initiative, Kreitzer developed both short-term deployable kits

and long-term permanent workstations to ensure CP140M Aurora crews could participate in the international exercise. The MSM team was recognized with a memo of appreciation from the commanding officer of 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) Squadron.

Despite being a sergeant's role, Kreitzer served as the unit return to duty coordinator, the 14 OSS Mess representative and implemented a farewell gift for departing MSM personnel, including a voice-recordable card of personal messages from the team - very well received by the troops as a lasting memory. When a junior tech returned from a QL5 course and needed to isolate, Kreitzer put together an isolation "celebration package" to acknowledge the member's course accomplishment and alleviate the distress of isolating alone.

Kreitzer eagerly volunteered for the C&E Branch - Faces of our Fallen project, completing biographies of Signalman Albert Edward Jay and Corporal Grant Albert Druhan, now published on the C&E webpage. Kreitzer has stepped up to lead the 34th C&E Branch Curling Bonspiel at 14 Wing in February 2022 and, through these early efforts, the event promises to be another spectacular opportunity to promote teamwork and cohesion within the C & E Branch.

"Kreitzer's utmost dedication towards initiatives, such as Faces of our Fallen and chairing the curling bonspiel, motivates others to contribute and get involved in the traditions and legacy of the branch," Parisien wrote in the nomination.

"Kreitzer is an inspiring leader, someone who always puts the mission first and works tirelessly to achieve exemplary results and drive solutions to complex problems in an environment of trust and co-operation." →

Membre de l'année des C&E de la 14e Escadre

Un membre de la 14e Escadre Greenwood a reçu un prix de la Section des communications et de l'électronique de l'armée canadienne.

Le Sergent Kirk Kreitzer, technicien en systèmes d'information et de télécommunications aérospatiales, de l'escadron de télécommunications du 14e Escadron de soutien opérationnel, a été nommé membre de l'année pendant la semaine des C&E en octobre et s'est vu remettre son prix le 25 novembre par le Colonel Tom Goldie, commandant de la 14e Escadre Greenwood.

Le commandant du 14e Escadron de soutien opérationnel, le lieutenant-colonel Serge Parisien, a appuyé la nomination de Kreitzer plus tôt cette année en tant que «responsable subalterne très dévoué au sein de l'Aviation royale canadienne et de la Section des C et E, dont le leadership inspirant encourage son équipe à surmonter tous les défis. Au cours de l'année écoulée, cette éthique du travail, cet engagement envers les subordonnés et ce professionnalisme ont été le moteur d'un certain nombre d'initiatives importantes de la 14e Escadre.»

Au cours de l'année écoulée, le travail a consisté à établir deux nouveaux réseaux classifiés et à réduire les stocks d'équipements cryptographiques inutiles. Dans un délai très court, Kreitzer a développé à la fois des kits de déploiement à court terme et des stations de travail permanentes à long terme pour s'assurer que les équipages du CP140M Aurora puissent participer à un exercice international.

Kreitzer a été le coordinateur du retour au travail de l'unité, le représentant du mess et a mis en place une carte d'adieu à enregistrement vocal contenant des messages personnels de l'équipe pour les membres qui partent.

Kreitzer s'est porté volontaire avec enthousiasme pour le projet «Faces of our Fallen» de la Section des C&E et diriger le 34e Bonspiel de curling de la Section des C&E en février.

'Middle manager's' view of opportunities to meet CAF goal of safe, responsive workplace

November 5, The Honourable Madame Louise Arbour visited 14 Wing Greenwood, meeting military personnel through an opening town hall and three separate focus groups covering recruitment and training, leadership, evaluation and promotion; and sexual misconduct and military justice.

Having had the opportunity to attend two focus groups (Junior Ranks and Key Leadership) November 5, quite possibly as an error on my part, I was extremely pleased with the outcome.

As a sergeant, stuck - but not so stuck - in the "middle," I find myself in a unique position to bridge the gap between the junior non-commissioned members and senior leadership. I was so excited to learn we are working towards achieving the same goal to "Operate as One" and, while our issues have different viewpoints, the results we want are the same.

The focus groups had topics assigned to them, but leadership was of keen interest: this was not the intended discussion topic, which speaks to how important this issue is for all members on the wing. It seemed both the junior and senior leadership agree, once the rank of sergeant is reached, technical skills are less important than the ability to manage a team, putting the emphasis on human resource skills.

