## 405 team pitching in, preserving RCAF heritage

It all started when Corporal Emily Tulloch and a small group of her peers from 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron visited the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum to pick up a power lever cover from the Arcturus.

"We got to talking with one of the volunteers there, and they casually mentioned refurbishing the outdoor planes. Months later, I ran into Brian Handley at The Aurora Newspaper office, and I asked if they were still planning on this project and if they needed help. A few emails, introductions and a tour of the museum later - here we are!"

After speaking with Handley, Tulloch, an aviation systems technician, took the initiative and canvassed the squadron for a team of technicians to assist in the restorations. The volunteers were excited to have an

opportunity to work with legacy aircraft over the next year, beginning with the cleaning of the CC130 Hercules in early June and the CC144 Challenger later in the month. The team will work over the summer to

clean and repair aircraft in the museum's outdoor air park and, in the winter months, will assist museum volunteers with current

projects featuring Second World War aircraft inside the restoration area. All of it will help the museum prepare for the Royal Canadian Air Force Centennial in 2024.

"It's not only for the 100th year anniversary of the air force, but also to show pride in our history and for our wing," says Tulloch of the pitching-in work. "It really started with an idea and a want to help and, between the drive of the volunteers from 405 AMO 2 and the volunteers from the museum, we just got the ball rolling."

The whole team is proud to have the opportunity to preserve their RCAF heritage, and to build on their current experience in aircraft

maintenance.

"The team and I have never really worked on a project like this in the past. We're all aircraft technicians, but this is outside the scope of what we normally do on a daily basis. Our regular maintenance of what we do on the Aurora, however heavy it may be, doesn't equate to the work we have planned for all of the different aircraft at the museum.

"It should be a really fun and exciting learning experience."

One of the bigger air park projects is coordinating the installation of rotor blades on the Piasecki H44 helicopter. The "Flying Banana," which flew with 103 Rescue Unit at RCAF Station Greenwood in the 1950s, was put on display in the air park in December 2018 after a five-year restoration. The technicians will also continue with their restoration of the other aircraft in the park, including the Arcturus, Neptune, Lancaster, Argus, Labrador and Expediter. ➔

## PSP trainers get bird's eye look at physical demands of SAR work

Canadian Armed Forces members must match their training and physical fitness with on-the-job physical demands.

Personnel Support Program fitness and sports staff help them do that across Canada and around the world; here at 14 Wing Greenwood, PSP staff had a recent opportunity to get out of the gym and weight room, and visit 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron search and rescue technicians in their workplace: a CH149 Cormorant

helicopter.

PSP staff were invited on the Cormorant, accompanied by SAR-Techs, who were able to show them how they work through the space and with the equipment they need to do their job. PSP staff were able to gain a better understanding of the demands SAR-Techs face: this will help them create better fitness and training programs, appreciate the mental focus required for SAR roles, as well as understand the unique types of physical demands

each member of a flight crew is faced with.

The 413 crew took PSP staff on a wonderful flying tour from the base to Trout Lake, and then over to Port George, along the Bay of Fundy shoreline. Some of the PSP staff got to see their childhood homes from the air – and give a big wave to some of the families standing out on decks waiting for their fly-over! Staff even got an opportunity to hang their legs from the helicopter's interior - to the delight of

some, and the pure fear of others.

The flight crew described how they complete SAR protocols and what each of the crewmember's roles may include while in flight, and showed how the equipment required feels after wearing for even a short time. It's incredible how technical and physical SAR and in-flight roles can be, and more than one staff member may have experienced a sore neck from the weight of that equipment! →

# New Colours recognize WNSR heritage, service Presentation September 24 updates regiment's 'most prized and sacred possession'

The West Nova Scotia Regiment marks a significant event Sunday, September 24, as it hosts a parade, presentation and consecration of its new King's and Regimental Colours at the Church of Evangeline, Grand-Pré National Historic Site, at 1:30 p.m.

Regimental Colours are an organization's most prized and sacred possession. They are normally presented personally by the Sovereign. Historically, Colours identified units and provided a rallying point in the line of battle. Today, they are no longer carried in action; they continue to be visible symbols of pride, honour and devotion to Sovereign and country.

WNSR Commanding Officer Lieutenant-Colonel Mike Bobbitt will march on the regiment at 1 p.m. (guests should be in place by then; the public is welcome to attend), followed by the arrival of the commanders of both 36 Canadian Brigade Group and 5th Canadian Division for the General Salute. His Honour The Honourable Arthur J. LeBlanc, ONS, KC; Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, will arrive and receive



the Royal Salute.

LeBlanc will inspect the regiment, before the current WNSR Colours are marched off. The regiment's drums will be arranged, the new Colours placed on them for the consecration ceremony and the regiment will formally be presented its new King's and regimental Colours. LeBlanc will address the parade, preside over the march past and advance in review order of the regiment, before he

receives the Royal Salute and departs. The 5 Div and 36 CBG commanders will receive the General Salute and depart, followed by the march off of the Colours, falling out of officers and the WNSR regimental sergeant major march off of the regiment.

The receipt and consecration at Grand Pré holds special significance: the West Nova Scotia Regiment cap badge, which is worn by every member of

the unit, bears the Church of Evangeline on it.

The parade also coincides with the 72nd September 23 and 24 weekend reunion of the West Nova Scotia Regimental Association. For more details on the association, visit [wnsr.ca.ra](http://wnsr.ca.ra).

**WNSR Colours tell a story**  
The West Nova Scotia Regiment has earned 38 Battle Honours in its 306-year collective service by member units, dating to

1717.

The first is an acknowledgement of the role played by WNSR forefathers in the War of 1812. They came from six Militia units: 1st and 2nd battalions of the East Annapolis Regiment, the West Annapolis Regiment, and the Kings County Regiment.

The Colours include six battle honours from the First World War, awarded to the Annapolis and Lunenburg regiments after the First


World War.

Second World War contributions by the West Nova Scotia Regiment led to 26 battle honours, of which 10 would be emblazoned on the new regimental Colours presented to the regiment in June 1959 in Annapolis Royal on behalf of her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II by then-Lieutenant Governor Major-General the Honourable EC Plow, CBE, DSO, CD.

The WNSR has since been granted two more battle honours, which will appear on these new Colours, making 18. The second is for the service of WNSR soldiers in Afghanistan.

The 1959 Queen's Colour had the Union Jack as a background; the 2023 King's Colour has a Canadian flag as its background. The background of the regimental Colour remains the same, but this is where the additional battle honours are emblazoned.

The Colours have changed to reflect the history of the regiment as it stands at this moment in time. They will be presented on behalf of His Majesty King Charles III by Nova Scotia's current Lieutenant Governor the Honourable Arthur LeBlanc, ONS, KC. →

### With 1717 roots, WNSR has strong, Canadian heritage

The West Nova Scotia Regiment is one of the oldest Army Reserve regiments in Canada, formed in 1936 from both the 69th Annapolis Regiment (1717), and the 75th Lunenburg Regiment (1870). Both regiments descended from the 40th Regiment of Foot, the Prince of Wales Volunteers, raised August 23, 1717, at Fort Anne, Annapolis Royal. The WNSR also perpetuates the 112th and 219th Battalions of Infantry, Canadian Expeditionary Force, formed in the First World War.

When the Second World War broke out, the WNSR mobilized September 1, 1939. A second battalion was recruited for home defense. At least 1,600 men tried to enlist. The active service battalion left from Halifax, disembarked at Gourock, Scotland, and immediately entrained for Aldershot, England, just after Christmas 1939.

June 15, 1943, the regiment embarked from Gourock in the first part of "Operation Husky," the invasion of Sicily, landing July 10. July 17, while moving forward to flank a

position the Carleton and York Regiment were attacking, the WNSR came under German mortar fire. They dug in and held out, despite German demands for surrender. The advance continued, and the regiment fought in Adrano, Catenanuova and Centripe.

Next came the invasion of the Italian mainland, as the Allies crossed the straits of Messina. September 3, A Company landed at Fox Amber, the first Allied soldiers to invade the continent of Europe. A combined arms battle group formed, with the WNSR providing the core. In 60 hours, the force advanced 75 miles from Villapiana to Potenza, where the Germans made a serious stand: they were denied by the rapid, Canadian "dash and daring" advance.

Other important battles the regiment fought in Italy were the Gully (on the approach to Ortona) and the breaking of the Hitler Line. February 9, 1945, the WNSR, with the 1st Canadian Corps, was transferred to Northwest Europe,

moving to Marseilles by sea and arriving in Germany April 4. April 13, it was committed to a breakout of a bridgehead on the Ijssel River in Holland. The regiment continued into Holland until the German surrender, effective 8 a.m. May 5, 1945.