Both groups believed promotion criteria should reflect a 360-degree review, beginning at the junior leadership rank (master corporal and captain). A full review would provide information about personnel

from all directions vice the current hierarchical system, which focuses exclusively on supervisor assessments. The 360-degree look does have pitfalls, such as a supervisor perhaps reviewed poorly from a subordinate due to the application of corrective measures, but a *continuous* theme of similar remarks would identify an issue with a supervisor, enabling a more timely resolution of poor leadership. This type of evaluation system would provide a venue for the junior ranks to express concerns, and give credence to their input.

Junior non-commissioned members felt their worries and reporting of poor work environments were not being actioned, while senior leadership felt both constrained due to the sensitive nature of issues and burdened by the administrative hurdles imposed vis-à-vis releasing members that are no longer advantageously employable. A great point brought up, further debilitating our military, was how easy it is for our future leaders to release

voluntarily, transitioning effortlessly to civilian equivalent employment, while it takes months - sometimes years, to remove a toxic person from the Canadian Armed Forces. Having a good team around you can make the worst work environment bearable, even enjoyable; having a team that is toxic, as members project their unhappiness into the workload, not communicating information effectively and failing to provide care during compassionate situations creates the opposite effect. It can make the best work environment completely intolerable, which leads to disgruntled subordinates, stress leave and releases.

Unfortunately, generations of CAF members perceived the resolution as "promote and post," believing that was how the organization dealt with its issues - ultimately inflicting the burden on another workplace. The CAF will continue to be called into disrepute and erode public trust if we do not change this attitude.

Weather has a role in recent SAR calls

November 14, the Halifax Joint Rescue Coordination Centre tasked Hercules Rescue 333, with 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron at 14 Wing Greenwood, just after 6:30 p.m.; to assist in the search for two boaters missing northeast of Newfoundland and Labrador, in the Bay of Exploits. The Hercules returned to Greenwood just after 2 a.m.

as weather conditions were impacting the search. It took off again November 15, just before 8 a.m., heading to Ganger to be ready for immediate deployment to the search area. Just after 4 p.m., the Hercules was able to take off and rejoin the search. An overturned vessel was found, believed to belong to the missing boaters. The search continued to the

end of crew day, around 10 p.m., with a slash crew tasked to continue into the night with flares. Weather unfortunately took a turn for the worse, and the aircraft and new crew was stood down just before 11 p.m. The day crew was re-tasked November 16, just before 6:30 a.m., to continue the search. At 5:30 p.m., the search was reduced, with the Hercules

released. It refueled in Gander and returned to Greenwood just after 8 p.m.

November 15, Cormorant Rescue 907 was tasked by JRCC to respond to a reported mayday from a vessel against the rocks near Canso, leaving Greenwood just after 6 p.m. The vessel was located, and the crew was awaiting Coast Guard support. The Cormorant

was released and returned to Greenwood just after 10 p.m.

November 22, at 5:47 p.m., a Hercules was tasked by JRCC to conduct a search in the vicinity of Dildo, Newfoundland and Labrador, to investigate a report of an aircraft in possible distress. The Hercules was stood down at 5:58 p.m.

November 24, just after 6 a.m., a Cormorant helicopter

was tasked from Greenwood to extract two adults and a dog from Southwest Newfoundland.


November 24, Hercules Rescue 332 left 14 Wing Greenwood at 9:43 a.m. to provide top cover for Cormorant 907 from 9 Wing Gander, responding to a call near St. Andrews, Newfoundland and Labrador. →

was tasked from Greenwood to extract two adults and a dog from Southwest Newfoundland. Les deux groupes estiment que les critères de promotion devraient refléter un examen à 360 degrés. Un superviseur pourrait être mal évalué par un subordonné, mais un thème continu permettrait d'identifier un problème avec un superviseur, permettant une résolution plus rapide d'un mauvais leadership. Les militaires du rang subalternes avaient l'impression que leurs inquiétudes n'étaient pas prises en considération, tandis que les hauts dirigeants se sentaient à la fois limités par des questions sensibles et des obstacles administratifs. Un point important qui a été soulevé est la facilité avec laquelle nos futurs dirigeants peuvent être libérés volontairement pour un emploi civil, alors qu'il faut des mois pour retirer une personne toxique des Forces armées canadiennes.

De nombreux participants ont raconté des histoires de plaintes soumises à la chaîne de commandement qui ne semblaient jamais aboutir. Ce qui était souvent visible, c'est que le sujet de la plainte était promu, affecté ou les deux. En fait, la chaîne de commandement fait peut-être de son mieux dans les limites de son autorité, hors de la vue du public et en protégeant la vie privée des personnes.

J'ai entendu toutes les situations négatives et les problèmes auxquels nous sommes confrontés, mais j'avais toujours le sourire aux lèvres : nous voulons que la FAC soit un espace inclusif, avec un grand leadership et une force physique et mentale. Je ne sais pas comment résoudre tous les problèmes dont j'ai entendu parler, mais je sais que je suis prête à rester et à faire partie de la solution.