The regiment stayed in Holland for four months and then left for Canada from Portsmouth September 24, 1945. It arrived in Canada October 1. There are 352 Second World War WNSR soldiers' graves from Sicily to Holland. Added to this were 1,084 wounded and missing.

The WNSR remains an active Canadian Army Reserve unit, with soldiers serving in the former Yugoslavia, Cyprus, the Middle East and, more recently, in Afghanistan and Eastern Europe. Soldiers continue to participate in unit training both in Aldershot, Nova Scotia, and Gagetown, New Brunswick, and around the world.

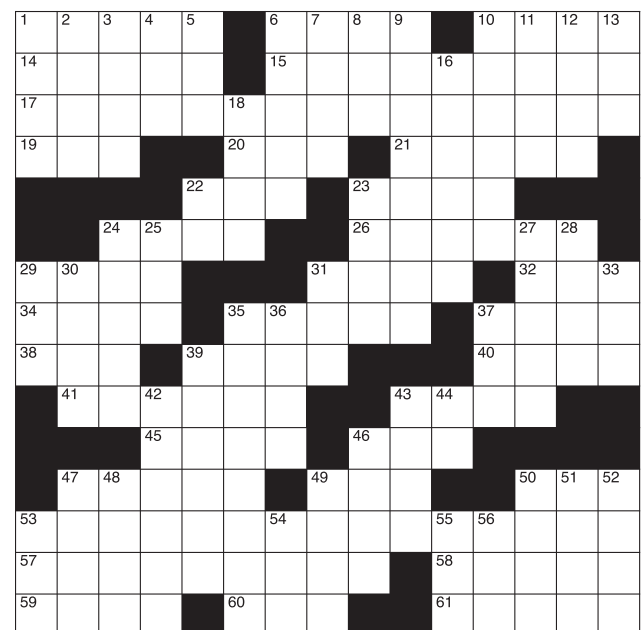

# Berwick ready for sports hall of fame event

The Berwick Sports Hall of Fame will induct five athletes and one team September 23 in Berwick's 25th induction and recognition event.

The team is the 2010/ 11 Juggles Broomball team. Juggles captured its second league championship and second provincial title that season.

In the 1960s, Bill Book was a provincially-ranked tennis player and played hockey on the Western Flyers, which won the provincial Midget championships in 1966/ 67 and represented Nova Scotia at the national championships.

David Lamb played many sports growing up but, while at the University of Guelph in 2003, he took up rowing. His men's eights team attended the national university championships and, in 2006, he attended the World University Games in Lithuania. In 2007, he was training for the Canadian men's national

team and attended the Pan Am Games in Rio de Janeiro, claiming a bronze medal.

Phil Lloyd was one of the best fastball pitchers in the Valley in the 1970s and 1980s. He made his mark with the Waterville Mohawks, Kentville Olands and Berwick Eassons. He has a no-hitter to his credit and numerous one- and two-hit games and shutouts.

Rhetta Morse played hockey in Berwick in 1982. She went on to join the Acadia University Axettes and, in 1986/ 87, the Axettes defeated Dalhousie to reach the national championships. She later played for the University of Toronto, then the Mississauga Chiefs women's team and was voted team MVP in 1990. She was part of a Toronto-based team that represented Canada at the Amsterdam Gay Games in 1998.

Kendal Morse, Rhetta's brother, was an accomplished hockey player and all-around

athlete, named the West Kings District High School athlete of the year in 1991. He went on to play for the Windsor Royals Jr B team in 1992/ 93, helping them to a Nova Scotia championship and was named the Nova Scotia Junior B Defenseman of the Year. In 1994/ 95, he joined the Acadia University Axemen hockey program, where he finished his career.

Mike Trinacty, chair of the Berwick Sports Hall of Fame is excited about this year's event.

"It is a tremendous group of inductees for our 25th year and Berwick centennial celebrations, to top it off we have Bruce Rainnie, president and CEO of the Nova Scotia Sport Hall of Fame, as our guest speaker."

The free event will be held at the Kings Mutual Century Centre in Berwick, with a reception to follow. Doors open at 6 p.m. ➔