En tant que sergent, je fais le lien entre les jeunes militaires du rang et le leadership supérieur. J'ai été très heureuse d'apprendre que nous travaillons tous pour atteindre

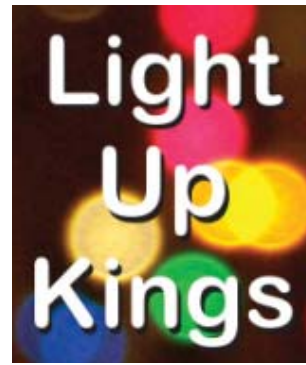
then visit the site to plan holiday light tours, or enjoy festive displays virtually by browsing uploaded photos from across the region.

Hellstrom remembered as woman who led the way

October 16, family, friends, members of the community, retired and current military members gathered on a misty afternoon at Hillcrest Cemetery in Lunenburg to pay tribute to Brigadier-General (retired) Sheila Hellstrom, a remarkable trailblazer in the Canadian Armed Forces.

Hellstrom died in December 2020 at the age of 85. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, her interments took place at both the National Military Cemetery at Beechwood in Ottawa in September and in her hometown of Lunenburg in October.

In Lunenburg, with the gold, red and orange trees of the surrounding countryside as the backdrop, a flag party from the Legion and Pastor Rick Pryce of the Zion Lutheran Church officiating, the service recognized Hellstrom's many achievements. She was the first woman posted to 2 Canadian Forces Technical Services Agency Montreal in 1969, and the first woman to attend the Canadian Forces Staff College in 1973. She was remembered as a great leader and the first Canadian woman, in 1987, to achieve the rank of brigadier-general.

Pryce read a note from Beth Swarbrigg, the senior advancement officer for Mount Allison University, Brig.-Gen. Hellstrom's alma mater, at the gravesite. "Following a long history of extraordinary female graduates, Sheila broke so many barriers and successfully

challenged out-dated ways of thinking," Swarbrigg wrote, "we hope in some way influenced by her time at Mount A. Awarding Sheila with an Honorary Degree as part of our sesquicentennial celebrations seemed a fitting tribute, and will ensure her legacy is not forgotten on campus."

The service ended with attendees laying flowers on the grave, followed by a 14 Wing Greenwood CP140 Aurora flyby. Aurora pilot Captain Mary Cameron-Kelly was on hand to coordinate timings from the event and Captain Vicki Connors was the aircraft commander in the cockpit.

With the graveside tribute complete, Colonel (retired) Cheryl Lamerson invited people up the hill to the Lunenburg Academy, Hellstrom's childhood school. During the reception, Lamerson, sporting a Royal Canadian Air Force tartan scarf, thanked everyone for coming and invited attendees to tell a story about the Sheila they knew.

"After I moved to Lunenburg, I ended up in the newspaper for something and she called me: 'I just wanted to say hi and say I saw your name in the newspaper,' she said. 'I'm glad you moved to my hometown.'" Lamerson said she was surprised, before finding out Hellstrom had maintained her subscription to the Lunenburg newspaper for 65 years.

"I was doing research on women," said Lamerson, about working with Hellstrom in Ottawa in the 1980s. The study was the

coined the SWINTER Trials, looking at servicewomen in non-traditional environments and roles. During that time, and based on that research, the Canadian Forces implemented women in all non-traditional roles in the military. Lamerson has great memories of the work.

"Brig.-Gen. Hellstrom would offer her experience. She would offer her knowledge." This work enabled Lieutenant-Colonel (retired) Karen McCrimmon to enrol as an air navigator and become the first woman to earn the official aircrew qualification. She then went on to be Canada's first woman to command a Canadian Forces flying squadron, 429 Transport Squadron, in 1998.

"Leadership is about service," said McCrimmon. "She saw herself as a servant for others. She helped others to be the best version of themselves. That's what leaders do. They inspire. They build people up."

Major (retired) Karen Breeck spoke to the efforts of preserving Hellstrom's legacy. "There is a group helping secure Sheila's estate; we are mostly retired RCAF women veterans. We just came together and shared in the work to make it all happen."

Together, they've made arrangements with air force museums and other museums across the country to benefit from Hellstrom's forethought to keep so many of her uniforms and other military related materials. She says all the museums have given her feedback they are actively interested in military women's artifacts, something Hellstrom's estate is full of after a 36-year career of successfully breaking barriers. The Canadian Aviation and Space Museum will soon feature Hellstrom as part of a Cold War exhibit and a gender integration exhibit.

But, it's a learning curve for the group: archiving is specific process that can take a lot of time and energy to organize. Especially for Library Archives Canada, and organization that takes only paper - or 2D - artifacts, which must, ideally, be digitized ahead of donations to allow for future researchers' ease of access.

"Part of my time has been spent looking at over 4,000 slides and 17 photo albums," said Breeck. "I know without question from doing that, that Brig.-Gen. Hellstrom loved Nova Scotia in general, but Lunenburg in specific. She kept all the academy school reunion photos. She cared deeply and encouraged people to excel, especially women."

ing the way so many years ago."

Lieutenant-General Al Meininger, commander, Royal Canadian Air Force; also recognized the need to preserve Hellstrom's legacy. In his address at the Ottawa funeral, he said, "the courage and dedication she poured into our military institution should be studied, as her efforts demonstrate profoundly that, in order to create a better future, leaders need to forge ahead and break down barriers no matter how hard it may be to do so."

Proud of her achievements and proud to have known her. Those two very distinctive sentiments were evident throughout the afternoon on October 16. "That type of service, that type of commitment is what we need more of today," said McCrimmon. "I met her a few times. Yes, I am one of the lucky ones. Brig.-Gen. Hellstrom provided leadership her entire life. She led the country to a better and more equitable place. Her legacy will not stop today." →

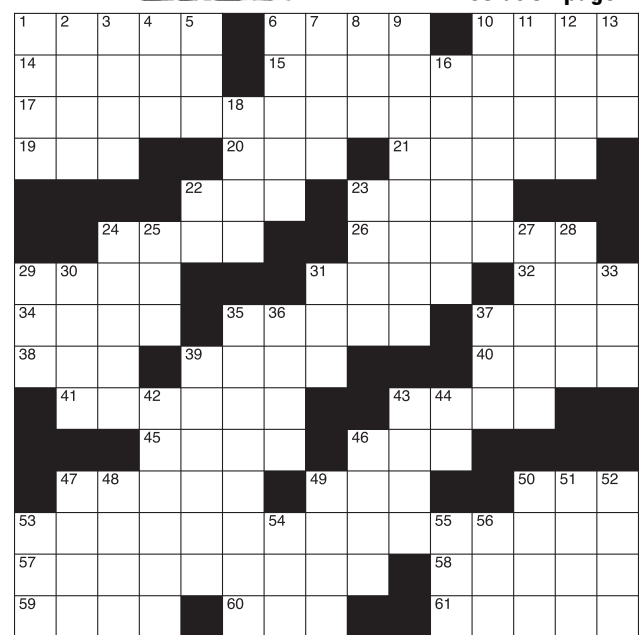

Cemetery work all about community, commitment

On a recent frosty Saturday morning, volunteers age eight to 84 turned out at the Old Tremont Cemetery to participate in what has become one of three annual community workdays at the Tremont Cemeteries. Despite all the COVID-19 restrictions in the past couple years, working in the cemeteries has always allowed for a productive, outdoor physical activity enjoyed by friends and families in and around Tremont.

During this community workday, leaf blowers were used on the top tiers, blowing the leaves into the neighboring field. Rakes in the lower section moved leaves into piles, and tarps and a truck were used to haul them away to a neighboring composting area. This made for great teamwork. It didn't matter if someone was only able to stay for an hour or the whole morning: every hand was welcome. By noon, most of the leaves had been gathered and disposed of, and participants were able to carry on with the rest of their day.

The Tremont Cemeteries have been cared for since late 2013 by the Tremont Community Cemetery Society, which reclaimed the assets of the cemeteries after the Baptist church moved out of the community. The society was created by locals with loved ones

buried there, and by those who cared about the ongoing maintenance of the cemeteries. Over the past eight years, work has been done to fix fences, repair monuments and perfect what records were received. TCCS was also granted charity status, and the Old Tremont Cemetery was designated a historical property. More than that, there has been a great community spirit created. This spirit is not only seen in the interactions of the TCCS, the Western Kings Fair committee and the Nazarene Church community whose lands intersect, but also with local businesses who have helped, volunteers who have taken the time to lend a hand and for people who may live far away but have connections to the cemeteries and send donations.

The other two annual workdays include a spring cleanup held the Saturday before Mother's Day in the New Tremont Cemetery and a spruce up day of whipper snipping in the Old Tremont Cemetery the third Saturday in August (after the blueberries have ripened and just before the Tremont World Fair). The other regular ongoing ground maintenance continues to be done solely on a volunteer basis. Volunteers of any age are always welcomed. For more info, call 902 765-2642.
